WILDCAT PRIDE September NEWSLETTER



Dear Families.

I hope you feel our first full month of school has gone well. It is hard to believe September is already over. The school year is going pretty well for us here and our daily schedules and routines are up and running.

Throughout the year in my newsletters, I always like to share positive information. In the past I have highlighted, our elementary staff and how well they teach and care for our kids, how we focus on PRIDE and personal accountability, the efforts of our support staff, the growth of our school, updated curriculums, our elementary staff retention and building and remodeling projects. This month, I'd like to share information about our reading programs and reading improvement our students are showing.

Three times a year, our K-5 students take the AIMSWeb assessments. These tests measure student growth in reading. Each grade level's tests are different, but overall, they test a student's reading fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. The different battery of tests produces an overall score and lets us know of each students general reading level and if they are at the grade level benchmark or struggling in a specific area.

Three years ago on our fall assessments, we had 73 students not meeting fall benchmark scores representing about 26% of students. Overall, that is not too bad and often in education there is typically 20% of students in every population not meeting grade level expectations. We however made it a goal to improve this number.


Over the last couple years, we implemented some supplemental early intervention materials into our daily reading groups in grades K-2. They are called Heggerty Phonemic Awareness and Really Great Reading. We also reorganized some staff to create smaller group instruction and how reading groups are taught. K-2 staff has also taken part in some LETRS training (the science of reading). In doing this, we have made some great progress in these student groups.

We saw improvement from one year of increased imbedded supports last fall and have even more improvement to show for this year. Following the same students through their last three grade levels, we have greatly reduced the number of students scoring below grade level. This fall, we had just 30 total students below representing about 10% of students. I feel this is proof of our efforts and great to see. Additionally, we had 26 more students not only meet the benchmark, but scored above the meeting range.

We will continue the above-mentioned methods and will add one more step. The next step to further our progress is to provide students with even more individualized instruction. We have performed additional screeners to our primary grade students beyond AIMSWeb to help us narrow down each student's specific area of need. Targeted and individualized interventions will take place twice per week where students will have an opportunity to focus on their specific need. As each students progresses, they will move through each new skill level. By adding this last step, our hope is that nearly all students will make even bigger strides in their reading skills.

On the next page there are two pictures. The first one is of the specific skill binders full of mini lessons and specific practice activities. As students master each skill, they will move on to the next binder. The second picture is of an example practice page from a skills binder working on short vowel digraphs of beginning and ending sounds. Having all our students receiving the same research and evidence-based content two times a week will should help all our students to continue their reading improvement.





I hope you feel as good as I do about your child's reading progress. We will continue to make it a focus and do our best to help each student meet their potential. We will be getting a new reading curriculum for next year and are in the process of evaluating new materials for purchase with the help our ESU2 ELA representatives. There will be some piloting of new materials this winter in Miss Jones, Mrs. Walling's and Ms. Fredrickson's classrooms.
