It's hard to believe that it is already March. Hopefully Spring is right around the corner. I always enjoy writing this newsletter because I get to focus on the success for our students!

In the beginning of February, our middle and high school band students had the opportunity to participate in Solo/Ensemble. Twenty-three students were awarded Division I honors (the highest) and Nineteen students were awarded Division II honors.

From February 15<sup>th</sup> – 19<sup>th</sup>, 39 of our high school students took part in the Michigan Youth In Government conference held in Lansing. If you have not heard of MYIG, it is a state conference in which student throughout the state come together to form a mock government. We are one of a few organizations who are granted full use of the State Capitol for two days. It is a wonderful opportunity for our kids. At the conference, Maddie Begovac was selected to attend the National Conference on National Affairs in North Carolina this summer. Maddie also successfully passed her bill through both chamber of the legislature and it was signed by the Youth Governor. Successfully passed bills at the conference are passed on the actual State Legislature for consideration.

Over the weekend our middle school Science Olympiad team competed at the Regional Competition at Northern Michigan University. Our middle school team finished in 2<sup>nd</sup> place and now move on to the State Competition at Michigan State University in April! Our high school team placed 4<sup>th</sup>. This year, the State Science Olympiad Organization has decided to invite any student who finished 1<sup>st</sup> at Regionals to attend the State Competition. This means that many of our high school students will be moving on to the State Competition.

Congratulations to all of our academic extracurricular students on their success!

This is the time of the year when we start planning our Sinking Fund projects for the summer. As you might know, last summer we updated the high school gym with new bleachers and a redesigned floor. This summer we will be moving back up to the roof to replace the gym room and about 15,000 square feet of old roof. The last 9 years of sinking fund have made a huge impact on the district. I hear from visitors all the time how nice our school looks. I want to thank you all again for supporting our Sinking Fund "renewal" this past fall so that we can continue to make improvements to our facility.

Lastly, I would like to congratulate Sophie Valima and Maddie Begovac on being named Valedictorian and Salutatorian of the Class of 2023. Their hard work and dedication to their studies should be commended.

#### **Continuing and Expanding the LIFT-UP Project**

You may remember that during the previous school year the students of the Agriculture and Forestry (Ag/F) class participated in MSU's LIFT-UP (locally integrated food teams of the upper peninsula) program where these students identified different means to increase the amount of locally grown produce served in our cafeteria. This program is facilitated through a collaborative effort between MSU and MARESA. After careful planning and itemizing costs, we were granted the maximum amount of \$2000 to implement our plan. The projects completed by the end of last year were:

- \*Creating indoor growing systems for growing various greens during the winter months
- \*Transferring waste heat from the boiler room to the hoop house through an underground insulated pipe
- \*Creating a series of posters to be used as an educational tool to promote healthy eating habits
- \*Installing an automated system of drip irrigation in the hoop house to increase produce and labor efficiency

One of the goals of the LIFT-UP project is to be student driven with as little adult intervention as possible. This requires a great deal of discussion and planning from the students because any plan proposed must fall within our budget and must be accomplished by year's end. As a teacher, I feel these experiences are invaluable so I was very happy to hear that not only would the project be extended to another school year, the amount of grant money available would be increased to \$5000.

This October saw the Ag/F students brainstorming another round of ideas with even loftier goals than before and it was not until January that we were ready to submit the proposal to the review committee. All of the committee members had a few questions and concerns, but in the end approved the student's four-part plan.

This year's projects are as follows:

- \*Expand the indoor growing systems to increase produce production, increase the productivity of our "spring starts", and include elementary classes who wish to participate
- \*Till a large area of ground just south of the hoop house to grow root crops during the summer in preparation for the upcoming school year. A student hire would be responsible for the care of these crops throughout the summer.
- \*Build a polycarbonate wall to section off the east 12 feet of the 48-foot-long hoop house to create a smaller area to be heated from the boiler room waste heat. This area will be used for hardening spring starts and possible elementary class projects.
- \*Work with Full Plate Farm in Dukes to grow a year's supply of potatoes for the cafeteria. The Ag/F students will travel to the farm in the spring to plant all
  - of the potatoes and the next year's class will again go there in the fall to harvest, wash and crate this crop. During the summer, the workers of Full Plate Farm will tend the developing potatoes and Superior Central will purchase this crop at a reduced rate due to the amount of labor the students will provide.

This is a lot to accomplish in the remaining school year so we will begin work very soon. Look to future newsletters for updates.

#### **News from Superior Central Board of Education**

Greeting from the School Board as we enjoy longer days and the race to spring. To catch up on our last election, I want to most sincerely thank Sally Richards, Jennine Mallory, and Lindsey Crick for their excellent service on the board. It was great to have young members of the community that were willing to serve with new ideas and perspective. After the election we enthusiastically welcome Matt Rondeau, Nicole Aho, and Josh Trader as new members to the board and reelection of Skip Rutter and Ben Bartlett to the board. It is also critical that we recognize the support the community has demonstrated by passing a second 10 year sinking fund. These are the funds (about \$200,000 per year) that the school has used to make facility improvements. Most of these facility upgrades have been planned, but the funds have also "bailed" out the school when the heating boilers and sanitary system pumps failed unexpectedly. We still have some roofs to re-roof, classrooms to up-grade, a parking lot to repair, and who knows what other surprises that could not be covered by our modest maintenance budget. Thank you for your support of YOUR Superior Central Schools.

We welcome your attendance at our regular board meetings, usually, 3rd Monday, 7pm in Library and invite your public comment. In addition to the regular board meetings, we have been scheduling a "Focus Forum" at 6 pm before the board meetings. The purpose is board education around a particular topic; February's topic is Academics and Testing and the March topic will be Athletics, Sports, and Extracurricular with an opportunity for the public to also participate in the sessions. The regular board meeting focuses on the business of running the school and the forums provides more opportunity for discussion and board, staff, and public interaction. We welcome your attendance.

There's a saying that it "takes a village to raise a child". Maybe, but I know for sure that it takes a community to support a school to educate that child. #### **ROBOTICS IN TECH 7**

This year, the 7th grade Tech class received a grant to purchase robotic chips and cars to learn computer programming with engineering and math components. The students assembled mini robotic cars and learned how to program the cars to use sensors to stay on a track and avoid obstacles, similar to technology used in real-life automobiles. The students enjoyed making the cars travel specific distances, code infra-red remote controls, turn, stop, and reverse depending on certain programming parameters. During the semester, the students used mini robotic chips called Micro:bits to make various STEM projects, including "Fitbit" step counters, random algorithm board games, engineered pets based upon specific specifications, and designed fidget cubes.





#### A Milestone in Building Boats

The Natural Resources and Watercraft Design Class first began in the fall of 2015. With 10 students our goal was to incorporate the study of our natural resources with the building and use of one 13 ft. pirogue per student. Then in the spring of the year, use those boats on a local body of water as we continued our environmental studies. It was a great learning experience for all of us. The students had never built a boat before, and I had never built boats with a group of students before. However, on a beautiful late May day, every student

launched their pirogue onto the Au Train Basin and we spent 3 amazing days paddling, listening to guest speakers, eating camp food by the fire and paddling our boats. To this day it was by far the nicest weather we have ever experienced on our spring trip.

During the course of that first year I was never thinking about the future of the class. The funding for building materials for that first class came from a Lake Superior Watershed Partnership grant and a contribution from Renewable World Energies. Thankfully, financial assistance came from the community the following year and this unique class found its way onto Superior Central's schedule once more. This assistance continues to this day and I am very thankful that our community sees the value of this program.

This year's current class is composed of 19 students and besides continuing our environmental studies, are of course building individual pirogues. I am very happy to say that the construction of these boats is complete and we begin building paddles and painting the boats this week. This is significant to me because it marks the passing of our 100th boat built at Superior Central. To be specific, 108 since 2015.

Since 2015, each of these students should be proud of the skills they acquired and the work they invested to create their craft. I hope they find as much enjoyment from their use and time outdoors as I have.
