Immunization Legal Update

“Plaintiffs’ objection to the repeal constitutes an affirmative choice to opt-out of public, private and parochial schools – not a unilateral action on the part of defendants that interferes with or alters their rights under the IDEA,” Judge Allyne R. Ross of the Eastern District of New York wrote in a decision released on Monday. *“As a result, and for the foregoing reasons, they are not entitled to either a preliminary injunction or a stay-put order, and their motion is denied.”*

Plaintiffs’ objection to the repeal constitutes an affirmative choice to opt-out of public, private, and parochial schools—not a unilateral action on the part of defendants that interferes with or alters their rights under the IDEA. As a result, and for the foregoing reasons, they are not entitled to either a preliminary injunction or a stay-put order, and their motion is DENIED. (Politico, August 25, 2019)

What is the deadline for first dose vaccinations if my child is not attending school until September?

The Department encourages parents and guardians of all children who do not have their required immunizations to receive the first dose in each immunization series as soon as possible. The deadline for obtaining first dose vaccinations in each immunization series for children attending school in the fall is 14 days from the first day of school or enrollment in child day care. Within 30 days of the first day of school, parents and guardians of such children must show that they have scheduled appointments for all required follow-up doses. 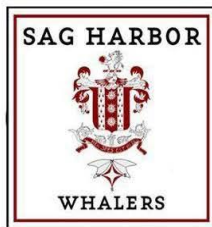

Once the district has determined during the 2019-2020 year which metrics it would like to focus on for measuring success, it can then in later years assess the district's success based on those metrics and determine areas for improvement. - (a) SHES: Roll out updated AimsWeb assessments for English and Language Arts and begin to use AimsWeb assessments to help make more informed decisions about mathematics instruction.
 - (b) MS/HS: Look to improve student achievement through an analysis of assessment data including, but not limited to 3-8 NYS, regents, IB, AP, SAT and ACT assessments and formal observations. Findings will be used to target professional development, schedule adjustments and staffing assignments.
 - (c) MS: Continue to implement and expand the PLANT (Preparing Learners for a New Tomorrow) Program by spiraling into all other disciplines the tenets of this curriculum, continue the program into the second year, and curriculum planning in order to have a culminating project for students graduating middle school for the 2020-2021 school year.
 - (d) HS: Implement revised student government/student council to create a high functioning, educational student government program.
 - (e) District: Continue to provide professional development for Next Generation Learning Standards based on student assessments and feedback from progress monitoring (SHES, MS/HS, PPS).
 - (f) District: Hold board of education workshops and discussions to learn about particularly valuable data sets and success metrics.

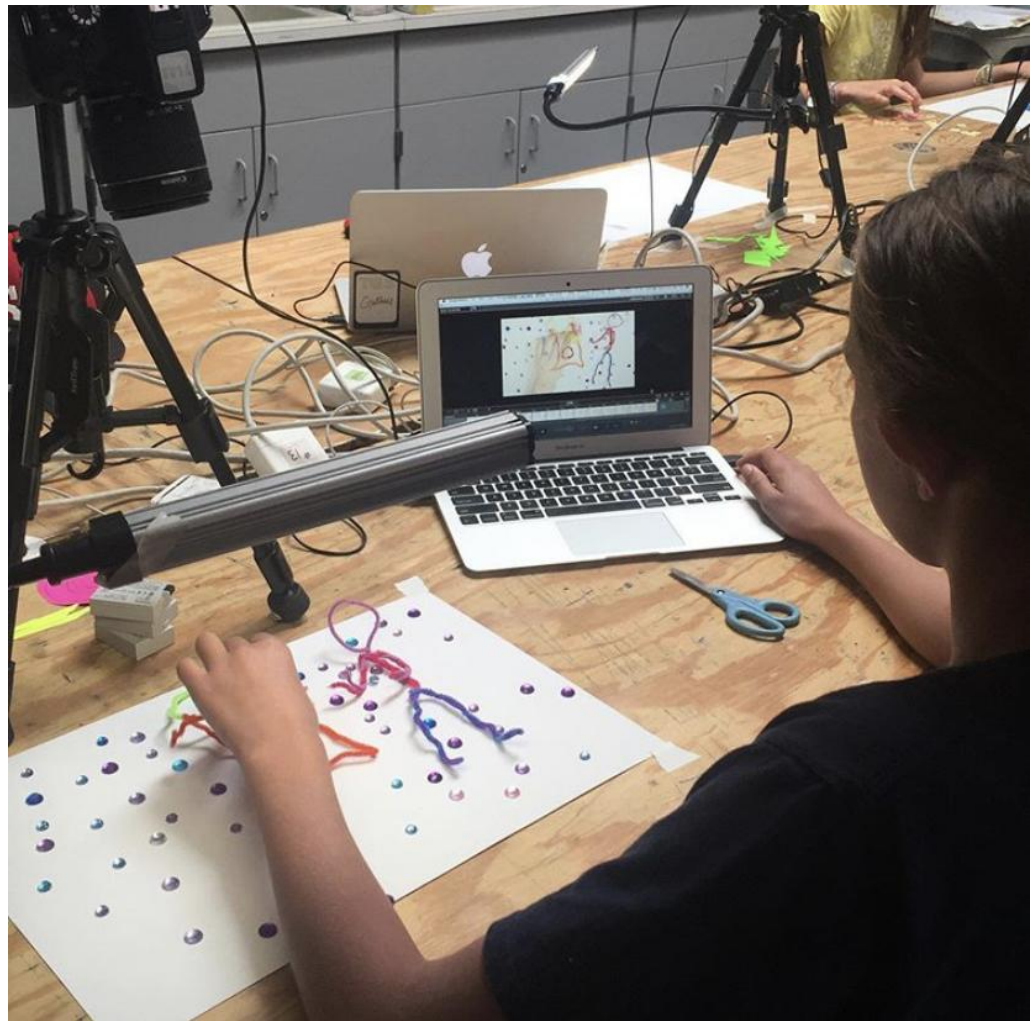



Town of Southampton Addiction and Recovery Committee Tips for Parenting Alcohol and Drug Free Kids

Research tells us a lot about how the adults in a community can help keep our youth from using alcohol and other drugs. The data also tell us that students who are drug free show significantly better school achievement, are more active in their school community, and show fewer symptoms of stress, anxiety, and depression. This sheet shares with you some of what the research tells us. It also includes feedback from Southampton Town youth – straight from the kids themselves.

Proven parenting strategies – starting at an early age

- **Set Clear Rules** – Make sure children are clear about what you expect from them, what the consequences are when rules are broken, and then follow through with consequences when this happens. Talk to your children about why these boundaries are important in keeping them safe and healthy. Although they may resist, they actually feel more comfortable when limits are set and enforced.
- **Know Your Child's Friends** – Knowing your child's friends – even as they get older – is one of the most effective ways to keep them from harmful behaviors
- **Know where your children are** – Statistics prove that even asking your child where they are going when they go out greatly reduces risk behaviors
- **Talk with other parents about their policies when it comes to alcohol in their home** - It's uncomfortable we know, yet important, especially if your child is spending the night there

- **Family Meals** – Sharing a meal together, even as little as 2 times a week, significantly reduces youth risk behaviors
- **Regular bedtimes** – A regular bedtime on school nights has many benefits – decreases in behavioral problems, symptoms of stress/depression, and weight problems; and increased focus, concentration, and school achievement
- **Be a positive role model** – youth tell us that an involved family is the #1 factor in keeping them from risky and harmful behaviors. An example is to host one party a year without alcohol to show them how to have fun without the use of substances
- **Become a detective** – If you become concerned, look for the following indicators of potential problems:
 - ✓ Significant changes in activities, friends, grades, sleep patterns
 - ✓ Mood swings
 - ✓ Secretive behavior
 - ✓ Missing work or school
 - ✓ Morning sickness, diarrhea, or constipation
 - ✓ Nodding off or sleeping sitting up
 - ✓ Lack of cash with no evidence of how it is spent
 - ✓ Missing money in home

Be aware of other signs of drug use – water bottles/caps, cotton balls/cigarette filters, straws, glass pipes, rolled currency, bent or burnt spoons, small pieces of aluminum foil, syringes/syringe caps, dime bags, lighters/candles, small rubber bands, tourniquet materials, cigarette burns on clothes, carpet, furniture, juul cartridges (looks like USB drive), vape pens, thermoses, missing/depleted home alcohol supply, visine/eye drops.

There is some good news in the research:

Overall alcohol and drug use is decreasing among students; and some bad news – those that are using tend to use more heavily and more often, and the harmful effects of use are more pronounced. We also know that the drugs available today are increasingly harmful – one example is that one juul cartridge contains as much nicotine as an entire pack of cigarettes. New substances are always emerging, including a dangerous new herb called Kratom, challenging us to stay vigilant and informed. Also, although many don't perceive alcohol as a dangerous drug, it remains the #1 killer of our youth.
