A Message from Douglas Premo, Superintendent

Dear Parents, Residents, and Community Members:

The 2022-23 school year has begun with a welcome return to fully normal operations of our school district. It has felt different this year in a very positive way. For this our entire school community is thankful, and we are off to a great start.

As we look to the future, the District is currently in the very beginning phases of planning our next Capital Improvement Project. While the District just completed a large and historically significant single-campus project with the addition of a new elementary school, it has been approximately 20 years since a renovation project was focused on the original campus that opened in 1963. Therefore, the main aspect of any upcoming capital project will lean heavily towards improvements to our original, or current middle-high school, part of the building. At this time our State Aid for renovations is approximately 85%. When this State Aid is coupled with the district monies already set aside in a Capital Reserve, it would be our goal to complete any new project with a 0% local tax impact.

As part of this process, we are currently reviewing our Building Conditions Survey and have started meeting with internal stakeholder groups as we work to learn what items should be focused on in the next project. Sometime in late winter or early spring, the District will be holding a Public Hearing to hear from our community as part of this initial planning and information gathering process. If all stays on schedule, a public referendum may be put forth to the voters in the fall of 2023.

Also, as we begin November it is a time of thanks and appreciation. Therefore, I wanted to take time to say thank you to a few groups of people.

First, at the October 18th Board of Education meeting, we took the time to celebrate volunteerism and recognized our South Lewis Board of Education members. Collectively, the South Lewis Board of Education has over 70 years of service. Below is a list of our BOE members along with their years of service.





Do you know how difficult it is for kids to get books in Finland? Did you also know that in Thailand they have an elephant delivering books, and some countries even have a Biblioburro?! How cool would that be to get books delivered to you by animals?! Our third graders will be learning all about how kids across the world gain access to books. Ask them about some other countries we explored! It made us all feel fortunate to have easy access to books both online and in person at all of our libraries.










3rd Grade AIS with Mrs. Abrial and Mrs. Lemieux



Third Grade AIS students have been hard at work this 2022-2023 school year!

We have done lots of math and reading work to help exercise and grow our brains so far this year! In math with Mrs. Abrial, students have been building their fact fluency (memorizing math facts quickly) and number sense (understanding numbers and their relationships, such as how many tens are in 56 and picturing what is happening when you multiply numbers together).

HELPFUL TIPS FOR PARENTS (Encourage your child to...)

MATH

create dances, songs, or chants to help memorize math facts

- say "3 groups of 6" NOT "3 times 6" for 3x6
- label the parts and whole in word problems and determine what still needs to be found
- draw a picture to help understand math problems
- practice using the RDWW (read, draw, write a number sentence, write a word sentence) strategy when solving word problems

WRITING

- write creative stories or poems
- use challenging words instead of sad (depressed, miserable), mad (furious, perturbed), and happy (delighted, ecstatic)
- when spelling words, stop and think about different letter combinations that make each specific sound (ex: ay and ai make the long a sound); try different combinations and see which one looks correct
- write challenging words from a text and practice spelling, saying, and defining them

READING

- · read every night
- break words apart by locating the vowels and determining what sound the vowels will make (if a vowel is at the end of a "chunk", it will usually say its name and if it's not at the end, it will usually make the short sound); check to see if the vowels are with another letter to make it say a special sound, like ow, ar, o e
- draw a picture of what happened in a specific chapter or paragraph
- make inferences (think beyond what the text says) about WHY a character might react or feel a certain way
- find clues/evidence (a sentence or two) in the text to support their inferences
- figure out the problem and resolution in a story
- make inferences about character traits based on a character's FAST (Feelings, Actions, Sayings, and Thoughts)

Reading with Mrs. Abrial and Mrs. Lemieux

In reading groups, students have been working on their decoding skills (breaking apart and sounding out a word). They have also been learning about how to tell whether a vowel makes its long or short sound, depending on where it is in a word. Remember: The more you practice reading, the better you become at it!

Fourth grade has been busy so far this year in their new classrooms. Some of the many things that we have learned about in science are the human body and light & sound waves. The students love using Mystery Science during science. In social studies we have learned about geography, New York Native Americans, and the Revolutionary War. In math, we've been working on place value, measurement, and multiplication. We are using all of these skills to solve multi-step, real life problems. For ELA, we are working on nonfiction text features and story elements. The 4th grade also completed a cross country run and hiked up Bald Mountain. We are having a wonderful and eventful year in 4th grade!





Mrs. Herring's Resource Room

Hello! I am excited for this new year in a new position! We are off to a great start. I work with students from second, third and fourth grade providing them special education services in a resource room setting. Already this year, we have established goals that we want to accomplish ourselves, worked towards our individual education goals, and worked on building foundational skills. We work on a variety of academic tasks, focusing mainly on reading skills, comprehension, writing, and math facts. I am excited to see my group of students progress throughout the 2022-2023 school year!





We are off to a great start in the computer lab this year. Students are picking back up their technology skills and learning new things. They continue to work on:

- → Typing Club (K-4); keyboarding/typing lessons. Students are increasing their speed and accuracy.
- → Code.org and Kodable- beginning computer programming lessons
- → Scratch- 4th grade students create their own "video game"
- → All things Google- Classroom, Docs, Slides, Forms
- → Digital Citizenship- learning to be safe on the internet and make good choices while using technology.
- → Robots- using programming skills to complete tasks with the robots (Bee Bots, Dash, Sphero, Ozobots)
- → Mouse skills- kindergarten students are learning how to use the mouse to navigate the computer.

Comprehensive developmental school counseling programs provide education, prevention and intervention services, which are integrated into all aspects of children's lives. Early identification and intervention of children's academic and personal/social needs is essential in removing barriers to learning and in promoting academic achievement. The knowledge, attitudes and skills that students acquire in the areas of academic, career and personal/social development during these elementary years serve as the foundation for future success.

I have many exciting lessons and activities planned for the school year, and I look forward to seeing your students in class. Character Education and the Six Pillars of Character is always a major focus with our students. During the first few months of school, character education lessons have focused around feelings and managing emotions, school readiness skills, and respect.

Falcon Friends continues to be a wonderful opportunity offered to students. The goal of this program is to provide a mentor-like relationship for an elementary student with a positive older role model from the high school. Falcon Friend "littles" will have the opportunity to attend an after-school event with their "bigs" in November!

After the last two and a half crazy years that we have had with the pandemic, I took some time to reflect on what is really important. I know we have had to sacrifice many things during these last two and half years that are important to us. I have seen how this has impacted my own children negatively and brought disappointment to them. So upon doing some reflection, I have decided for my children and myself that instead of focusing on the negative, we are going to have "Gratitude" for the positive things that we have in our lives.

After doing some research I discovered how important the attitude of gratitude is to children. Research studies have shown that grateful children tend to be happier, more engaged with schoolwork and have better relationships. Gratitude also has been shown to reduce stress and anxiety. Finally, it has been shown to increase children's abilities to learn and make good decisions.

Here are some ways to help teach an Attitude of Gratitude to kids:

1) Manners

Teaching children to have manners shows them that we shouldn't feel entitled to things, just because. Teaching children simply to say please and thank-you throughout their day is a good way to teach manners.

2) Make Kindness Automatic

Teaching children to be kind is an important way to teach gratitude. There are so many different ways for them to be kind: giving compliments, helping someone in need, being friendly, donating unused items, volunteering in the community, writing a thank you note, etc...

3) Find the "WOW" in their day

Teach kids to look for something positive that happened during their day or that they did. Encourage them to share these with you.

4) Always look on the Bright Side

Teach kids to have a positive mindset and not focus on the negative things that happen to them. Teach them to turn a negative into a positive.

5) Model Gratitude

Show children how to have an attitude of gratitude by modeling it yourself so they can see it in action. <u>Gratitude</u> goes much deeper than just saying please and thank-you, it's a mindset, one

Elementary Art with Ms. Murrock

Hello, my name is Ms. Murrock and I teach K-4 Art Education at South Lewis Elementary. We have so many talented artists at SLCSD! We have been very busy this year creating lots of Artworks and learning all about the fundamentals of Art. We have been drawing and creating all kinds of Fall leaves as well as learning about the Artist, Georgia O'Keeffe.

In Art class we learn about Art History as well as the Elements of Art and the Principles of Design. The students work very hard on their drawing skills through directional drawing activities and also create Art using Process Art. We have a lot of fun creating and making Art in the Art Room and that is what it is all about! Creating Art!

In the Art room we have positive attitudes and support one another in the creation process. We also use Meditative Art and practice ways to quiet our minds or to release some of those big emotions in a positive way through Artwork. Elementary AIS

We use lots of acronyms in education, so what is AIS? That's a great question, so let us try to explain. AIS stands for Academic Intervention Services. It is extra support for students who are having difficulty reaching grade level expectations in the areas of math and/or ELA. Students are selected to receive this support based on teacher recommendations and testing. Parents are informed when their child qualifies for these services. These services can look different depending on the grade level and teacher. Sometimes, the AIS provider works in the classroom alongside the teacher and other times, the AIS provider may work with a small group of students separately. At South Lewis, we are extremely fortunate to have two AIS providers at each elementary grade level. AIS providers are certified teachers who are in close contact with classroom teachers to provide each student with a quality education.

Our AIS teachers at the elementary level are:

Ms. Hoch and Miss Carpenter at kindergarten, Ms. Barber and Ms. Finley at first grade, Miss Amato and Mrs. Smith at second grade, Mrs. Abrial and Mrs. Lemieux at third grade, and Miss Lehman and Miss Ossont at fourth grade. If you would like to know more about AIS, please contact

Welcome to the South Lewis Elementary Music Room!

With Ms. Chamberlain

We are off to a great start in music classes so far! The following is an update to let you know what we will be working on in music classes this year.

Kindergarten: Students in Kindergarten will be learning the difference between singing voice, speaking voice, whispering voice and shouting voice. Once students understand the concept of singing voice they will learn about pitch direction and working on matching pitch when singing with other students. Students will learn how to keep a steady beat and demonstrate this on rhythm sticks and classroom percussion instruments. They will learn to echo simple melodies and simple rhythms. The kindergarten students will have a busy year learning all of the patriotic songs that we sing together at school. *America, America the Beautiful, The Star Spangled Banner, and Grand Old Flag* are just a few. We will also work on songs like the alphabet song, Twinkle, Twinkle and Mary Had a Little Lamb. We will do listening activities and movement activities to round out our music studies! In addition, kindergarten students are learning about instruments in the different instrument families.

First Grade: In addition to practicing the skills learned in kindergarten, students in first grade will learn to read simple rhythms using quarter notes and eighth notes. They will practice improving their reading skills using classroom percussion instruments. Hopefully, we will be able to get the mallet instruments out this year too! Listening and movement activities are also an important part of first grade music class. They will learn about dynamics (volume) and tempo (speed) as well.

Second Grade: Students in second grade will continue to improve their singing voices while singing in unison, rounds and partner songs. Students will work on their music reading skills while they learn to play mallet instruments like bells and xylophones. They will also start learning about musical "road map" symbols needed to follow along and read sheet music. Some of the "traffic" signs they will learn are coda, repeat signs, first and second endings, D.S. signs and dynamic markings. In addition to working on dynamics and tempo, they will also work on articulation.

Third grade: Third grade students will take their music reading skills to a new level while learning to play more complicated rhythmic patterns and pitches. Third grade students will continue to work on singing voices, following pitch direction they see in written notation with their voices and rhythmic accuracy. Students in third grade will do an in-depth study of the instruments of the concert band at the end of the year. The goal is to help them choose a concert band instrument that they would like to learn to play once they are in fourth grade.

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Fourth Grade: Fourth grade students will continue to develop all of the skills previously mentioned. All fourth grade students will work on improving their singing skills and performance skills. In addition, some students choose to participate in band and chorus. Students are off to a great start in chorus and band so far this year. Band students need to make sure to practice daily. It takes consistent practice to train muscles to play instruments! Make sure to check the instrumental music dojo page for information about schedules and when students need their instruments at school. Chorus is sounding beautiful so far! The music to practice along with is posted in the chorus google classroom.

All of our students are working on being "professional" musicians! They have learned that this means they are focusing their eyes and ears on the speaker, using a clear voice that everyone can understand, and that they are demonstrating their best posture. We also have been emphasizing how important observing the pillars of character is in our class, in our school, and in our community. We sing the song "South Lewis Has Character" to remind us of all of the pillars:

South Lewis Central School, we really play it cool!

Trustworthy citizens, respectful of our friends!

We play the game fair. We always show we care.

We are responsible, and give our best, best, best!

serve as the Board's District Clerk.



High School Counseling Office



Seniors

By now you should have met with your school counselor regarding your future plans. Reminder for Seniors - Get your college application transcript requests to the Counseling Office before Thanksgiving (Friday, Nov. 18th)! Consult the information in your senior packet. If you are still searching for colleges, please contact your school counselor and ask for help. You will apply online to colleges through their websites (www.commonapp.org)

Financial Aid Forms

- 1. The FAFSA is available online after October 1, 2022. Students planning to attend college must complete this form online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. ID numbers must be obtained at www.fsaid.ed.gov in order to complete the FAFSA. Students and parents are encouraged to file as soon as possible after October 1, 2022. It helps to organize records prior to sitting down to complete the FAFSA.
- 2. Be sure to click on the TAP (New York State financial aid) button on the FAFSA application. It will automatically fill in your TAP form for you.
- 3. The CSS Profile, available at www.collegeboard.com, is a financial aid form that many private schools require. CSS profile is not free. Go on the website to see if your colleges require it.

Scholarships

Seniors are encouraged to take responsibility for seeking out scholarships for which they may be eligible. Local scholarships are posted on the High School Counseling Office page on the South Lewis website. Scholarship bulletins are distributed to seniors each month via email. Check the deadline dates. Sources of aid are available in your senior packet and on the web at www.fastweb.com. The High School Counseling Office will be emailing the scholarship bulletin, to the email address of the contact parent in Schooltool, each month.

ASVAB Test – Juniors and seniors considering entering the military should take the ASVAB on November 10th. The ASVAB is required by all branches of the military for entrance. The results tell students where their skills lie, what interests them, if they are "college-ready," and what careers (both military and civilian) match both their skills and their interests. This is a great way for students to start planning the rest of their lives. The ASVAB will be offered again to all interested juniors and seniors at Howard G. Sackett Technical Center (BOCES) in the spring.

10th & 11th Grade - Students should continue their college research using the resources available to them on the internet. Parents who would like to discuss their child's future plans may phone Mrs. Burmingham or Ms. Green for an appointment at 315-348-2530. Visit colleges this year! It is considered a legal absence if a child goes on an official college visit.

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Juniors will review their PSAT scores in class with their school counselors in January. Scheduling for senior year will also begin in January. You should be researching college and career options now. Many virtual opportunities exist for visiting college campuses this year.

The High School Counseling Office has many resources to assist you with your college selection. Please use the following "tips" to help you prepare for college and careers:

- Attend class every day.
- Use activity period to work with your teachers.
- Do all homework and make sure it is handed in on time.
- Take challenging courses.

Sophomores - Representatives from the Howard G. Sackett Center in Glenfield (BOCES) will provide virtual information about programs that are available at BOCES. Students who would like more information about BOCES should speak with their school counselor. The following criteria must be met prior to enrolling in a BOCES program:

- Successful completion of ninth and tenth grade English and Social Studies
- Earn at least ten academic credits prior to attending BOCES
- Junior or senior standing at South Lewis
- Completed application for BOCES with parental consent

These guidelines have been established to ensure that students who attend BOCES will be successful in their program. Students will only have the option to enroll in a BOCES program once they have met their requirements.

Freshmen have had time to become familiar with high school expectations. If you have any questions or concerns about academic, social, or career issues, please contact Ms. Green or Mrs. Burmingham. If you are considering college, you should begin your research. We are happy to assist you. It is important to set college and career goals based on solid information.

Below are the Elks Scholarships which will be due in November (with the exception of the Legacy). Those students interested must apply online. More information is available in the High School Counseling Office. Online deadline is November 14th for the MVS Elks Scholarship. Do not wait until the last day to turn these in and ask for help if you need it. Please print out a copy of the application you submit and give it to Mrs. Bronson by November 4th.

The 2023 Most Valuable Student Award, is open to any senior student and is due on NOVEMBER 14th. For more information and to download the application please visit the following website: http://www.enf.elks.org/mvs

The 2023 Elks Legacy Award is open to any child or grandchild (step-child or step-grandchild) of an Elks member who entered the order on or before April 1, 2020. 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If you are applying for the NYS Elks Scholarship, please complete the MVS application, print it out, complete the NYS Elks Scholarship application cover page, and give the entire scholarship application to Mrs. Bronson before November 4th.
