THE NEED FOR AFTERSCHOOL PROGRAMS

According to the National Center for Education Statistics (2019), there were over 50.8 million students attending public schools in the United States, spread across more than 13,000 school districts and over 98,000 elementary and secondary schools. Additionally, approximately 5.9 million students attended around 35,000 private schools. The sheer number of students highlights the growing issue of children being left unsupervised after regular school hours. In the United States alone, it is estimated that there are seven million "latch-key" children. This is not surprising given the significant gap between parents' work schedules and children's school schedules, which has been over 20 hours per week. Insufficient or nonexistent care during after-school hours has been shown consistently in research to have detrimental effects on a child's social, emotional, and academic development. Children without proper supervision are more susceptible to negative peer influences, engage in problem behaviors, achieve lower grades, and have a higher likelihood of dropping out of school compared to those who participate in constructive, supervised activities after school.

Providing comprehensive, well-organized, and supervised activities during the gap is critical to ensure the safety and proper. The 2020 "America After 3PM" found that children in afterschool




programs have access to activities that complement school day learning, keep them active, build life skills, and connect them to the community.

A great need exists for after school activities that provide appropriate youth supervision and involvement. Academic literature supports that children and parents are well-served by carefully organized and supervised youth programs during after school hours.

A key benefit of Afterschool Programs has been to improve school attendance, test scores, and grades. Participation in afterschool programs have also been linked to a decrease in problem behaviors (e.g., drug use, aggression, gang activity) and increase parental involvement, which is crucial to student success. In addition to providing services to students, 21st CCLC programs aim to

engage adult family members by
providing services that meet their
unique needs. Additional components
offered through 21st CCLC programs
include homework assistance, project



and problem-based learning activities, character education, physical education and recreational activities, and dropout prevention.

The 21st CCLC programs are funded through the Elementary and Secondary Act (ESEA) which has specific aims:

- Provide opportunities for academic enrichment, including providing tutorial services to help students, particularly students who attend low-performing schools, to meet state and local student academic achievement standards
- Offer students an array of additional services, programs, and activities such as youth development activities, drug and violence prevention programs, counseling, art, music, recreation programs,

technology education programs, and character education programs that are designed to reinforce and complement the regular academic program of participating students

• Offer adult family members of students served by community learning centers opportunities for literacy and related educational development



21st CCLC Student Attendance & Enrollment

STUDENT ATTENDANCE

Brooks County High School is located in Quitman, Georgia and operates within the Brooks County School District. According to the latest available Census data 2020, Brooks County, GA had a population of 15.5 thousand people with a median age of 43.6 and a median household income of \$37,516. Between 2019 and 2020 the population of Brooks County, GA declined from 15,590 to 15,548, a -0.269% decrease and its median household income declined from \$38,285 to \$37,516, a

-2.01% decrease. The 5 largest ethnic groups in Brooks County, GA are White (Non-Hispanic) (55.1%), Black or African American (Non-Hispanic) (35.2%), Hispanic (6.2%), Other (3.5)

Brooks County High School is a Title 1 school and is currently serving 475 9th-12th grade students. The 21st CCLC target population is 55 students in grades 9-12 in afterschool hours



during the school year; 45 students, grades 9-12, during the summer program; 50 on Saturday and at least 40 of their adult family members. One hundred percent of BCHS students are receiving free lunches. Federal and state reporting requires the tracking of students in two categories: total enrolled students and regularly participating students. Total enrolled or "enrollment" in the program is categorized by student attendance of at least one day in the 21st CCLC program during the program reporting period. "Regularly participating" is categorized as student attendance of more than 30-days throughout the program period covered by the report. Student monthly attendance for each center Brooks County High School-Summative Report 2022-2023

was submitted electronically and aggregated for reporting by component and category. A total of 124 students registered for Brooks County High School between August 2022 and May 2023. Of 124 students registered, 42(32%) attended 1 hour or more and Fifteen (15) of those students attended Brooks County High School for 30 days or more.

Enrollment data was retrieved from CAYEN After-School System. Table 1 provides a breakdown of students attending 1 hour or more by Grade Level.

AVERAGE DAILY ATTENDANCE

For the purposes of this evaluation, in addition to assessing progress towards regular student attendance, it is also important to explore whether the program is making progress toward meeting the proposed average daily attendance of student participants. The program was working towards increasing enrollment while developing a plan to increase the daily attendance of those students already enrolled. However, despite extensive recruitment efforts, students' attendance was not consistent due to conflicting commitments such as clubs, sports, and jobs.

Providing A Quality 21st CCLC Program Operation

PROGRAM OPERATION

It is required that each 21st CCLC Program center must "begin services within one week of the school start date and continue through at least one week before the end of the school year." The program ended on May 23, 2023. All Brooks County High School students, 9th through 12th, were eligible to enroll in the program. Recruitment was ongoing process. Promotional flyers and application forms were sent to all families at the Brooks County High School Program in collaboration with community partners provided expanded learning opportunities through academic and cultural enrichment program.

During 2022-2023, Brooks County High School began providing services on August 29, 2022, and ended on May 23, 2023. The program was open for 135 program days of after school this school year. Brooks County High School also offered 8 Saturday sessions. The Saturday Sessions are listed below.

STAFFING CHARACTERISTICS

The Site Coordinator, Ms. Lakeisha Chappell relies heavily on well-qualified and experienced program staff and service providers. Brooks County High School was staffed with 1 full-time Site Coordinator who was responsible for planning activities and overseeing daily operations. The academic activities include instruction by 8 certified teachers, small group instruction, tutorial services, test preparation, and computer-based assistance to reinforce and compliment the regular school day academic program. Teachers were staffed in a 10:1 student to teacher ratio.

STAFF QUALIFICATION AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

A top-quality program depends heavily upon qualified and seasoned program employees. Brooks

County School District encompasses a clearly outlined structure. The Site Coordinator, Ms. Chappell
worked directly, collaboratively, and provides steerage and oversight with the site director on major
program choices addressing funding, staffing, resources, and special events.

To support services provided through the 21st CCLC program, Ms. Lakeisha Chappell, Site Coordinator and Ms. Melissa Alexander, Program Director conjointly offered Professional Development to staff. Trainings provided to staff member included formal training on the 21st CCLC initiative, as well as training on specific activities.

PROGRAM OUTCOMES

Academic Excellence, LLC served as the external evaluator for Brooks County High School. The program aims to achieve ten objectives. The first six objectives deal with academic performance in reading, math, and science. The three goals of the program are to engage children in enrichment activities to facilitate the following:

Goal 1: Provide opportunities for academic improvement for 21st CCLC students, so they meet or exceed state and local performance standards in core academic areas.

Goal 2: Improve positive 21st CCLC student outcomes in the areas of character, behavior, and responsibility.

Goal 3: Offer adult family members of students who are served by the 21st CCLC program opportunities for positive involvement and development.

This Summative Evaluation Report is designed to highlight the strengths and



accomplishments of Brooks County High School and suggest recommendations to support ongoing sustainability. Only the students regularly attending the 21st CCLC program are explored regarding student impact data (as per the US Department of Education). "Regularly participating" students are the only participants considered by the United States Department of Education as having received a sufficient dosage of afterschool programming for meaningful impact analysis.

Evaluation Overview

TEACHER ENGAGEMENT SURVEYS

The program successfully obtained responses from the mandated end-of-year Teacher Engagement Surveys, which were distributed to school day teachers responsible for each participating student. The purpose of the survey was to assess whether the school day teacher had observed a change in student behavior related to afterschool programs over the course of the program. These surveys were conveniently distributed through an online link platform. The results of the end-of-year teacher survey, presented in Table 10, are expressed as percentages. The response rate for teacher completion was satisfactory, and teachers expressed a positive level of satisfaction with the program's impact on student engagement. The results assist with guiding the curriculum and suggest improvements for the 21st CCLC Program.

Overall Recommendations

RECOMMENDATIONS:

To address the challenges and improve the 21st CCLC program at Brooks County High School program, the following recommendations are suggested:

Enhance Parent/Family Engagement:

- Develop a targeted outreach plan to actively involve adult family members in the program.
- Offer a diverse range of parent/family development opportunities, such as workshops, information sessions, and family-oriented events, to increase participation.
- Collaborate with community organizations and local resources to provide additional support and incentives for parents and families to attend these opportunities.

Strengthen Math Instruction and Achievement:

- Provide targeted professional development opportunities for teachers focused on improving math instruction and implementing effective teaching strategies.
- Offer additional academic support and tutoring in math to regularly participating students to ensure they meet or exceed local standards.

Increase Program Participation:

- Analyze the reasons behind the low program participation and identify barriers preventing students from attending regularly.
- Conduct surveys or interviews with students and families to understand their concerns and preferences regarding program activities and schedules.
- Collaborate with school administrators, teachers, and community stakeholders to address the identified barriers and implement strategies to boost student participation.
- Explore innovative approaches, such as incorporating student interests and preferences into program activities, to make the program more appealing and engaging for students.


Host Volunteer Fairs:


Foster Entrepreneurship:




