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<u>Principal's Message</u> Welcome to the 2019-2020 School Year

There is an old maple tree at the end of my road that has begun it's turn of colors...a sure sign of the beginning of a new season and directly attached to the start of a new school year. Since we started school on August 28th we've had two fire drills, two Early Release Days, one holiday and everyone is working through a newly revised daily schedule. It has been a busy but very productive and positive beginning to our 2019-2020 school year, a great portent for our time together.

This year we are welcoming three new teachers to WHES. Molly Brewer has taken over the reigns of our grade 5 program. Molly comes to WHES from Chelsea where she taught 3rd grade. Crystal Crowell joins our middle school staff after teaching experiences in Fort Kent, Auburn and Sumner. Crystal will be teaching grade 6 math, social studies and ELA as well as grades 7 & 8 math. Our final new professional staff member is Kelley Capen. Kelley has a longstanding relationship with WHES as her father, Barry King, taught at this school for many years. Kelley comes to us from the Augusta School System and will be teaching grades 6, 7 & 8 reading and grades 7 & 8 ELA. WHES also has two new staff members in our School Nutrition Department, both with considerable experience working in school kitchens. Vicki Dill has come onboard as our new WHES Kitchen Manager with Janetta Jennings joining her as an Assistant Cook / Baker. We want to welcome all our new staff members to WHES.

All parents received a packet filled with important notices and information to complete and send back to the school. One of the two pieces that I'd like to call special attention to is the **Application for Free or Reduced Lunch**. I encourage all families to consider completing this application to determine if you qualify for this beneficial program. Even if you are not sure if you qualify or you might not want to use it if you did qualify, the school receives certain types of federal funds based on the number of applicants and the number of families who qualify. So, no matter what the outcome might be, you are assisting the school. Please remember that the information provided on those applications is held in the strictest of confidentiality. The other form I'd like to highlight is a brief survey from a newly formed group here in town called **Whitefield Cares**. This group is looking to find out about community services that families use or would desire to have available. The survey is on orange paper and is completely anonymous. Your feedback will assist this group in achieving their very worthy goal. Also, Whitefield Cares will hold two public meetings to discuss these topics. Both will be held here at WHES beginning at 6:00 pm. The first will be on September 26th and the second meeting will be on October 8th. All parents are invited to participate and more information will be forthcoming.

Office: Please remember to send your child to school with a note if they are going to a different destination on the bus after school. It helps to avoid last-minute phone calls to the school, which can make dismissal very chaotic. We appreciate the advance notice and thank you for not calling with these changes after 2:00 p.m. Also, please remember that early drop off is at 7:30 am. Students should not be arriving at school before then. There is no after school care at this time. If students are not riding the bus or staying after for sports or other school-sponsored activities, they need to be picked up at dismissal times. Dismissal is at 2:20 pm every day except for Wednesday, when dismissal is at 1:30 pm.

Food Pantry: Donations of any kind are welcome! Easiest things for children to prepare themselves include, Easy Mac, individual Chef Boyardee, sandwich items, canned goods (pop top lids), microwaveable foods.

Flocking for Food: The Flock is ready to take flight and enjoy some fall weather. They've been cooped up in storage and would love to travel throughout Whitefield and get some fresh air. We have added some new birds to the flock this year and they are eager to travel as well. Flocking for Food has been a successful way for our school to connect with the community and serves as a dual role to support the schools growing food pantry. We also accept donations of any kind if you'd like to donate directly to the school. Thank you for all of your support...If you see the Flock on your lawn it will be accompanied by the appropriate paperwork and contact information.

<u>Health:</u> Please remember if your child is in grades 5-8 and is participating in school sports a copy of their physical needs to be faxed to the school before they can participate at all. Physicals need to have been within the last 2 years.

<u>Kitchen:</u> There is now an easier way to pay your students lunch bill online! Please go to our school website, under parents is "My School Bucks" and sign up there! Just as a reminder when sending money in for lunch accounts, please be sure to label it with the name of your student(s) and the amount(s) to be deposited into their account. We also encourage everyone to fill out the Free and Reduced Lunch form. It is open to everyone and helps our school get the funds that we need for the lunch program.
