

LIVING CLASSROOMS: Our 9th-12th graders just participated in Living Classrooms, a week filled with unique activities that allowed for community building and experiential learning.

Our freshmen were able to spend a few days in the Mt. St. Helens area observing evidence of Creation and the Flood by examining similar evidence seen following the Mt. St. Helens' eruption. It was a great opportunity for our freshmen to start off the year and bond as a class.

<u>DROP OFF AND PICK UP REMINDERS</u>: First, please do not block the flow of traffic for our neighbors on Rust Way. Please stay over on the right side of the road when waiting to enter the parking lot, but take care to not block the driveways or sidewalks of our neighbors. Second, as you travel through the parking lot, it is important to remember the line nearest the building is for dropping off students, while the flow on the left is for cars driving

through to leave or park in the lower lot. Third, if you wish to walk your child to class, please park in the lower parking lot. It is very important for everyone's safety that you never leave your car while waiting in the drop off or pick up line. Finally, please make sure you look to your left before pulling out of line.

<u>WORK DAY A SUCCESS</u>: On August 24th, over a dozen volunteers gave of their Saturday morning to spruce up DCS. Volunteers worked on jobs such as washing walls, dusting and decorating classrooms. We want to send a HUGE THANK YOU to those who served the school and church. It was a great time of fun and fellowship. If you were unable to attend, we will be having future workdays the first Saturday of every month; our next one on October 5th.

Financial Update:

<u>OVERVIEW OF LAST 4 YEARS</u>: Managing a school budget requires a careful balance of faith and good stewardship. Consequently, I would like to give you a brief financial synopsis of what has occurred over the last four years.

I am thrilled that we have ended each of the four school years in the black (positive). This means that the tuition costs have covered teacher salaries/benefits and operational costs. As a result, we were also able to give most DCS staff members a 7% increase in salary. Although this doesn't pay our teachers what they deserve, it is a step in the right direction.

To help provide for additional purchases outside the general budget, DCS has pursued Title funds, grants, and other funding to improve our student technology, campus security and professional development for staff. Our efforts have allowed us to collect over \$100,000 over the past four years to stimulate these advancements.

Where did the money fundraised last year go? We added 20 more iPads and a significant amount of materials for science labs, while providing professional development for teachers on Love and Logic for classroom management and MAPS standardized test training.

<u>NARROWING THE SALARY GAP</u>: God has taken care of DCS and has blessed our endeavors to increase safety and resources. However, there is one area that I have worked toward but is not yet sufficient. I strongly desire to increase our teachers' salaries. The average DCS teacher earns \$31,000 a year, which is 50% of what their public school counterparts earn. To help address this deficit, DCS has three potential steps to take.

- 1) Increase Enrollment Unfortunately our enrollment did not increase this year like it has the previous three. We will continue to seek to build our enrollment up from 220 to approximately 250.
- 2) Increase Tuition Cost We seek to make increases as minimal as possible. Over the past couple years, we have made only moderate increases of 2-3% to match inflation. These increased funds unfortunately allow us to maintain status quo but do not provide extra funds to allow for a salary increase for our hard-working staff. Therefore, I do not see increasing tuition as a viable option for increasing teacher salaries.
- 3) Seek Outside Revenue Sources We are currently investigating the possibility of partnering with a development professional, who would pursue additional revenue streams for the school. This option appears to have the best financial outlook. If you have other ideas, please let the school office know and we will investigate them.

We have a great opportunity coming up to honor our grandparents. On Friday, October 18th, DCS will host our annual **Grandparents Day!** A special program designed just for them that will showcase our school and the kids. This event will run from 10:15 A.M. until 12:00 P.M. All students will dismiss from school at noon. Please begin to invite your grandparents or adopt a special stand-in. To help make this day more student-focused, DCS is partnering up with Damascus Dairy Queen for a lunch fundraiser from 11 AM to 2 PM. All proceeds will go toward tuition assistance.

Parent Corner: Sleep is Key for Surviving Adolescence

Could it be that adequate sleep is the 'magic pill' that helps kids survive adolescence? Could it really be that simple? It's not likely that simple, but there does appear to be a protective effect against some significant adolescent issues for teenagers who receive adequate sleep.

A review of recent research involving teens and the sleep they get (or don't get!) shows a fascinating connection between inadequate sleep and a broad range of issues many adolescents struggle with.

Studies have linked inadequate sleep in teens to:

- Increased occurrences of depression A less healthy diet
- Increased suicidal thoughts and behaviors Headaches
- Daytime drowsiness and inattention Moodiness
- Poor school performance High blood pressure
- Increased at-risk behaviors A higher rate of obesity
- Impaired cognitive development Increased sport injuries
- Increased rate of bullying Increased rate of auto accidents

It's unlikely that all teen problems will disappear if kids simply get enough sleep. Still, the science tells us the links between inadequate sleep and these problems have been established; so, it seems reasonable to believe that for at least some teens, adequate sleep may be a key to resolving some of the most problematic issues they face.

At minimum, parents with teens facing these issues should at least ask themselves the question, Does my teenager get enough sleep? And if the answer is no, they should seek to help their teen begin getting the sleep they need.

Research has also identified some teen behaviors that have been linked as contributors to inadequate sleep. The list includes:

- Caffeine intake A high rate of video gaming
- A high rate of texting Taking cellphone to bed
- A high rate of viewing video (television, online, or via hand-held devices)

Obviously, parents cannot force a teen to sleep. But parents can take steps to reduce behaviors known to contribute to a lack of sleep.

The accepted recommendation is that on average a teen should get between eight and nine hours of sleep each night. In reality, each teen is unique and some will require a bit more sleep and some a bit less.
