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# Our Path Topic

At the beginning of the year the vision of *First Choice* was shared and what it means overall. If you recall, it means WASD is working to be a parent's first choice for their child, the community's first choice for the investment and attracting of new people and businesses to the community, an employee's first choice of where to work, and a student achieving his/her first choice of what they want to do when he/she graduates. This is a massive, complicated and complex vision for WASD. Nevertheless, it is realistic and achievable.

First Choice for students is about career development, mass customized learning (focus on time and place), personalized learning (focus on curriculum and instruction), stakeholder first choice, and a change in the educational environment of a school district. The unfortunate thing is not having a lot of control over the state and federal level. Regardless, it should not deter a district from pursuing *First Choice*.

Planning, processes and measurement must be developed from Pre-natal through post-secondary. It is not just 9-12, secondary, or even K-12. It is a development of a community's way of life or culture for education. The vision could take a decade to realize. If you look at measuring a parent's expectations of their child upon graduating when registering for kindergarten, that data won't be complete until graduation. Did we meet the parent's expectation? Research has shown it takes 7-10 years to transform an organization.

First Choice is a different way of thinking. It should look different in every school district depending on the community's needs and wants. Again, it will take time develop; and, that is what you should want. Education could look very different or similar than now. It can mean different things to different people. Nevertheless, it is a way to design an educational system inside out—referring to being designed by the District and its stakeholders, and not the canned programs that education tends to gravitate, typically. It is a shift in power, authority and control; and, more customer-focused.

As we move forward, you will see some progress, and times that it seems there is no progress. The purpose is to take the time to do it right and consider every group of people involved. If not, it will not work or stick, and that happens too much in education.

Every so often, I will try to devote a weekly update to the First Choice vision in order to help everyone understand what it is, why, and where it is going; including progress we make.
