Our Path Topic

One major initiative that has been put in place this year and getting some traction is Early Childhood Education. Last Spring, Barb Martin, Hooverville Principal, submitting a grant for \$143,000 to fund an additional pre-school program. The grant program was called the P3 Initiative. P3 stands for Pre-Natal to 3rd Grade. The purpose is to provide more quality childcare for young children whose parents cannot afford such opportunities.

Waynesboro has over 600 children that qualify. Only 91 of those children attended a program of five classes. Thirty-four of those kids were as a result of the P3 Grant. So, over 500 children qualify for such classes, but do not have the means to attend, or the parents choose not to send them.

Head Start is also a provider for children from low income families to help provide a comprehensive Birth to five years old program. This year, a strong relationship and collaboration has been built between the Franklin County Head Start Program and the Waynesboro Area School District (WASD). In addition, a stronger partnership and collaboration has been developed between WASD and some of the pre-schools and childcare providers in the Waynesboro area. The Waynesboro Day Care, The Waynesboro YMCA, and others have been attending meetings with WASD for the P3 Initiative. We hope to continue to work with more and more of our community's pre-schools and day cares over time.

Through our P3 Initiative relationships with Head Start, Summit Health, County Commissioners, and the business sector, another group has been formed to continue the work WASD is doing, but at a county level. Head Start is working to put additional classes in the Waynesboro area over the next year in order to serve more children and families, begin to reach more of those 500+ kids that are not getting the high quality childcare needed to be successful in their future.

Waynesboro's early childhood initiative has gotten the attention of the county. With those mentioned above taking part in the P3 meetings, leaders have started an Early Childhood Education and Family Policy Team for Franklin County. Although the group has not been officially named, yet, this is the referenced name being used up to this point. The purpose of the group is to look at county and state policies, laws, and programming to examine ways to improve development and health opportunities for pre-natal and newborn children and parents. This has been well received by the State of Pennsylvania so much that The Secretary of OCDEL—Office of Child Development and Early Learning (Deputy Secretary of Human Services) attended the most recent meeting. The Deputy Secretary stated that PA is watching Franklin County, and will be contacting the county to help other counties get started on these initiatives for improving parent and child success in education.

WASD is applying for a larger amount of grant money this year in order to offer five (5) additional classes for qualifying children and families. Between the WASD P3 grant and Head Start, the Waynesboro area should see a couple hundred more students have access to high quality childcare and development opportunities. Early Childhood Education from pre-natal to five is an area of need getting more and

more attention by criminologists, politicians, the medical field, and business. It is about time that education looks at the research and starts to get involved.

If we work to assist our prenatal to five years old children and parents to have a quality early childhood experience whether at home or in a daycare/pre-school, research shows that these children will be more successful in school and life. By focusing on changing the community's culture to be more focused on early childhood experiences, our students and schools will see more success in the future.
