The student representative position was created in 2009-2010. Students earn a half-credit for their time on the Board of Education. They can also use the experience as an example of community service on college applications and their resume.

Student representatives are nominated by faculty, and their applications are reviewed by administrators. They are required to attend one board meeting a month during their tenure. They are also asked to give a report at each meeting they attend, and present a final report at year's end.

Miss Herrick said, "I feel I am very qualified to hold this position because I have a lot of experience with formal meetings, and some with board meetings as well. I am also a member of the Pioneer FFA Parliamentary Procedures team, so I have a very good understanding of the way a meeting should be run and how to properly conduct business."

Danielle has been a Wyoming County Dairy Princess, is secretary of National Honor Society, is president of Pioneer FFA, is a member of the soccer and softball teams, and is one of the top academic performers in the Class of 2021. She is also treasurer of Pioneer's student government.

Danielle said she plans to attend college to become an agricultural lawyer.

On her appointment to the board, Danielle said "I believe I would bring a unique perspective, because I am very active within the school and I associate with many different groups of students. I also think that my extracurricular knowledge would be a good asset to the board because it has made me well-rounded and more personable. I have also had the opportunity to make a lot of connections that could be beneficial to the board, as well as the school."

CAPITAL PROJECT 2019: An Update

Summer 2019 was a key time for progress in the Pioneer Central School District's current capital improvement project.


The \$10 million project was approved by voters in July 2018. Work began shortly before the end of the 2018-2019 school year.

Director of Buildings and Grounds Nicholas Titus provided the following update on what's been done and what's yet to come:

Delevan Elementary

■ The drop-off circle has been completely rebuilt along with the parking lot in front. The sidewalks have been replaced and snowmelt tubing was installed in the sidewalks from the drop-off circle close to the playground stretching all the way around to School Street. The new parking lot configuration in front of the school created an additional 20 parking spots. Drainage has been added and improved from the drop off circle as well as the parking lot.

The bus lane sidewalks have been rebuilt with snowmelt tubing stretching from School Street to the loading dock. They also patched the asphalt along Olmstead Ave. in the bus lane.

■ The loading dock has been updated. There is a new concrete slab as well as a new ceiling in place. The contractor also fixed the brick on the pillar at the dock and the bricks around the dock.

The mechanical contractor continues to work in Delevan replacing the burners and controllers on the boilers and tying in the snowmelt system.

Arcade Elementary

The heat pump loop for the heating and cooling system has been overhauled to make the heating and cooling process more efficient. The work was very involved and required removal of ceilings throughout the building to get to the piping. Most of the classrooms were impacted.

The mechanical contractors are continuing to work on the heating components of the system including adding an additional boiler. They are also working to tie in the existing snow melt system that runs through the sidewalks at the bus lane in Arcade.

Numerous plumbing upgrades have taken place.

Pioneer Middle School

The contractors have built the Music Suite practice rooms. They have also reconfigured a classroom and office space in the E-wing to accommodate the upgraded Music Suite.

A set of boys and girls bathrooms were eliminated as part of the project. The faculty bathrooms in the E-wing are now student bathrooms, and new faculty bathrooms are under construction.

The contractors are erecting steel and will continue to work on the Music Suite constructing the walls, floors and an additional practice space. The target completion date is late October. The Middle School kitchen has seen an upgrade as well. The area has been reconfigured to fit a new freezer, as well as a new cooler.

Pioneer High School

The temperature controls contractor is currently working to replace

the building control system. The control system replacement will continue throughout the school year.

The serving area in the cafeteria will be updated this fall during one of the breaks.


Parking lot patch work and catch basin replacement has been done at both the High School and Middle School.

High School Building Turns 50

The building that symbolized the merger that created Pioneer School District opened 50 years ago this fall.

Pioneer Junior-Senior High School threw its doors open to over 1,600 students in September 1969. The decision to construct a junior-senior high school was one of many hurdles the new Pioneer school board faced following the merger of the former Arcade and Delevan-Machias school districts in 1966.

The \$4.6 million building was the first such facility for a reorganized school district in New York State.

Things did not go smoothly when the high school opened. Support staff members had to work out of boxes and had bare bones furnishings, if any at all. Students had to bring their lunches until the cafeteria was ready, and several classes were held in hallways until classrooms were completed.

For seventh-graders and seniors alike, entering this school was a whole new experience. The Class of 1970 in particular faced the challenge of turning two junior classes into one senior class, and to ease the transition, the class had two sets of officers and advisors.

As for those finding their way, specially trained student guides helped keep things moving in the school, which for newcomers even today can be hard to navigate.

Sports teams, musical ensembles and clubs from the two buildings had to be merged into one, and two faculties had to work as one. The first year was certainly not without its difficulties, but they were offset by the spacious classrooms, the large auditorium and gymnasium, and a swimming pool. Even the pool caused a controversy just before school opened, when it was announced that boys in physical ed classes would swim in the nude. That proposal was soon modified.

A dedication of the junior-senior high school was held in April 1970. The school stopped being a junior-senior high with the construction of Pioneer Middle School a few years later.

The Marching Panthers have been polishing up their show since the summer. They finished second out of four teams at West Seneca, with several more opportunities to improve on that showing in the coming weeks.

The group also attended marching band competitions at Jamestown and Medina. They will be at Lancaster (Sept. 28). And after Pioneer homecoming (Oct. 11), they appear at Orchard Park (Oct. 19) before the state Field Band Conference in Syracuse closes the season on Oct. 27.

The Marching Band said farewell to 16 seniors last year. However, many new members have joined the ranks, with the color guard up to 21. Total membership among the middle and high school students is 55.

'Elements of Music' highlights a variety of textures and emotions. It features a rich weave of basic musical elements in an attainable, compelling work. There are various solo moments and a rousing rocking closer.

So far in 2019, the Pioneer Marching Band has two second place finishes and a first place to show for their efforts.

Center for Positive Solutions Celebrates 10th Anniversary

The 2019-20 school year is the 10th anniversary of the Center for Positive Solutions, a resource for families in the Pioneer Central School District. The partnership between families and the district promotes positive change by supporting and mobilizing family strengths.

The Center is staffed by Licensed Master Social Worker Kay Kilburn, and Licensed Clinical Social Worker Sheri Bell-Beyer. In addition to holding social work licenses through the New York State Office of Professions, Mrs. Kilburn and Mrs. Bell-Beyer are both state-certified school social workers. The pair have worked in the mental health field with families and children, and have over 45 years of combined experience.

While the Center for Positive Solutions is a school-based program, confidentiality is maintained by the therapists for all families who participate in the program. Information about any family being seen at the Center is not released to others -- including the school -- without the family's consent. This provides the family a safe therapeutic environment to discuss and work on any issues that need to be addressed.

The office for the center is based at Pioneer High School; however, ALL district families are eligible for the center's free services, which are by appointment. Evening hours are also available.

The Center for Positive Solutions can assist families in a number of ways:

Providing short-term counseling for individuals, couples and families

Linking families with resources in the community

■ Focusing families on common goals by identifying strengths and resources that families already possess

Encouraging and supporting parents' involvement in their children's education

Offering parent education groups

The therapists provide family counseling three days a week -- Thursday from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., Mondays from noon to 8 p.m. and Wednesdays from noon to 7:30 p.m. Mrs. Kilburn has been working with students and families at Pioneer since 1999. She said, "We try to get families in to see us as soon as possible, but sometimes there could be a two- or three-week wait for an appointment."

Tech-free Lunch Periods get a Trial Run at Middle School

Tuesdays are referred to Teacher Tuesdays, and Thursdays are Conversation Thursdays. According to Ms. Prorok, there is increasing evidence which shows student over-attachment to technology can be detrimental to social skills and mental health.

Cell phones and technology have been allowed at middle school lunches for several years, but in an effort to teach students how to socialize better with each other, the school initiated this new program. Teachers stop in to converse with students, play a game with them or eat their lunch.



On Thursdays, conversation talking points are posted on the projector and students talk about them.

On a recent Thursday, the conversation starters were "Would you rather have it rain

nails or bowling balls? Why?" Also, "What is something that made you laugh recently?"" So far tech-free Tuesdays and Thursdays

are off to a great start.

Pioneer Central School is launching a new mobile app that helps students, parents, and community members know what is happening on campus, right from their phones.


"We know that families are using smartphones as a primary means to communicate," said Superintendent Benjamin Halsey. "That's why we've created an app that is custom-built for mobile."



50 Years of Pioneer Field Hockey

A milestone in Pioneer High School sports -- and women's athletics in general -occurred 50 years ago with the debut of the Panthers' field hockey team.

To mark the occasion, the field hockey program will host a special **Alumni Game** at the Memorial Stadium on **Saturday, October 12**, at noon, with all former players invited to take part. The Homecoming Weekend activity will be followed by a reception at the field.

Current Field Hockey Coach Jana Landahl is also a former team manager and player. She is in the final year of coaching (and teaching Health), having taken over 33 years ago. She is retiring later this school year.

Mrs. Landahl said the program has had its highs and lows over a half-century. She guided her 2003 team to the state's final four in Syracuse (still the highest team achievement for Pioneer athletics), and more recently coached the 2018 squad to a Section 6 title.

With a half-century under its belt, Pioneer field hockey has grown and matured, with the addition of a junior varsity level, as well as a modified team for grades 7-8.

"The players come to the varsity sport with much more experience than ever before. And we have our kids in off-season opportunities to improve their game," Mrs. Landahl said.

Valerie Relyea -- "the mother of Pioneer field hockey" according to Mrs. Landahl

-- was fresh out of college and starting a job teaching health at Pioneer in 1969. Although field hockey was not her primary sport, she saw the limited number of competitive sports for girls and decided to take action. Other early sports for PCS girls included cheerleading, synchronized swimming, and gymnastics.

Mrs. Relyea credited former athletic director Robert "Buzz" Chaddock for lending strong support. "He helped us get field hockey going as a club sport, then by 1971-72 we were playing games that counted in the league standings," she said. From field hockey, the choices for women's sports grew dramatically in the mid 1970s, aided by the Title IX federal civil rights law (1972). Soon basketball emerged, followed by swimming, track & field, volleyball, and softball. Later, Pioneer girls played tennis, golf, air rifle, bowling, cross country, and indoor track.

Mrs. Relyea said she is looking forward to seeing her former players at the Alumni Game on October 12.

James Carmody played football, basketball, and track & field at Pioneer. He attended Canisius College and was a volunteer coach at St. Mary's School for the Deaf, where he is now Athletic Director.

Mr. Carmody resides in the Pioneer School District with his wife Karen, and has coached his children in Arcade Area Youth Soccer. He currently coaches the Holland Fire (combined Holland/Pioneer) teen soccer team.

Mr. Carmody established the Pioneer record for longest punt return for a touchdown, and once intercepted three passes in a game. He was the 1988-89 winner of the Kenneth Kittleson Award for outstanding male athlete.

Kelsey Landahl Levine was a field hockey and softball standout at Pioneer. She was an All-WNY and ECIC All-Star in field hockey, totaling 25 goals and 36 assists. She was a member of the state Scholar-Athlete team in 2002, and team MVP and captain for Pioneer's state Final Four field hockey team in 2003. She continued her playing career at Hobart & William Smith College.

Mrs. Levine participated in the Empire State Games from 2002-04, won the Section VI sportsmanship award for softball in 2005, and helped the Rochester Blizzards field hockey team advance to the National Pool title at the U.S. Field Hockey Festival.

Her coach (and mom) Jana Landahl said, "Kelsey's dedication to field hockey helped propel Pioneer into the modern game. She took the initiative to learn through camps and participate with the Rochester Blizzard, then shared that knowledge with teammates. In high school, she organized Special Olympics with the National Honor Society."

Mrs. Levine resides in Philadelphia.

Randy Colling excelled in football, wrestling and tennis as a Panther. As a wrestler, he finished sixth, second and third in his state tournament appearances. He was a three-time sectional wrestling champion. He was a two-time high school All-American in wrestling, a National Wrestling Finalist, and Pioneer's all-time leader in match winning percentage (112 wins, 5 losses).

In football, Mr. Colling was a first-round draft pick (sixth overall) of the Canadian Football League's Calgary Stampeders. He played for the Arena Football League's Cleveland Gladiators, including the Arena Bowl. Other football accolades included All-State and Division II All-American.

Inductees will be enshrined on the Athletics Wall of Fame at Pioneer High, and will be honored at the Homecoming Game on Friday, October 11.



The Pioneer Boys Varsity Soccer team has had a mixed bag of success so far this season.

Coach Sarah Lawson said, "We are currently five and four with wins over Cheektowaga twice, Mt. Morris, West Seneca East, and Olean. We have a very exciting season ahead." She added, "We have two exchange students that joined the team: Inigo Castel-Ruiz of Spain and Lucas Soding da Siha of Brazil."
