

7th Grade Quarter 4 Close Encounters with Text

Unit Overview: The overall goal of this unit is for students to apply all the reading, writing, speaking, and listening strategies and skills they have learned this year. Students will explore literary characteristics to understand how science fiction compares to other genres by reading and discussing a science fiction novel. For the common assignment, students will research a chosen topic that was inspired by one of the novels they read this quarter. The unit ends with students' presentations of the information they learned through this research.

grade-appropriate texts and lessons. Any adjustments and/or additions should be framed to meet the requirements of Stages 1 and 2.



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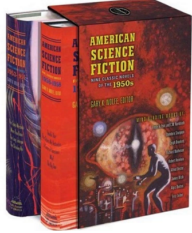
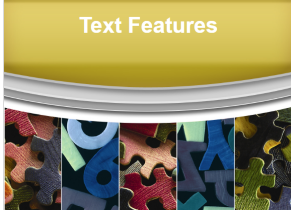
