This book presents an account of fifteen-year-old Claudette Colvin, an African-American girl who refused to give up her seat to a white woman on a segregated bus in Montgomery, Alabama, nine months before Rosa Parks, and covers her role in a crucial civil rights case.

192 pages

Lynn Hirschfield profiles eco-conscious women and girls and discusses their contributions to the environment, providing tips that girls can utilize during their own efforts to become more eco-conscious.

Guts: The True Stories behind Hatchet and the Brian Books

Honey Bees: Letters from the Hive

Reading level 9.0, 212 pages

Honey Bees traces the natural history of bees and honey, focusing on how they have impacted the lives of humans from prehistory to the present.

How Angel Peterson Got His Name – And Other Outrageous Tales about Extreme Sports Gary Paulsen

Reading level 6.0, Fountas & Pinnell level U, 111 pages

Author Gary Paulsen relates tales from his youth in a small town in northwestern Minnesota in the late 1940s and early 1950s, such as skiing behind a souped-up car and imitating daredevil Evel Knievel.

Malala Yousafzai and the Girls of Pakistan

This book is a biography of Malala Yousafzai, a Muslim teenage girl from Pakistan, who advocates for education of women and children, and whom the Taliban attempted to assassinate on October 9, 2012.
