Education Leaders Experience

This year, I consider myself very fortunate to be involved in this program which is made possible through generous support by UNUM in partnership with the Maine Principals Association and Educate Maine. There was a two day kick off event at Sugarloaf on July 28-30. This was an information and activity packed whirlwind affair that involved becoming acquainted with educators from across the state. Throughout this school year, there are six once a month commitments to visit businesses around the state. The first such event was on October 4. We started the day at the Foster Innovation Center at UMaine, followed by a tour of the Advanced Manufacturing and Composites Center. Just before lunchtime, we travelled to Cianbro Corporation in Pittsfield. They hosted lunch then ran us in three groups through short training sessions like the ones they provide to employees in their "Boot Camps". We calculated crane boom capacities, experimented with models of cranes rigging to learn about options for various loads and then wired lights in series and parallel, figuring and measuring amperage each way to see if we were accurate. We learned that Cianbro has become a big outfit with jobs in 40 states at this time. They are lacking huge numbers of workers across their many jobs. This shortage has lead to their paying for training for new employees. This deal can continue right up through master level certificates. This day in our part of Maine was fascinating. There is a lot of amazing R&D happening at the university that will impact the business climate in our state. Next month, we will journey to Jackson Labs, which promises to be just as eye opening. This partnership experience is designed to connect Maine's leaders in education and business. We need to create a climate that entices new businesses and we need to provide a work force that will be sufficiently ready to take on these new challenges. Demographic is a little encouraging. The challenge to retain our youth to live and work in Maine is an important one. It is time to turn around the aging demographics and see the state of Maine thrive.

We have developed a plan for the rest of the year and identified things we will start implementing now in preparation for a full roll out next fall.
