Greenville High School Named International Baccalaureate World School

After a lengthy and rigorous application process, which included an application, faculty trainings and a site visit from an International Baccalaureate Organization authorization team, Greenville High School was recently approved as an International Baccalaureate World School. IB coursework will be offered for the first time in September 2010. The initial course offerings include IB courses in English, Spanish, Latin, History of the Americas/20th Century World Issues, Biology, Environmental Systems and Societies, Mathematics, Music, Theatre and Theory of Knowledge.

There are two options for students to become involved in the IB Diploma Programme. Students can choose to take the IB Diploma, which involves completing courses in six areas: English, LOTE, History, Science, the Arts and Mathematics, as well as completing the Theory of Knowledge critical thinking course, completing a 150 hour Community, Action, Service (CAS) project and writing an extended essay of 4,000 words on a topic of interest. The other option is for students to take courses to earn an IB certificate in a specific course. Certificate students do not take the Theory of Knowledge course, complete the CAS project or write the extended essay.

Our review of the IB program has shown that IB students are well prepared for college, learn great time management and organizational skills and view their learning from a more global perspective. These qualities make students stronger competitors for employment.

Greenville High School will be hosting an IB Open House night on Monday, March 15, 2010 from 6-7 pm in the HS Auditorium. An overview of the IB program and coursework will be presented. This meeting will help students as they begin to create schedules for the 2010-2011 school year.

Student Art Work Displayed at C-GCC Juried Art Show



Students then worked in groups to create traditional medicine masks that were displayed in the main lobby of Ellis Elementary. A research paper using resources in the computer lab and Library became the final product and has been added to each student's individual writing portfolio.

Students worked at home with their family to create projects related to traditional Iroquois living. Models of an Iroquois village or longhouse were the focus of some projects while other students created shadow boxes depicting a phase in Native American life. Seven students chose to bring in an authentic Native American food dish to share with their class.

Greenville CSD Teachers Pursue National Board Certifications

This year six Greenville Central School District teachers have made the commitment to their students, their colleagues, their profession and themselves to pursue National Board Certification. The National Board of Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS) offers a nationwide standard for evaluating teaching. Achieving National Board Certification, the highest credential a teacher can earn, is recognition of an accomplished teacher and is a nationally accepted sign of quality teaching. Candidates must complete a total of ten assessments comprised of four portfolio entries, two videos and six computer activities.

Standards for each of the certificated areas, as set forth by the NBPTS, are based upon five core propositions:

- o Teachers are committed to students and their learning
- o Teachers know the subjects they teach and how to teach those subjects to students
- o Teachers are responsible for managing and monitoring student learning
- o Teachers think systemically about their practice and learn from experience
- o Teachers are members of learning communities

By choosing to pursue National Board Certification, a teacher will become more focused on his/her strengths and on improving practice through the process of analyzing and reflecting on lessons daily. A recent National Research Council study found that students taught by Nationally Certified Teachers make higher gains on achievement tests. Another study, done in 2007, shows that colleagues look to NBCTs as leaders, mentors, and coaches.

National Board Certification advances student achievement and learning, develops and recognizes excellence in teaching and improves schools. "Teachers who achieve National Board Certification have met the high standards through study, expert evaluation, self-assessment and peer review (NBPTS.org)." For the past two years, GCSD has been completing the application and planning process to be approved as an IB school district offering the Diploma Programme to eleventh and twelfth grade students. The Diploma Programme for students aged 16 to 19 is a demanding two—year curriculum leading to final examinations and a qualification that is welcomed by leading universities around the world. Each programme includes a curriculum and pedagogy, student assessment appropriate to the age range, professional development for teachers and a process of school authorization and evaluation. The programmes are available through 2,718 IB World schools in 138 countries.
