Greetings Hillsboro Community. As I write this and reflect on our journey over the past 10 months it is hard to imagine a time of greater challenges in the years that I have been in education. From the Governor's "Safer at Home" order in the spring and our teachers working on very short notice to organize virtual instruction for all of our students, to reopening with all of the unknowns about how or if the virus would spread within schools once we did reopen, this has been a challenging period to say the least.

As our communications have mentioned, we organized a "ReStart Committee" made up of staff, community members and administrators that provided guidance and advice on the steps and processes we should implement in order to return to in-person learning. We have had to make modifications along the way as we have learned more and more about the virus. Even the information being provided to us has changed as the medical community learns more over time.

We have been in our "yellow" phase for several weeks and fortunately, cases of the virus within our school population (students and staff) have remained manageable.

Our administrative team and school board have had multiple conversations about our learning phase. We look at not only regional/county data but also cases within our buildings. As a superintendent, I feel the pressure to thread the needle on this.

I think it's appropriate to share what I consider when making recommendations. Over the past few years we as a district have had a very specific focus on the mental health of our students. We have applied for grants, contracted with Gundersen St. Joseph's Hospital and Clinics and implemented a targeted curriculum on this issue. Consideration of our learning phase is not only a consideration of COVID-19 but also significantly influenced by the mental health concerns of our students. Data showing the increase in anxiety, depression and other adverse effects of isolation students feel when school is all virtual is very concerning to me. Therefore, we have continued to preserve as much as we can safely maintain for our students. We continue to monitor cases for possible spread and develop/maintain our mitigation efforts to the best of our ability but providing the option of attending school allows us to cautiously move forward while keeping the mental health of our students as a priority.

This past summer, we were one of a few schools to be accepted and certified to teach Teen Mental Health First Aid. This program through the National Council for Behavioral Health trains students in grades 10-12 how to identify, understand and respond to signs of mental illness and substance use disorders among their friends and peers. Training will begin in January for our seniors and conclude in March with our sophomores. In coming years, we will continue to train all sophomores so all our students have these skills.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN LEADERSHIP WORKSHOP

On Wednesday, November 11, 25 9-12 grade students participated in a leadership workshop here at Hillsboro High School. The workshop was facilitated by nationally recognized speaker Mike McGowan, who has been working with students, teachers, families, coaches and athletes for over 25 years. Students could volunteer to attend the workshop or could be nominated to attend by a teacher or coach.



Among the topics covered by McGowan were growing up in a digital world, giving and receiving genuine compliments, making connections and acknowledging the positive things in their lives. Students also had the opportunity to deliver messages through McGowan to their coaches who met with Mike and participated in a session later on in the evening. Students and coaches both reported feeling rejuvenated and excited for the future.


COVID -19 has changed a lot of things in our daily lives, one being how we attend school. Families had the option prior to the beginning of the school year to go to school in person or be a full time virtual student. This is new to all of us and has definitely been a learning experience for everyone. Mrs. Bisarek is serving as the high school virtual liaison and has been busy assisting teachers, students and families through virtual learning.



Mrs. Barreau and Mr. Thompson have also been providing technical support.

Both students and staff have had to adapt to new things this school year and one of the biggest changes is the use of Google Meet, a video communication service that allows students and staff to interact in a live setting. Teachers have a google meet set up for virtual students to be able to join class from home while still teaching their students in class as well. Every full time virtual student gets a supply drop for the following week on Friday mornings. Virtual students are required to be "live" during the entire school day and also available for a meeting if requested by a teacher from 2:45-3:30. This is now designated time to virtually meet with students to get any extra help they may need.

Being a virtual student myself has come with a lot of responsibilities. I need to be organized, prepared and able to communicate with all my teachers. I need to stay on task and focused which can sometimes be a struggle at home where there are many other distractions. I know it is not always easy for the staff, but I really appreciate all they are doing to keep us successful even when learning at home.



EXTRA SANITATION PRECAUTIONS TAKEN

There is no question, this year has not been ordinary.

All teachers and staff members have been taking extra sanitary precautions to keep students safe. Teaching staff is required to use a spray sanitizer on desks between every class as well as disinfect any classroom item used by a student. Most teachers have an area set aside in their classrooms for students to place items that have been used to later be



sanitized before another student is allowed to use them. Teachers also keep up to date seating charts in the case of contact tracing.

The custodians have done a lot of work to keep everyone as safe as possible, such as spraying down each classroom Monday through Thursday after students and staff have left the building. Hand sanitizing stations have been placed in multiple locations throughout the school buildings. There is a new hallway system as well, consisting of "aisles" to keep students physically separated during passing time. All students and staff do their part by wearing masks, washing hands, and using hand sanitizer regularly.

With so many changes to daily life, it is no surprise that the high school schedule has changed as well. Students and staff have had to adapt to new block schedules which consists of students having four classes one day and their other four classes the following days. Mondays and Thursdays are "A" days, Tuesday and Friday are "B" days and Wednesdays alternate between the two.



In addition to a new block schedule, students in grades 7-12 have been in the "yellow phase" for the majority of the school year thus far which consists of cohorts. The student body is divided into two groups. The Black Cohort attends school in person on Mondays and Tuesdays, while the Orange Cohort attends on Thursdays and Fridays. On Wednesdays, all students meet in their classes via Google Meet. Some students have grown to like the block schedules due to having extra days to get homework done before class meets again, but some students don't like the idea of having multiple days in between their classes. Cohorts have made this year more secluded as students may never get to see their friends while in the yellow phase if they are not in the same cohort. On the other hand, some students like having cohorts so they can stay home in bed for the other three days.


With the reorganization of football conferences, Hillsboro was scheduled to start the 2020 season in the Ridge and Valley conference.




HILLSBORO WELCOMES NEW STAFF IN THE 2020-2021 SCHOOL YEAR

There has been a lot of conversation about snow days and virtual days, lately. We will continue with the intention of having three, no students work, no adult work, Snow Days. After those three days (if and possible when that happens - this is Wisconsin), we will do our best to have virtual learning days to provide instructional minutes for our students.

After the *third* inclement weather day:

- Administration will communicate to staff the day before a day that has a high chance of being an inclement weather day.

- Staff will only be expected to come in if it is safe for you to do so.
 - •If you are not coming into the building there will be a Google Form sent out that you will need to fill out.
- Elementary School Teachers:
 - •Plan for and send home materials for students to complete **and/or** send chromebooks home with students.
 - •Specials' teachers will post activities for virtual learning.
 - •In the case of an unanticipated inclement weather day, Elementary school teachers will have a <u>professional work day</u>. This learning day will not be made up for students.
- High School/Middle School Teachers:
 - •Chromebooks will already be going home with Middle and High School students
 - •Resume Learning Virtually (Red Phase Schedule)
 - •In the case of an unanticipated inclement weather day, <u>resume learning virtually</u> (Red Phase Schedule)
 - •Support Staff (except custodians) will not report on those days, unless told otherwise.
 - •2 Hour Delays will be handled as they have in the past: start at 10am and schedule will not be altered
