On behalf of the school board, administration, staff and students, I want to begin by thanking you for the vote of support with our recent referendum. The ability to maintain programming for our students and make some necessary improvements to our facilities is greatly appreciated.

As a district, we are continually seeking to grow and improve in our mission to best meet the needs of our students and prepare them for success. The Department of Public Instruction (DPI) generates a School Report Card and District Report Card for every publicly funded school and district in the state. This is one of the ways in which we can monitor our progress and guide our process for continuous improvement. These public report cards are available online at: http://dpi.wi.gov/accountability/report-cards.

If you look at the past report cards, you will see that there has been a change in the scoring. In the first years of the DPI using school report cards, our district had quite favorable scores. We were in the "Meets Expectations" category for each of the first three years. Then, after some changes in how the scores were calculated, we moved to the "Meets Few Expectations" for two of the past three years. Regardless of what measures are used to determine these scores, we can pull valuable information from the reports to guide our improvement strategies.

As a school system, we have to actively seek more ways to improve. We have already begun the process of making some necessary changes. Among these changes are:

- •Use of instructional coaches. We know that quality teaching is the greatest predictor of academic success.
- •Implementation of a guaranteed and viable curriculum. We are seeing academic growth in literacy and math with *EngageNY* and *Wonders* and expect that growth to be indicated in future DPI report cards.
- •Analyzing and utilizing our data and making changes that have a greater impact on student learning.
- •Identifying and implementing essential standards for each grade level and subject area.
- •Ongoing efforts to align curriculum and incorporate best practices into instruction.

Please know that the district is working diligently to make the changes necessary for these scores to improve and more importantly to make sure that we are best meeting the needs of our students; your children.

At this point, we know we need to make changes. Moving forward, some of the improvement we need to make are:

- •develop school improvement plans with specific goals and target areas
- •invest more in professional development
- •evaluate our programming and staffing
- develop learning targets and common assessments
- focus on core instruction
- •implement PBIS and responsive classroom strategies to support student behavior growth
- •create a culture of higher expectations

Benjamin Franklin said "Without continual growth and progress, such words as improvement, achievement, and success have no meaning." We are prioritizing our improvement efforts to first make sure we are providing adequate instructional time and high-quality instruction along with a focus on providing intervention/enrichment to all learners. We believe focusing on these two areas will lead to improvements in the learning of our students as well as improved results in these accountability reports.

FIRST GRADE S.T.E.M

One of our goals this year in first grade is to increase STEM opportunities within our class-room. If you're unfamiliar with STEM, it stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. We want to allow our students more time to explore, engage, become more hands on, and collaborate.

Last year we began this journey by implementing "morning tubs" in first grade. We created tubs of activities that work on fine motor skills, team building, and STEM opportunities.

Students can explore with playdough, build with multiple materials, stack cups, etc. in a group of two or three students. These activities are done each morning during arrival time and work to keep others busy while some arrive, some eat breakfast, and so on.

This year we wanted to include more STEM opportunities within our classroom. The students thrive when working with their hands, exploring, and working together. Our grade level decided to include half an hour of STEM time a week. This extra time for a critical thinking activity has been wonderful! We've seen so many collaborative efforts to problem solve!

A few of the activities we've done with our students so far are:

- Building towers with index cards
- Creating pumpkin slime
- Ghost balloons
- Building with toothpicks and pumpkin candies



Although we're just getting started, the students are loving these special opportunities to explore and create. And as their teachers, we're loving the excitement and learning it is providing!


5TH GRADE PERFORMING ARTS FAIR





HILLSBORO ELEMENTARY CLAY EXPLORATION

The Hillsboro Elementary Art Program is the recipient of the Wisconsin Art Education Association Potawatomi Grant for the second year in a row! Last year Ms. Scharfenberg received the grant to fund printmaking supplies such as linoleum blocks, carving tools, brayers, ink and paper. Last year, the fifth-grade class got to use them for a long term project on endangered species and the fifth-graders this year will get to use them as well! This year the Potawatomi Grant will fund the Hillsboro Elementary Clay Exploration Project. Since the



elementary school does not have a kiln we were able purchase Crayola air dry clay and special tempera paint that will make our creations looks like real ceramic pieces! Each grade level will be able to create at least one clay project this year! Thank you Wisconsin Art Education Association for this generous grant.

Ms. Scharfenberg also received the \$100 Meemic Scholastic Grant to add more *I Spy* books to the Elementary Art Room library. Students love looking at *I Spy* books during free time in the classroom. *I Spy* books promote literacy, looking for details, creative problem solving, and working in groups! All of these skills are critical to the development of 21st century learners and they are all skills that we use in the art room every single day. These new books will surely be put to good use.




Computer Science in the Military

Earlier this month, the computer science class learned about some of the many ways computer science is currently being used in the military. Staff Sergeant Robert Lee Shumaker and Staff Sergeant Brent Mciver provided a presentation on CS technology in the military and gave a demonstration of the Packbot. This robot is a multi-mission tactical mobile robot developed and manufactured by iRobot. It is designed for use by soldiers and first responders to carry out danger-



ous missions in high-threat battlefield scenarios. The robot is controlled by a mechanism very similar to controllers used for gaming. These controllers combined with cameras mounted on the robot allow soldiers to drive the robot in remote locations. After the demonstration, students were able to practice driving this robot using the controller and mounted cameras.
