

### Physics Class puts Laws into Motion

Dr. Bree Oatman's physics class is learning about Newton's Second Law of motion which states that force is the product of mass times acceleration.

Students are carrying out experiments where they design parachutes to measure drag force or use pulleys and carts to measure acceleration. The students will use the knowledge they gain from the labs to design their own investigation about Newton's second Law of motion and how it applies to something they are personally interested in like golf or football.

What's cool about physics is you use math to interpret or explain patterns you observe with the motion of objects and the forces acting on those objects.

Oatman says "Physics is the science most students fear but really they shouldn't. Even I feared physics as a student, and I was really nervous about teaching it."

Physics is about the motion of particles and matter and the forces that drive those interactions.

Physics is the science we use to design safer cars, better

snowboards, or skis. Physics is the science used to prevent injuries in sports and to engineer devices that help support our bodies when they are injured. It is the science that is used to engineer more energy efficient light bulbs, convert food waste into energy, and design electric cars and more.

Oatman would like to let the student body to know that saying things like "Often people psych themselves out by thinking, "I am bad at math" or "I am bad at science" that sets them up for failure.



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

The FAFSA stands for Free Application for Federal Student Aid. Each year that one is enrolled in college or further education, the person will need to fill the form out.

When seniors fill out the FAFSA, they will have to provide plenty of information. The FAFSA has 130 questions about a multitude of topics. These topics include what one's household size is, what one's parents or guardians are making financially, and the number of siblings who have attended college. An estimated EFC must be provided too. EFC stands for Estimated Family Contribution. These questions will then be evaluated and one will be able to qualify for financial aid and grants that can be extremely helpful when paying off student debt.

Besides the use of scholarships, the FAFSA is one of the best ways to help pay for higher education. Because of this, make sure it is filled out correctly. Don't leave anything blank and take everything into account, even if some of the questions sound weird, each has a purpose to try and help you get the most out of federal aid in the circumstances.

Overall when talking to seniors, most feel confused and nervous about filling out the FAFSA. Often times these students feel lost and confused, luckily there are plenty of resources online and in school that can help.
