# Our Path Topic

The 2019/20 WASD Strategic Plan includes two objectives—"To be *First Choice* for Students" and "To be *First Choice* for Parents and Community and continuously improving the District culture and climate." One initiative that WASD has worked to implement "Develop a plan for Social Emotional Learning that addresses trauma-sensitivity and needs of all students."

The plan included two initiatives. One, the establishment of an Inspire Classroom at the elementary school level, and one at the middle school level. The intention of both these classes is to help students who have had some sort of trauma in their lives—as demonstrated in the behaviors occurring every day in school. The second, a plan for training our staff on trauma and its impact on students who have dealt with it in their lives.

The Inspire Classrooms are off and running this year. However, as any new program, there have been issues to work through, and will likely continue to revisit and re-evaluate the success of the program in order to maintain quality. Nevertheless, it has had a positive impact on our schools. The WASD, recently, received a \$14,000 grant toward Trauma-based training for staff. Although PDE has mandated such training for school staff, board members are also required to have such training.

One final note. Another WASD strategic objective for 2019/20 is "To balance fiscal needs with WASD's strategic objectives." Although it is not one of our initiatives for 2019/20, the purpose of this objective is to be able to fund those initiatives and action plans implemented for achieving our strategic objectives. The school board has invested over \$250,000 in these trauma-based classrooms in order to improve the climate and culture of the school district. These classes are improving the educational environment for all students. That is quite a commitment.

WASD will continue to make progress in Our Path to *First Choice* by reinventing ourselves to meet the needs of our students and the demands of society.

# Piece of the Puzzle

This week's Piece of the Puzzle is Deb Forrester. Deb Forrester, the WASD registrar is affectionately known as the "face of the Waynesboro Area School District". Since Clayton Avenue assumed the task of centralized enrollment in 2018, Deb has successfully met the daily challenges of greeting, processing, and problem solving with families who are registering their children in the district. Despite some very "interesting" dilemmas, Deb is ALWAYS pleasant and accommodating and provides a warm welcome to WASD. In addition, Deb has been charged with managing the Clayton Avenue/ District webpage. Deb's thoughtful and proactive approaches have created webpages with up to date information to keep our families and community informed.

## \*Challenge Answer (Important to Know)

Prior to recent legislation, school board members had no requirements for training. After taking the oath of office, board members may have received an "onboarding" by the superintendent, or attended a PA School Board Association's workshop. Today, newly elected and appointed school board directors must successfully complete 5 hours of training. Re-elected school board directors must successfully complete 3 hours of training. The trainings can be done online or in-person learning through an approved provider.

- · Childhood trauma is not necessarily a prophecy of doom, because some children are resilient or because later experiences help to restore mental health.—Richard Bentall, professor of clinical psychology.
- Trauma is a fact of life. It does not, however, have to be a life sentence.—Peter A. Levine, founder of Somatic Experiencing (psychologist).
- Trauma is ubiquitous. In the general population, 67% of us have experienced at least one Adverse Childhood Experience (ACE).. In people of color, that is more likely to be 83%. Also,, 12.6% of the population had 4 or more ACEs.—ACEs Study (a partnership between Kaiser Permanente San Diego and the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention).
