Mrs. Mary Schumacher and Mr. Mark Jacobs introduced the parents of the freshman and senior royal courts as well as the candidates.



As soon as Mr. Tony Biesiot announced his resignation near the end of the 2018-2019 school year, the search for a new Principal began.

Leikvold spoke of the process, "We got started finding a new principal in the middle of June. We went through that process, interview-

ing people, and we offered the job to a candidate. After accepting the job, the candidate made a personal decision that he wasn't going to do it. At the Board Meeting in the middle of June, it was decided that I would be the interim Principal."

"I was willing to do it, I enjoy it. It gives me a different perspective on students. It gives me the ability to be closer to the students wants." He spoke highly of his anticipation of the new role.

The news has been met with positive feedback from students and staff.

Ms. Shirlene Joseph thinks highly of the decision, "I am excited because I feel that the leadership is positive and strong. Leikvold is a seasoned administrator, if anyone can do it, he probably can."

Although, Leikvold becoming principal has not been met with only positive feedback as some students have expressed concerns about the new administration.


Touch of Gold Dance Team Builds Program By Isabel Ward
