COMMUNITY SERVICE VS. SERVICE LEARNING

Community Service

voluntary work intended to help people in a particular area.

unpaid work, intended to be of social use, that an offender is required to do instead of going to prison

(Webster's Dictionary)

Service-Learning

Service learning is a teaching and learning strategy that integrates meaningful community service with instruction and reflection to enrich the learning experience, teach civic responsibility, and strengthen communities

(Learn and Serve America National **Service Learning** Clearinghouse).

COMMUNITY SERVICE VS. SERVICE LEARNING

Community service is:

- NOT tied to state standards
- NOT driven by board approved curriculum
- NOT student voice driven
- May or may NOT lead to learning
- May or may NOT challenge students to apply knowledge/skills
- May be a single event for one hour or less
- NOT Assessed
- NOT given feedback

Service Learning is:

- Tied to state standards
- Driven by board approved curriculum
- Student voice driven
- Leads to targeted, specified learning outcomes for students
- Challenges students to apply their learning - knowledge and skills
- On-going process, can not be completed in a short period of time
- Assessed
- Feedback driven
