make it look realistic". She adds "it was hard work, but it paid off in the end."


The third student inter-

Montana's law prohibits anyone from driving or being in actual physical control of a vehicle when someone has a blood alcohol concentration of .08% or more, with a (THC) level of 5 ng/ml or more, and if under the influence of drugs or alcohol. In the first offence there can be up to 6 months (24-hour minimum) jail time, \$600 to \$1000 in fines, and a license suspension for 6 months.
