# Our Path to First Choice No. 16 2019/20

Everyone,

Here's Our Path note. Thank you for all you do for our students!

#### Our Path Topic—I apologize for the length, but it is an important topic!

Over the last two years we have been talking about *First Choice*. We know it is about each student, or learner, realizing his/her first choice in the next step of achieving one's career following high school. The vision is simple, but the journey is not yet completely defined.

Through a few earlier Path Notes we read how the elementary schools, middle school and high school are addressing *First Choice's* three pillars—Career, Whole Child, and Academic. However, the academic includes mass **customization**, **personalization**, and **individualization**.

The Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE), US Department of Education (US DOE), authors Mark C. Perna, Simon Sinek, Charles Schwann, Beatrice McGarvey and others subscribe to concepts of *First Choice*—including customized/personalized education. Perna and Sinek promote schools and businesses to focus young people on the "Why". "Why are you attending school? Why are you taking this particular class?" These questions and more are Perna's recommendation for personalizing education for students today. He believes today's generation have been raised differently, and have different expectations in life. Therefore, he believes we should meet the students where they are at in interests and focus.

Schwann and McGarvey contend that we must start providing students more **choice**, **decision-making** and **responsibility** in one's own education. In addition, we need to develop students with **self-advocacy**. They call it "agency". When students have more responsibility for their learning and advocates for themselves, they become more engaged. Instead of blaming the students of today for attitudes and lack of engagement, they believe we must take another approach if students are to become **learners**, and become more successful.

The US DOE and PDE both are directing and subscribing to a more career focused education for students from Pre K through twelfth grade. Grants and new programming requirements are reflecting that direction. These departments also recognize the social and mental health challenges students are bringing to school, and are responding with grants, policies, and requirements.

As a district, we are working to have staff embrace this approach in order to achieve *First Choice*. It is a tool to help reach *First Choice*, not *First Choice* itself. Meeting the student where he or she is. Providing them more choice and promote self-advocacy in learning. It is the **MAP** acronym **or Mastery-Advocacy-Purpose**. It is about teachers being more facilitating to assist students in choices in learning and the purpose for what they are learning. When you have the Essential Question on the board at the beginning of class—can students answer the **Essential Question** at the end of the class?

This direction is not going away. This is where WASD is going. This is education 21st Century. We wonder why we reach a ceiling with proficient test scores, and just can't seem to improve more and more. Until we can help students understand the purpose for their education, provide choices, and give them opportunities to master to the level that fits that child's goals and objectives, we will not be successful in the 21st Century as a school system. Students need to engage and learn how to learn.

If we begin to adopt and follow through with the MAP concept of the Academic Pillar of *First Choice*, we will be much more student-centered than ever before. We say we are student focused, but we tend to practice otherwise.

If the doctor treated us the same way for everything and forced no choices on us, we would not likely return to that doctor. As educators, we have to start moving in that same direction. Let's start moving to the 21<sup>st</sup> Century!
