

Evaluate your Education Options

- 5
- Decide on your post-secondary plan
 - What type of school would you like to attend?
 - Four year (Bachelor's Degree)
 - Two year (Associate's Degree)
 - Vocational/Technical (Certificate Program)
 - Military
 - Work/Apprenticeship
- The most important factor in choosing a post-secondary plan is *fit!*
- Detailed information on this topic will be discussed individually with students in individual meetings

Post-Secondary Planning this Spring

- Counselors want to meet with students and families about this process throughout this April
- In those meetings, we will:
 - review your graduation requirements
 - discuss your post-secondary plan
 - provide individualized support around your plan

MHS Post-Secondary Planning Timeline

Spring of Junior Year

- College Research-admissions criteria & tuition estimates
- Prep for the SAT and/or ACT and take the test in May, June, July or August
 - **Many schools are not requiring standardized tests check with specific schools**
- Create a resume-get ahead of this Senior Project assignment
- Think about letters of recommendation 2 teachers
 - Ask teachers now, Teacher recommendation form and Counselor recommendation form
- Attend info sessions and college tours at schools of interest either virtually or in person when available
- Get organized! Create a college file/spreadsheet and a college calendar to write down deadlines.

Post-Secondary Planning Timeline Continued

Summer before senior year

- Get involved in a summer internship, enrichment program, volunteer, or work a part-time job
- Continue to mark your calendar with important dates and deadlines. Be aware of early action/early decision deadlines some are as early as October
- Continue to visit college campuses in person or virtually
- Continue to narrow down your list of colleges (safety, target, and reach)
- Create a CommonApp account at <u>commonapp.org</u>
- Review college application requirements and essay prompts
- The more you can do before the senior year, the easier things will be!

Post-Secondary Planning Timeline Continued

Fall of Senior Year

- Senior Meetings (September/October) Work with your counselor individually
- Take the SAT and/or ACT, if applicable
- Attend college representative visits through MHS
- Continue to research schools through college tours, info sessions, and online
- Secure teachers who will be writing recommendation letters (both in person and through MEFA Pathway)
- Finalize college essay
- APPLY!
- Complete the FAFSA and other Financial Aid requirements-Available Oct. 1st, 2023
 - Attend MEFA financial aid webinar
- Begin to search for scholarships you will apply for

Making the College List



- Academic programs majors and minors
 - If you are considering a few different majors, make sure that the college you choose offers all of them!
- Size 2,000 students is considered a small college, but that is more than 5 times bigger than MHS can be hard to imagine
- Location how far from home? Keep transportation in mind! (additional \$)
- Setting rural, suburban, urban
- Residential vs commuter campus
- Activities & student life intramural sports, clubs, honors societies, etc.
- Disability services

Researching Schools



- Research schools before applying
 - Create a list to narrow down where you need to research-select Safety, Target, Reach schools-consider academics & financials
 - Visit the schools' websites
 - College Search websites-MEFA Pathway, College Board, etc.
 - Participate in virtual visits, webinars, live chat with admissions; follow on social media
 - Visit in person
 - College fairs- NEACAC Fair (May 16 + 23) and NACAC Fair (May 2 + 3)
- How many will you apply to? 6-8, family decision

Standardized Testing Information





SAT



- Measures skills in two sections: Evidence Based Reading and Writing, Math
- Each section is worth 800 points
- Recommended taking once in junior year and once again in the fall of senior year.
- *Next test date offered by College Board:*
 - May 6th (deadline to register April 7th)
 - June 3rd (deadline to register May 4th)
 - Students must register at www.collegeboard.org
- Colleges will superscore (take your highest score for each section)
- Check colleges for test optional policies
- If student receives free/reduced lunch, they are eligible for a fee waiver (contact your school counselor for details)

ACT



- Measures students' skills in four areas:
 - o English, Math, Reading, and Science
- Schools will accept either the ACT or the SAT equally
- Scale score is 1-36 on each section; Composite Score avg. of 4 tests
- Register and prepare online at ACTstudent.org
 - June 10 registration deadline May 5th
 - July 15 registration deadline June 16th
- New ACT:
 - If students take the full test once they can then re-take certain sections
 - Students can re-take up to 3 sections on a test date
 - ACT Scores can be Superscored-All test events will be included in Superscore or traditional full test battery can be sent
- If student receives free or reduced lunch, they are eligible for a fee waiver (contact your school counselor for details)

SAT/ACT PREP



- Prepare for the tests:
 - SAT https://www.khanacademy.org/sat,
 - Free & Authorized by College Board
 - Requires students to have a College Board Account and Khan Academy Account
 - Connects accounts to provide personalized practice
 - CollegeBoard website <u>https://collegereadiness.collegeboard.org/sat/practice</u>
 - ACT https://academy.act.org/
 - Free and Authorized by ACT
 - Daily Practice for SAT and ACT Apps available at your App store

AP Exams

- Taken in May by students enrolled in Advanced Placement Classes
- Some colleges will accept certain scores on an AP exam for college credit

TEAS

 Required at some 2 year schools for entrance into cetain STEM programs e.g. Occupational Therapy Asst., Nursing

ASVAB

- A military placement exam, but also an career interest inventory that all students can take to help determine career choice.
- No military service/recruitment requirement
 - Offered at MHS on Tuesday, April 11 during school hours
 - Free of charge for all students
 - Approx. 3 hours long
 - Interpretation of results will happen at a later date

How do I send my standardized test scores to the schools I am applying to??

- Students are responsible for sending scores directly through the testing agency (CollegeBoard.org for SAT & actstudent.org for ACT).
- When a student signs up for the SAT:
 - 4 score reports are included in the cost of registration
- When a student signs up for the ACT:
 - 4 score reports are included with registration
- We encourage student to take advantage of the free score reports when a school requires the SAT/ACT
- After the test date, it costs approximately \$12 per score sent to each college

Important Things to Consider



- Start with who you are now and where you would like to be in the future
 - As you begin your search:
 - Examine yourself-what is important to you?
 - What are your reasons for going to college?
- You <u>can</u> afford to go to college Don't assume you cannot afford a college based on sticker price of tuition
 - Net Price Calculator, https://collegescorecard.ed.gov
 - Commonwealth Commitment & MASS Transfer
 - MA Independent College Transfer Guarantee
 - Many opportunities for scholarships, grants, and financial aid
 - Often, applications are automatically reviewed for potential scholarship and grant awards

Possible College Application Materials

- All schools will have different requirements, but these are typically the basics...
- Application
- **Application Fee** (fee waivers available for Free/Reduced lunch students)
- Transcript
- **Standardized Test Scores** (these are sent by the student through the testing agency)
- **Essay** (essay question(s) can be found on the application)
- Letters of Recommendation
 - Verify number and type required with each college
 - No more than two teacher letters and one counselor letter
- **Resume** (this helps you complete your application)

The College Essay

- Your essay is about YOU not a generic high school senior. Be creative!
- This is your voice in the application-you could look similar to someone else on paper - transcript, activities, etc. - so show them who you are
- Pretend you are meeting with an admissions representative - what do you want them to walk away knowing about you?
- Follow the directions: adhere to word limit!
- Make sure you proofread! Take it to an English teacher, family member, or your counselor for review.

A quick word about college athletics...

- If playing a Division 1 or Division 2 sport is top on your list:
 - Mandatory that you sign up with the NCAA Eligibility
 Center at https://web3.ncaa.org/ecwr3/
 - Recommend completing this process during junior year
 - Students will create an account and provide information about courses, grades, athletic history, etc.
 - You must have your transcript sent to the NCAA
 - Touch base with your coach about your future plans
 - Talk to your counselor to let them know your plans and if you have any questions

A quick word about ROTC...



- Service Academies/ROTC scholarship applications are in depth and should be started now as a junior
 - For applicable majors/ROTC offered at certain schools
 - Application information is available at each branch of the military's ROTC website
- Full Cost of College + stipend (not room & board)
 - o Application usually due Dec. 1st of Senior Year
 - Service Academies cover all college costs +stipend
- You can do ROTC without a scholarship
 - No commitment until they pay for your education
 - Can apply as a 3rd year college student for ROTC scholarships too

Overview of Financial Aid: FAFSA

- Apply for the FAFSA (free application for federal student aid) anytime after October 1st of senior year
 - Apply online at www.fafsa.ed.gov
- MEFA hosts many financial aid webinars
- MEFA FAFSA Days
 - Held in the fall online and at various area high schools
 - An opportunity to get assistance completing the FAFSA
- Some schools require the CSS Profile
 - Available October 1st- check individual school websites for more information about deadlines https://cssprofile.collegeboard.org/

Scholarship Information

- Scholarships will be updated and added to the Class of 2023 Google Classroom regularly
- Local Scholarship Packet- <u>spring</u> of senior year
 - MANY scholarship opportunities for MHS students
- Online websites such as <u>GoingMerry</u>, <u>MEFA</u>, and <u>College Board</u> are helpful scholarship search sites.
- Be very careful of online scholarship websites there are companies that will sell info-be a critical consumer
 - As a general rule, any site that asks you to <u>pay to</u> <u>apply</u> for scholarships is not legitimate-*some apps do charge a fee*
