# **New Playground Opens at Pioneer Park**

The Early Learning Center at the Ridgefield Administrative & Civic Center (RACC) has added a playground to its amenities. Reserved for district use from 7am - 6pm on regular school days, it is geared for use by our youngest students.

Specifically designed for children aged two to five, the playground includes a large climbing and motor skills structure, four interactive panels, four musical components, logs, stepping stones, and a climbing rock. Landscaping, sidewalks, benches, picnic tables, and a security fence complete the new play area.

It is part of an ongoing series of projects conceived by the Superintendent's Student Advisory Council. Thirteen students began designing and planning the projects in January 2018. Their ideas helped bring about the restoration of the hillside on Fifth Avenue, the installation of personalized, engraved pavers celebrating the historic high school steps on Pioneer Street, and now this first phase of Pioneer Park located in front of the RACC.

The playground equipment was directed/purchased by the district and installation managed by the district's bond consultants and contractors as an added value to current work activity winding down from the 2017 bond. The playground equipment, inspected and certified for safety by an independent testing firm, was approved for use by the State of Washington in October.

Plans envisioned for the remainder of Pioneer Park include additional youth sports fields and recreational opportunities for all ages. Look for more projects at the park over the coming years as we expand opportunities for the Ridgefield community.

# 2020 Bond Measure



Ridgefield School District's 2020 bond measure is on the ballot for the Special Election set for February 11, 2020. With voter approval, the bond will be essential in allowing the district to effectively serve the increasing student enrollment anticipated by 2023-2024. The bond will provide:

- A new K-4 elementary school. With 72,000 square feet of space, the new school will relieve overcrowding at South Ridge and Union Ridge, two of the state's largest elementary schools.
- A new 5-6 intermediate school. Phase I of a multiphase process to build a shared campus complex that would house an intermediate school serving Grades 5-6 and a middle school serving Grades 7-8. Phase I would build a 50,000 square foot intermediate school that would relieve overcrowding at Sunset Ridge Intermediate.

#### · High school expansion.

New classrooms for general education to slow the need for additional portables. A new vocational education building is needed to replace the existing one which is 44 years old. Building new is expected to be less expensive than a full renovation and will deliver a learning environment that more effectively supports current industry standards. The existing vocational education building will be re-purposed to support the district's warehouse and facilities department, both of which have grown considerably as student enrollment continues to increase

• Elementary playgrounds. Accessible, inclusive playgrounds at South Ridge and Union Ridge elementary

# SPOTLIGHT ON SEL: Social Emotional Learning

Ridgefield School
District strives to provide safe,
inclusive, and supportive environments that nurture the well-being of the whole child. To help
achieve this goal, opportunities
to develop SEL skills are embedded throughout the school day
in a variety of ways. This article
shines a SEL spotlight on Second
Step and gratitude.

Social Emotional
Learning (SEL) is the process
through which children understand and manage emotions, set
and achieve positive goals, feel
and show empathy for others,
establish and maintain positive
relationships, and make responsible decisions.

To support the development of SEL skills, all schools K-8 use the Second Step curriculum. Second Step is a classroom-based universal support and typically covers skills such as: skills for learning (listening, focusing attention, being assertive, etc.), values and goals, empathy, emotion management, and problem-solving/peer conflict. The goal of Second Step is to increase students' school success-socially, emotionally, behaviorally, and academically-and decrease problem behaviors by promoting social-emotional competence and self-regulation skills.

Second Step also has a bullying prevention unit specifically designed to teach students how to Recognize, Refuse, and Report bullying behaviors. Leading up to Unity Day on October 23, all students in grades K-6 received the Second Step bullying prevention lessons.

To further support SEL development, several classes at South Ridge Elementary are discussing gratitude. Each week in their classroom, students have

time to reflect on their week, identify what they are grateful for that week, and take time to write in their gratitude journal. Every Friday in Mrs. Stinson's third grade classroom, students write in their journal and have a conversation on what it means to practice gratitude. Many students indicated prior to journaling they did not know what gratitude meant, and since the implementation of gratitude journals, now use it at home and at school. One student shared, "now that we are using gratitude journals, it has changed how I think about things. I try to think about things I am grateful for during the week that I will write in my journal on Friday; when I feel bored, I think instead about what I am grateful

Students also have the opportunity to learn from one another; a student reported that when other students choose to share what they are grateful for, it gives her new ideas and ways that she is also grateful but did not initially recognize prior to the classroom discussion.


