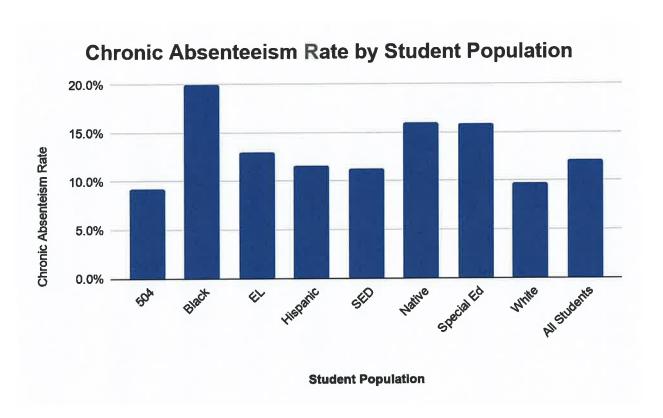

Basic Wildland Fire School

January- May 2020

Basic Federal Wildland Fire Training will be offered to Bishop Union High School students by the Inyo National Forest and the Bureau of Land Management Bishop Field Office. The course will begin in the spring semester of 2020, during period two. This course attains the standards prescribed under the curriculum established and coordinated by National Wildfire Coordination Group and includes certification upon completion of the following:

- S-190, Introduction to Wildland Fire Behavior
- S-130, Basic Wildland Firefighter Training
- L-180, Human Factors in the Wildland Fire Service
- ICS-100, Introduction to the Incident Command System
- First Aid CPR/AED, American Red Cross
- IS-700.B, Introduction to the National Incident Management System (Homework)

Please bring a notepad and writing material. S-130 includes an additional all-day weekend field exercise, which will require transportation and appropriate field attire.

HOMEWORK

In addition to the courses listed above, one online course sanctioned by the National Training Program for National Incident Management System (NIMS) is required:

COURSE GRADES

All courses provided through this class will meet the minimum requirements to obtain the Firefighter II qualification. Each course listed above will have a test assigned. If the student does not pass the test a second opportunity will be given to re-take the exam. Participation, test, quizzes, classwork and homework will determine the final grade.

Test / Quizzes = 50% Classwork / Homework = 40% Participation = 10%

What are possible jobs in this field?

The fire technology field offers you many employment options, including a job as a forestry technician. Below is a list with descriptions of some of the opportunities for employment.

- <u>Handcrews</u> These 20-person teams construct firelines around wildfires to control them, burn out fire areas, and mop up after fires.
- Hotshots These are the most highly skilled type of handcrews and are typically assigned to work on the most challenging parts of wildfires.
- Engine crews These teams of three to five firefighters work with specialized wildland fire engines that carry special equipment.
- <u>Smokejumpers</u> These highly trained, experienced firefighters that parachute from airplanes to provide quick initial attack on wildland fires in remote areas.
- Helitack crews These firefighters are transported by helicopters to wildfires and may land near them or, if equipped and trained, may repel from a hovering helicopter.

The Inyo National Forest is looking for a committed, hardworking, highly skilled workforce to manage and respond to wildland fires. The Interagency Fire and Aviation Management program based out of Bishop, California is comprised of both the Inyo N.F. and the BLM Bishop Field Office. The two agencies work together through a Service First Agreement. The work is very rewarding and requires talented and skilled people working safely as part of a team in a variety of specialized positions including:

- 9 Engine modules
- 2 Water Tenders
- 1 Type 1 Hotshot crew (20-person)
- 1 Wildland Fire Module (10-person Hand-crew)
- 1 Helitack Module
- Dispatch Center
- 7 Fire Prevention Technicians
- 1 Lookout

Who could hire me?

After completion of all course's students will have the opportunity to be on a call when-needed list for our local resources as a <u>Forest Service Hired Casual (AD Employees)</u>. AD employees are hired to cope with a sudden and unexpected emergency caused by a fire, extreme fire potential, flood, storm, or any other all-hazard emergency that threatens damage to federally protected property, has the potential to cause loss of life, serious injury, public health risk, or damage to natural or cultural resources unless brought under immediate control. AD's hired under this plan must meet minimum physical fitness standards as well as security clearance and qualification requirements as established by agency policy. In addition, casuals are required to complete agency specific health and medical screening requirements for certain positions prior to being hired. Further career opportunities will be discussed during this course.
