F. Report from Student Council Representative – Karina Mancini

Good evening Board of Education and community members,

At John Trumbull primary school, students in writing classes learned techniques from mentor authors that will help them express how they want the reader to feel. In math class, students are writing addition and subtraction number sentences and solving story problems

At Polk, the first student council meeting of the year was held and went great. Also, 3 of the fifth grade classes met with their book discussion partners from Watertown High School.

In Judson, the 45 chromebook donated by the PTO are being put to good use throughout classrooms and Judson is very grateful to the PTO for this donation.

At Swift, the mentoring program is being continued, which pairs adult volunteers from the Siemon Company and Webster Bank with select students. This week was the annual Mentor-Mentee breakfast, where students and mentors got to know each other. Swift clubs are up and

4. Superintendent's Report

There were some questions that were asked of Mr. Foulds, the Foods Service Director, at the last board meeting and I have the answers for this meeting tonight. I have some averages that handed out to you but I will speak to them to make it a little bit easier tonight. Specifically, the question was asked, what the average dollar amount is students were spending on breakfast and lunch. If you looked on this chart, you will see it is broken down into breakfast, lunch, à la cart, and then adult. The adult category is people like me who may happen to stop in and get lunch at a school or teachers that come down and eat lunch. The total sales you see for the year for breakfast were \$60,046 and with 180 days of operation that averages out to \$333.59 per day. Here is where you need to look a little more closely at the grid, where the total number of students is 2854 at the time this was printed, so if you would averages over all students it would be \$.12 per student, but all students are not buying breakfast so if you average it over the daily average of students, that's 192, so on the average that's about a \$1.74. I broke that down a little bit further, just to put it in another light for you, in K-5 the average cost of breakfast is \$1.55 and the cost of breakfast is \$2.00 from 6-12. So you can see that the cost of \$1.74 falls right in the middle of the two prices for breakfast. Same thing if you go down the lunch column, the yearly sales are \$771,101 and the average daily sales are then \$4283.89. If that is averaged over the entire student population it would be an average of a 1.50 on lunch, however, on average we have 1298 of our students, a little bit less than half, that are buying lunch on a daily basis and that would make our average sales count for lunch time \$3.30. That is actually above the cost at both kindergarten and 6 to 12. The cost of lunch from K-5 is \$.75 and the cost of lunch from 6-12 is \$3.25. À la carte, you see students spent about an average of \$.87 a day. Most à la carte items are between \$.60 and \$.90, they are things like baked chips, and Apple, a container of carrots, etc. I saw some pretty surprising things that students were picking up as an à la carte item, for instance, containers full of little black beans. Very similar to lentils. Not what we might've spent à la carte money on when I was in high school, but we didn't have smart choices back then. An

adult sales, we had \$54,537 and that would make the average, again putting it over all of the adults, it would be \$.87 apiece, keeping in mind that not all adults purchase every day. But still, the adult cells are bringing in a decent overall profit. Our total sales then are \$1,088,799. A couple of other things, I was at the mentor breakfast that Swift held, along with a couple of administrators, and we are looking to bring the program from the middle school through the high school, it was very well attended and we are lucky to have some great partnerships with the local businesses. Thank you for taking time out of your day to come and in some cases meet new students who are just beginning and in some cases to continue on their relationship students that have already begun their mentorship. I saw that we had more mentors there this year, so I know there has been a lot of effort put into reaching further out into the community. I have done some of that also along with some of the administrators, trying to drive up some support for it. Certainly, if you're willing to be a mentor for students, in grades 6 through 12, please contact me or one of our schools. We will take everyone who is interested.

I also visited Swift last week, I also had a very brief visit at John Trumbull, the week before. We had our first full professional development day since August, this past Friday, and it went very well. I want to think the administrators for doing the majority of the planning that went into that day. So that the board knows, much of what was done at the high school was related to NEASC, which is the point of where they are at and have begun writing and the evidence of reports, and thank you to Mr. Jones and the NEASC advisors who helped put that together.

That would be a final candidate coming to me.
