The International Science and Engineering Fair is a program of Society for Science and the Public, the world's largest international pre-college science competition.


"Out of this world!" Gigantic! Frericks said, when asked about what the fair looked like.


the realization that he had to live the rest of his life without his leg.


"Jeanna is a very kind person, always fun to be with on and off the volleyball court and derserved all rights to be awarded student of the month," junior Kennedi Sparling said.




With this victory, the Wildcats won all five games to win the Redfield/Doland tournament to claim their first tournament win of the season. The Wildcats did not win any tournaments last season.





The Knife of Never Letting Go


