


FOREWORD


Here's to our Alma Mater, so dear,

Here's to the lessons we thought so hard, Although often disproved by the grades on the card. Here's to the nicest thing of all— The fun we had in study hall.





Here is presented the Normal Training song:




The Girls' Booster Club is made up of girls encouraging "pep" in all our school activities. In the organization we have about sixty members.

The Future Farmers meet on the first and third Wednesdays of each month. The program for the year of 1929-30 was planned by Willis Gardner, Kenneth Bork, and Everett Hundley.

A basketball team was organized and only Future Farmers were eligible to play on this team. The schedule for these games was worked out and the suits were ordered by the following committee: Paul Williams, Everett Hundley, and Enno Wiberg.

The four ranks for membership, based on achievement, are Green-hand, Future Farmer, State Farmer, and American Farmer.

The first rank to be obtained is the Green-hand. The requirements are to be at least fourteen years of age and to be enrolled in vocational agriculture.

The next is the Future Farmer. The qualifications for this rank are: satisfactory completion of at least one year in vocational agriculture, to have earned and deposited in a bank or otherwise productively invest at least \$25, memorize the Future Farmers of America Creed.

Next in rank is State Farmers. Qualifications for this are: two years of systematic instruction in vocational agriculture with an outstanding supervised practice program in operation, ability to pass an occupational test supplied by state staff, earn and deposit in a bank or productively invest at least \$200, ability to lead a group discussion for forty minutes, participate on the school judging or debating or some other team representing the school.

The highest rank is the American Farmer. The requirements for this rank are: to hold the degree of State Farmer, engagement in a farming occupation or have definite plans for becoming a farmer, earn and deposit in a bank or invest at least \$500.



Each team played four games. The Whites took the championship with a perfect score, winning all their games.











INTRAMURAL TEAM

Jan. 23.—Wish I'd studied more. Didn't hardly know none of my english. Everybody says teachers picked out catch questions for the final exams.


Jan. 24.—Some more of them xx*!*?x quizzes.
