




The school building as it looked when it was built in 1908.

Student Council

The student council of 1940-41 has proved to be one of the most active since its organization in 1937. It is a democratic governing body of the students, by the students and for the students.

In October several members of previous student councils gave a party for the new members in the band room. Initiation ceremonies were held and last year's members presented the new members with council pins.


New Meeting Place

For the first time since its inception the student council has had a permanent place for its meetings. Meetings were held in Mr. Stevens' office, where the council debated many important school matters. It was felt that holding meetings in the office rather than in various classrooms would be an incentive for better attendance and greater accomplishments.

Attend Convention

Those who attended the convention this year were Paul Adams, Jean Cody, Faye Roberts, Marvin Hofmann, and their sponsor. Allen Tuttle. The convention was held October 18-19 in the Central High School at Omaha, Nebraska. This conference was the 13th annual meeting of the Federation of Student Councils of the Central States, with councils from eight states attending. The purpose of these annual conventions is to foster closer relations among high school student councils and to provide for interchange of ideas on council problems. The theme this year, "We Live," was cleverly carried out in discussion groups, speeches, music, and social affairs.

Perhaps the greatest value derived from the convention by the delegates was a greater appreciation of our school and the few problems we have compared with other schools.

Council's Work

The council passed many important bills this year. Probably the most outstanding was the decision of the council to exempt all "A" and "B" students from final examinations

The council also had a bicycle rack built for the students' bicycles, gave five dollars to the Safety Council of Clay Center, decided to have next year's activity tickets in booklet form, and amended the council's constitution.

In order to keep the students informed as to the work of the council, and to sound out student opinion, the council passed a resolution providing for a printed report on each important meeting. These reports were read by the teachers to the second hour classes. The classes then served as a discussion group and the conclusions reached were communicated to the student council by means of faculty reports. This system has proved to be an invaluable service to the council in enabling it to keep closer contact with the wishes and opinions of the students.

The student council is rapidly becoming a more important factor in school life and is in keeping with the democratic spirit of school management. There is every reason to believe that even greater progress will be made in the future, even as it has been made in the past.

School Board

Seven officials elected by the taxpayers of the school district are entrusted with the care and supervision of the high school. In the hands of the Board of Trustees is thrust the responsibility of maintaining a sound and modern educational institution for the boys and girls of this area. The trustees have at heart the welfare of the students and the greater welfare of the community as a whole.

Miss Lilly Brenner is the ex officio chairman of the board. After several successful years as a teacher Miss Brenner is assisting in the educational program of the high school as county superintendent.

Perhaps the biggest improvement in the school building authorized by the school board in the 1940-41 term was the construction of an attractive combined principal's office and director's council room, and a modern fire-proof vault. The vault contains safety deposit boxes for each or-

ganization, and permits the safe keeping of important records.


The library was also improved by a rearrangement which transformed it into a modern study room with an improved lighting system. This has been a big help for the students in making their research easier and more pleasant.

The equipment of the Manual Training Department was improved by the addition of a spindle shaper, which makes dado's, flutes, inlays, and so on.

The Home Economics Department was the recipient of a fine refrigerator, which was made possible by the board.

The board this year has also raised the qualifications of teachers, thereby insuring better standards of education in the high school.

Indeed, the seven board members perform a great service to the high school and the community by providing for those things which are essential for a modern educational institution.

was really superb. Then came the presentation of the senior play, "The Green Vine." However the most exciting event of the year was our sneak day which was spent in Kansas City.







For the first time since its organization,







Senior Play


On Wednesday, April 23, the Senior class presented the comedy, "The Green Vine," under the direction of Miss Ruth Raynolds.








Two of the lads from Clay finished the season with especially high ratings, and were given places on the Central Kansas League all-conference team. These two were Johnny Fisher, halfback, and Harold Robinette, end.

The Tiger line usually displayed power when it was needed. Much of this credit belongs to the line coach, Lyle Read. Night after night he attempted to drill the fundamentals of football into the boys, and his efforts were accompanied with success.

New Gridiron Department


What's this? A brand new addition to our football group. It's none other than a Freshman football team.




