And filled the halls with happy hubbub.


The following year we less shy,

Mrs. Snover and Mr. Otto Unruh were our sponsors. We chose for our class officers the following:



## SCIENCE CLUB





Mr. Clyde Jusilla, one of the music professors at Kansas State College, has come up to work with the orchestra each Thursday this year.





With only six returning lettermen from the 1950 Championship team Ccach Otto Unruh and his able assistants Don Brown and Chet Unruh faced a big job of building a new winning combination. They had an experienced backfield in Harris, Roether and Black but the big speedy linemen were missing from tackle to tackle. With ends Mosburg and Weller and substitutes—center, Hollenbeck and guard, Davies—a new line had to be developed. Although the team failed to win the Championship, Doug Roether was named to the Topeka Capital's All-State Football Team, which made this recognition even more outstanding. co-champions.



This basketball year has not been a year of winning and championships but it has taught everyone to get up and fight back after you are down. The spirit of the basketball team showed championship in itself




