





Those trying for the shop team this year are: Alfred Beichter, Max Mock, Jim Debenham, and Paul Heilman.




GIRLS' GLEE CLUB


This year five quartets were selected from the group: one composed of seniors, one of juniors, two of sophomores, and one of freshmen.

BOYS' GLEE CLUB




SENIOR PLAY







JUNCTION CITY—five, 54 to 36, not showing the brand of ball they were capable of playing. Chestnut hit 7 field goals. For the third time we met
