




# Our Ichool

The main part of the Clay County Community High School building was built in 1909, and the north annex and auditorium-gymnasium added in 1932. Within the imposing red brick structure are housed the processes of providing and gaining the all-important high school education.

The six-member Board of Trustees, elected by the voters of the Clay County Community High School District for a term of four years, is the school's governing body. The Board creates and sustains the policies of education and school maintenance believed best for the youth of Clay county. Administrative responsibilities are held by the principal, Mr.

Geo. C. Stevens. The efficient cooperation of the governing and administrative bodies has resulted in the high standards and achievements of CCCHS.

The Clay County Community High School has a rating of Class A, and is a member of the North Central Association of Secondary Schools. The quality of teacher training is obvious in the fact that eleven of twenty faculty members hold master's degrees. Collegiate, general, vocational, business, and industrial courses are offered to CCCHS students. Sixteen units of credit are required for graduation, including three in English, two in social science, and one each in science

and mathematics. The class day is divided into six periods, or "hours", of fifty minutes each.

Extracurricular activities open to students include membership in school organizations and participation in dramatics, musical groups, and the athletic program. The sports program includes football, basketball, and track. CCCHS is a member of the Central Kansas League.


Progress is never halted in expansion and improvement. The latest addition, the beautiful vocational agriculture building, was dedicated in 1951. The not-so-distant future will bring more new buildings.

We are grateful for the Board's capable leadership.


# CCCHL. Office scene of big business

Participation in the United States government will be not admirable, but absolutely necessary.

Boys' State Three CCCHS junior boys are chosen each year to attend Sunflower Boys' State in Wichita. Those chosen to attend last summer's session were Grant Cookson, Callan Christlieb, and Donald Rosenow, sponsored respectively by the Lions, American Legion and Rotarians. 






