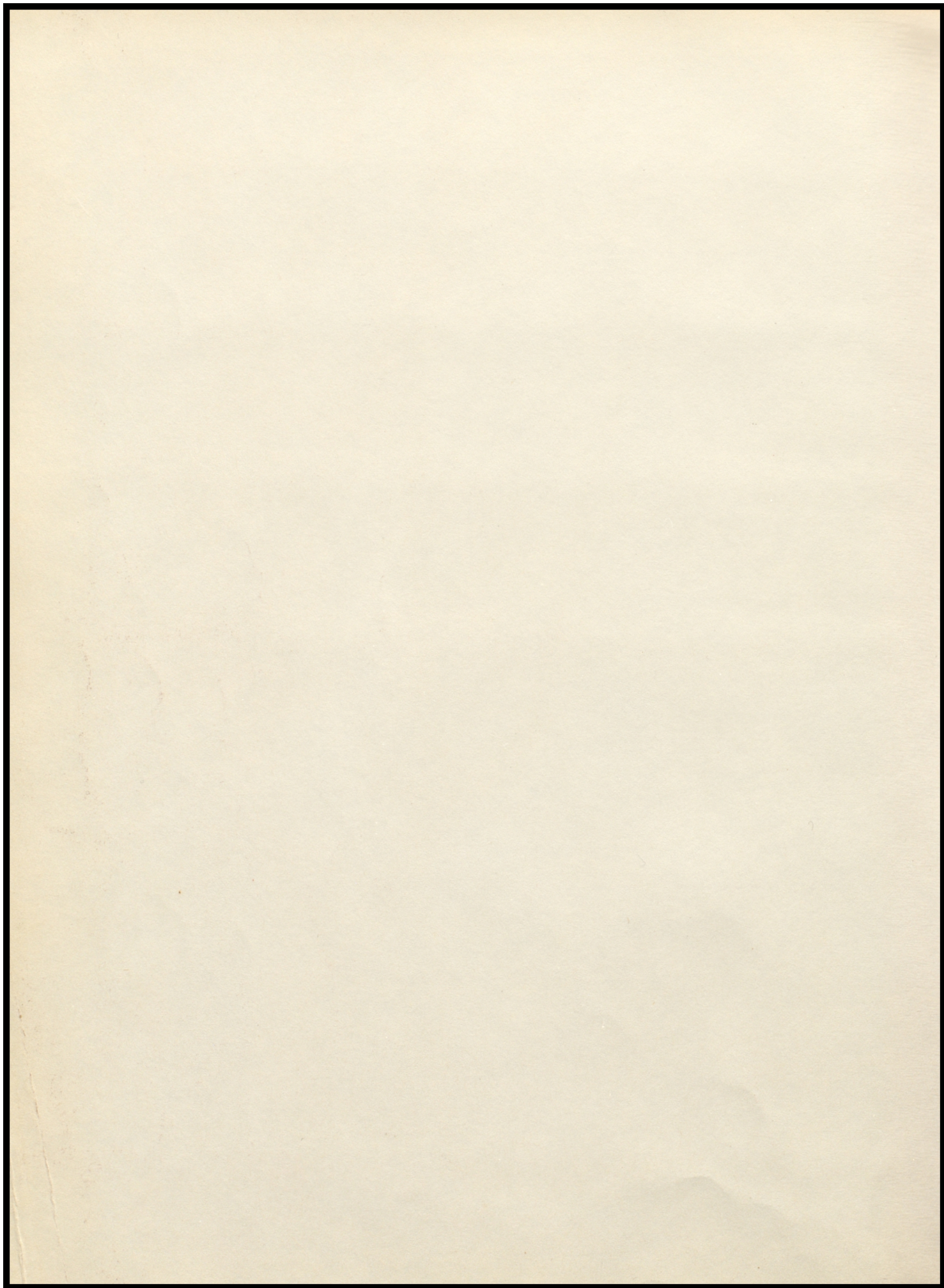

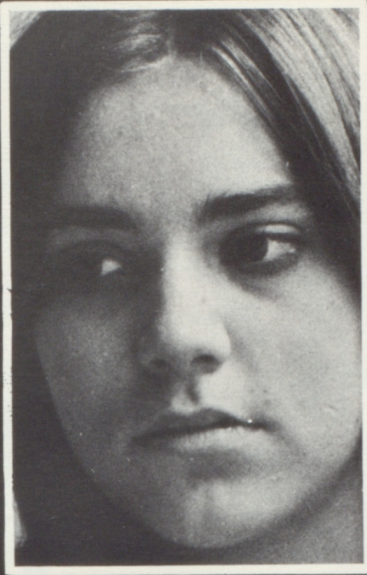
Mr. Ernest Larson

Mr. Ernest Larson retires after 45 years

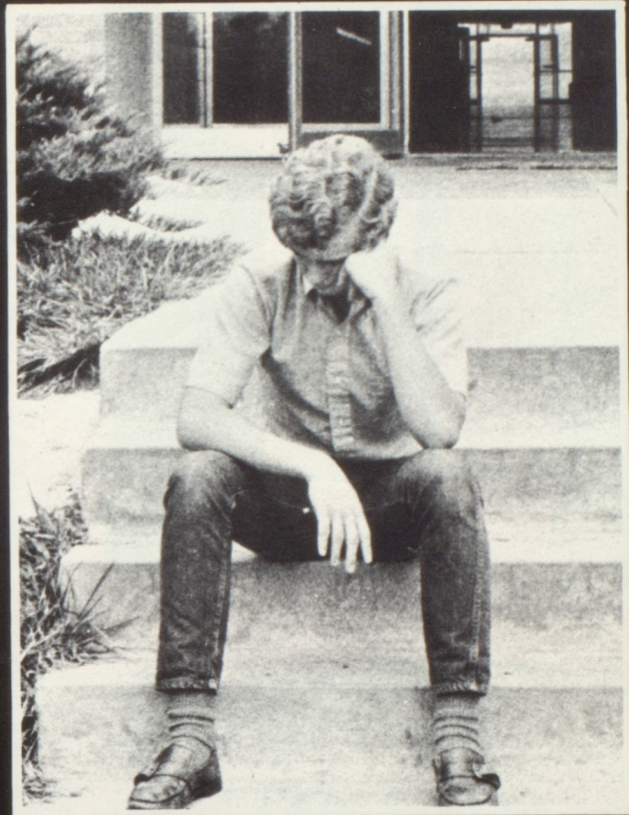
Mr. Ernest Larson is retiring this year, ending a teaching career spanning 45 years. Forty-two of those have been at CCCHS where he served as science teacher and assistant principal. Mr. Larson received his Bachelor of Science degree at Bethany College and earned his Master's Degree at Colorado University with additional graduate work at Colorado College, Colorado State University, and Hamline University, St. Paul, Minnesota. A recipient of three National Science Foundation Fellowships, Mr. Larson is a member of Theta Chi Delta honorary chemical fraternity, the Kansas Association of Teachers of

Science, the National Science Teachers Association, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and a member of local, state, and national teachers' associations. During his stay at CCCHS, Mr. Larson served as sponsor of the Hy-Y Club, the KAYS, and the Science Club. Active in the community he is a member of Lions Club, the Clay Center Chamber of Commerce, and the United Methodist Church.

FTA promotes education

The English department covered many different areas besides literature and grammar. Miss Scott's senior English classes have studied Shakespeare, and also interpreted poetry. Miss Lemert's junior English classes have studied folk lore and folk lore heros. They also made collages based on the student's past and plans for the future. Mr. Anderson's junior classes have read several classic novels. The sophomores have studied the preparation and fundamentals of notetaking for newspapers. Two members of the journalism class told how they wrote stories in preparation for The Promoter, the school newspaper, to the classes. In Mr. Stenzel's freshman classes, the students chose pen names and wrote of their personal experiences.

Mr. Booth is the adviser of the school newspaper, The Promoter, and the school yearbook, Tiger Roar. In September the yearbook staff attended a yearbook conference in Abilene and learned many new techniques. In the journalism class, Mr. Booth checks stories and helps lay out the school newspaper.

Mrs. Aiken teaches Developmental English at the high school during the morning hours and goes to the junior high in the afternoon.

The Spanish and French classes have exchanged letters with penpals in Spanish and French speaking countries. Mrs. Kirk and Mrs. Stenzel, language teachers, made the arrangements for receiving names of the penpals. The students write their letters in English and learn the differences between the two countries. Some of the Spanish II and III students participated in a language contest held at Wichita State University on October 31.

Mr. Gellatly's speech classes learned the fundamentals of speaking in public, and taped interviews on the video tape machine, a new piece of equipment acquired by the school system this year. Mr. Gellatly also directed the all-school play and senior play.

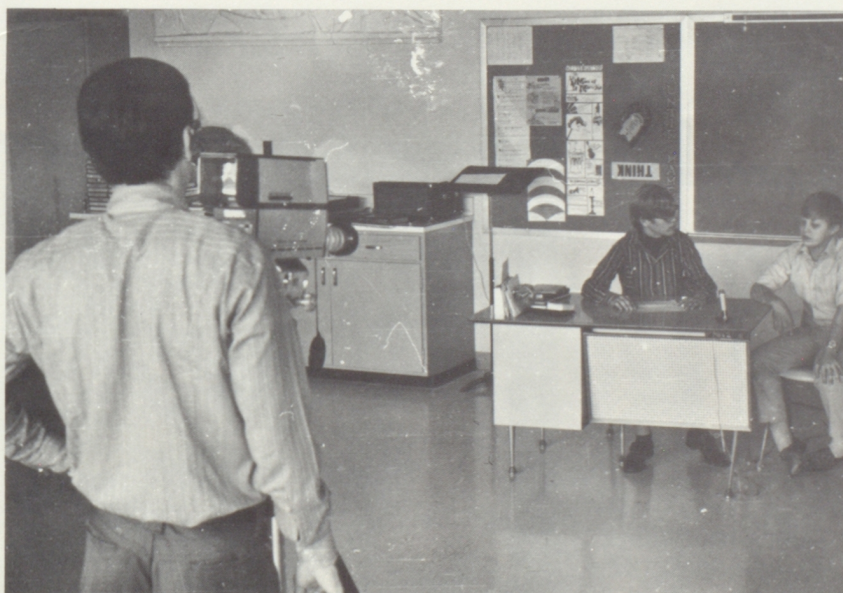

MR. GELLATLY is shown taping an interview between two speech students.

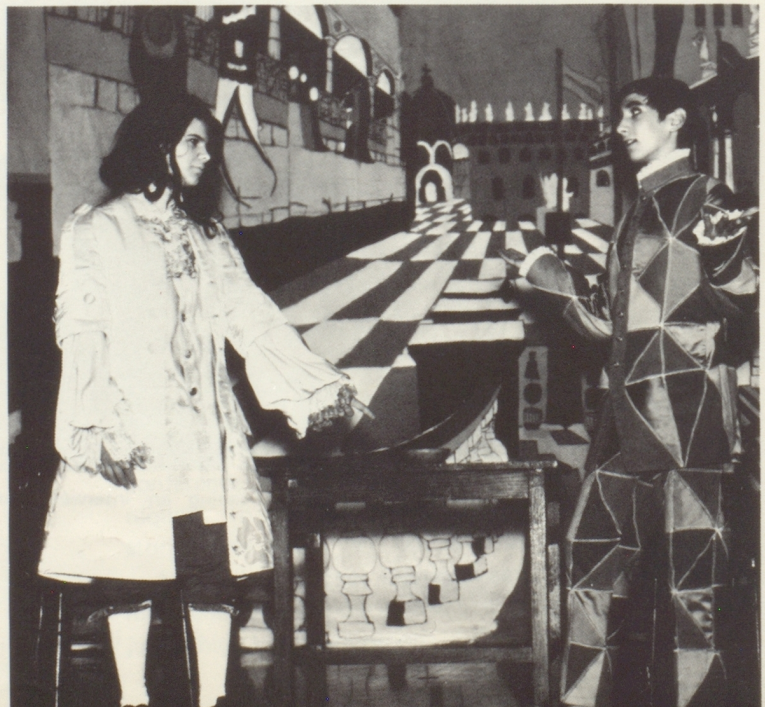

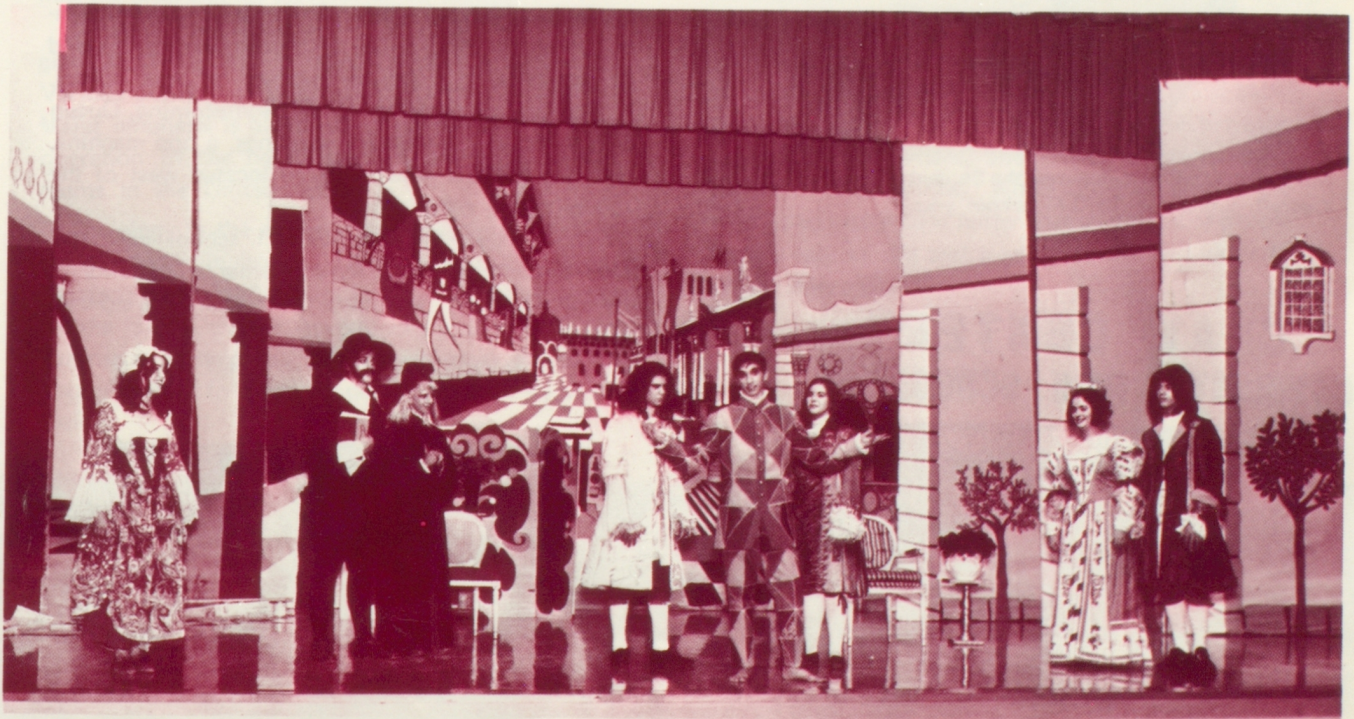

Social Science progresses with time

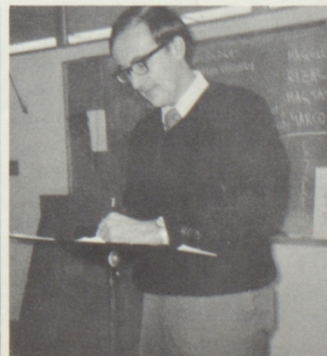
Psychology is the study of man's behavior and the reason for his behavior. Students discuss such topics of interest as personality and its relationship to physical development, the psychology of learning, mental illness, habits and behavior, emotions and many other areas. The result of the psychology course is to give the student a better idea of how a person grows, and how his ideas and his personality are formed.

In American Government great consideration is given to the duties and responsibilities of all citizens. Various political and economic systems are studied. Major emphasis is placed upon the development and operation of the national, state, and local governments in the United States.

Sociology is the study of the problems of people living together in groups. This course studies several different formalized groups in man's society, including the family, church, government, and school. The purpose is to help each student see more clearly his responsibilities to other people and the role he has in society.

The roots of the American way of life are studied in American history. A knowledge of the past is essential in solving the problems of today and in making progress in the future. This is one of the main reasons for studying history. Students learn to interpret maps and graphs, to evaluate evidence, to distinguish what is true and what is false, and to separate fact from opinion.

World Cultures is a study of different regions of the world. Special emphasis is given to the geographic and environmental relationships, historical backgrounds, patterns of society and cultural heritage, economic development, and relations between contemporary civilizations. World Cultures enables the student to understand better that all groups of people have a way of life and a set of values and ideals to satisfy their needs.

FFA "lives to serve"

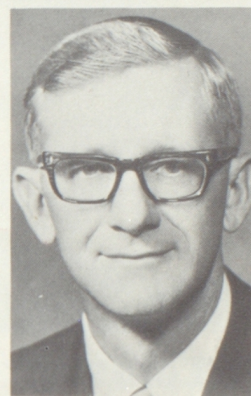

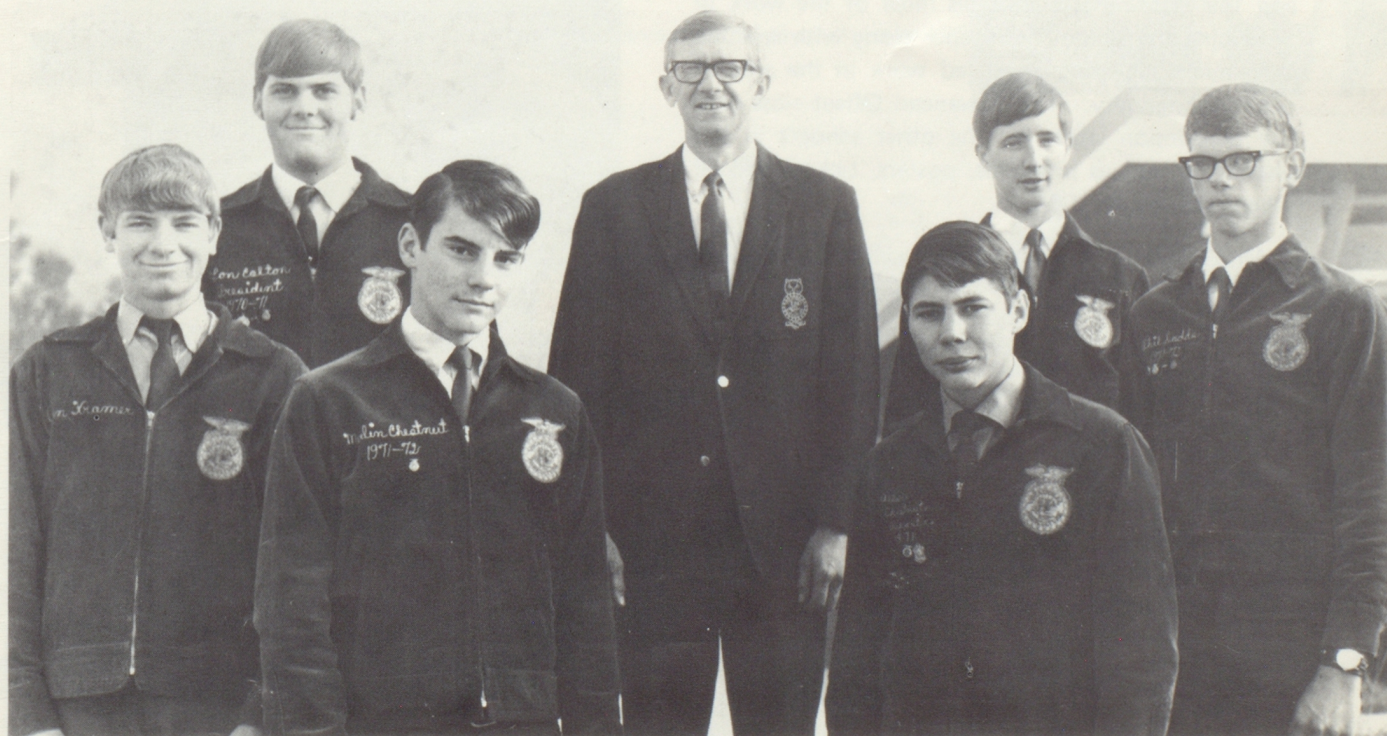

He also teaches power mechanics which helps students become more knowledgeable about purchasing and maintaining mechanical principles and devices.

Art class provides specialized skills

Hidden in the basement of the CCCHS building is one of the most vital parts of the school, the printing department. This department under the direction of Mr. Stephen Norman, prints up the Promoter, letterheads, grade cards, activity programs, and various types of tickets for all schools in this district.

The Printing I classes learn the basic processes of printing, including some work in offset lithography and the Printing II class does most of the work in producing the school newspaper along with selected assignments covering advanced work in the area of offset lithography. The Advanced Offset class does the production work for the other schools in the district as well as programs, posters, tickets and all other printing for CCCHS.

Mr. Leonard Selig is the instructor of the Mechanical Drawing I and II and Woodworking I and II classes.

Mechanical Drawing I is limited to 20 students, both girls and boys. Some things which are studied in this course include the use of the tools involved in it, and the lines and symbols necessary in drawing. The students also learn to put on paper various views of an object to show its right relationship.

Students in Mechanical Drawing II have the choice of machine drawing or house drawing or may take both.

Larry Griffis, who taught at CCCHS until a few years ago when he entered the service, is back with a full schedule teaching art. Mr. Griffis teaches Art I, II, and III. Some of the projects of his classes include clay work, acrylic paintings, lettering, and the structure of cardboard chairs.

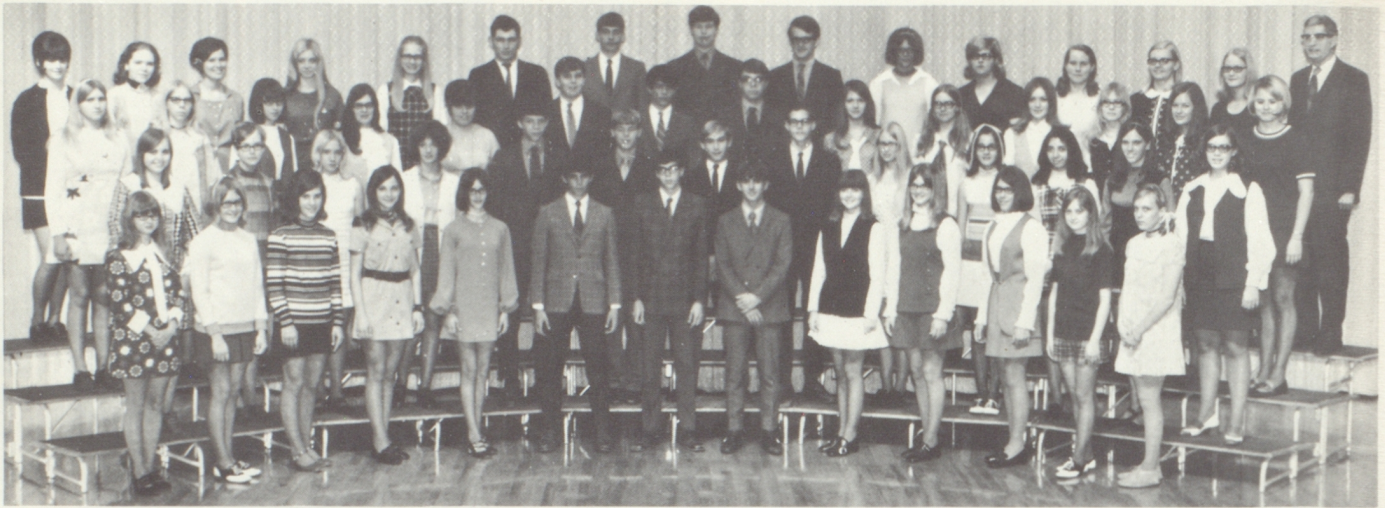

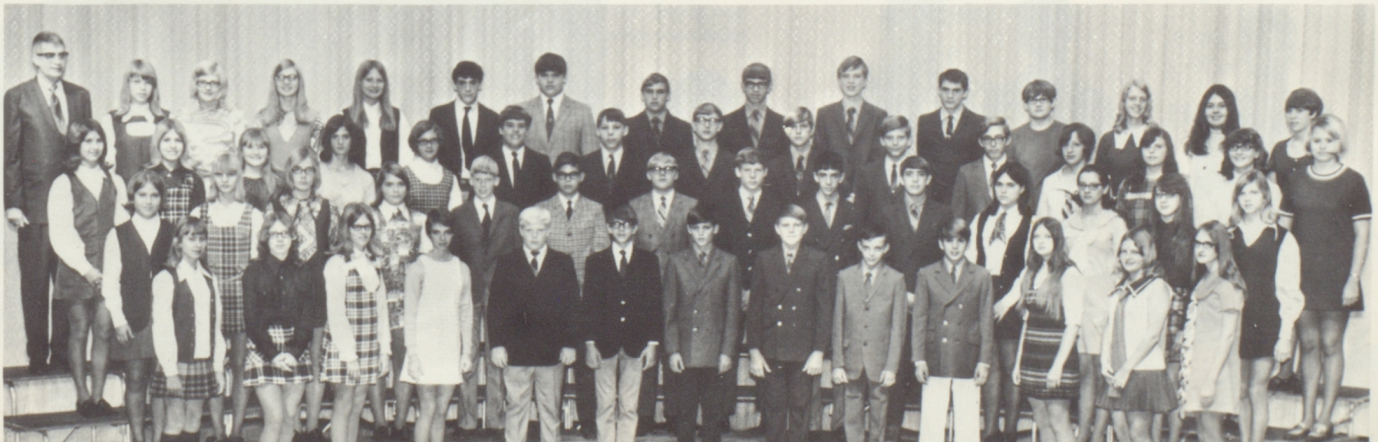

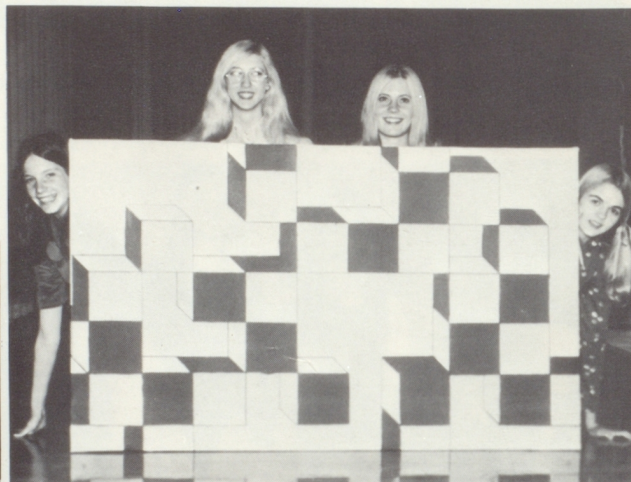

The club members work on individual projects with the possibility of entering regional and state science fairs. During Christmas or Easter vacation, the students take a field trip, which is the main highlight of the year.

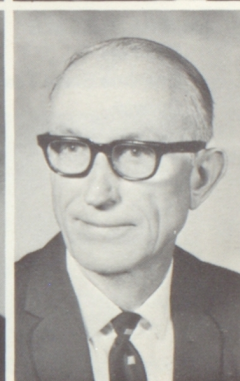

Students study courses of Science and Math

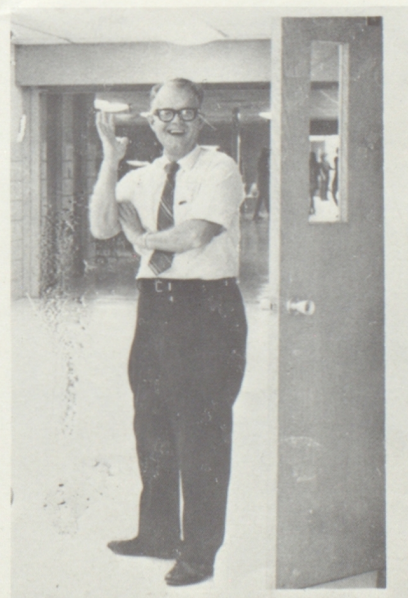

As our world is essentially one of business, education in that field is a factor in reaching success.

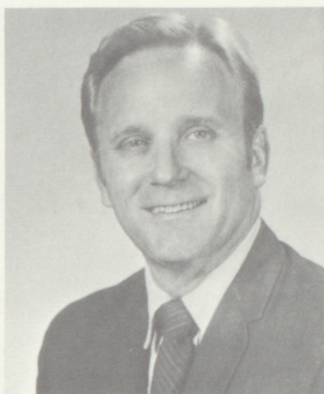
Among the various courses offered at CCCHS are bookkeeping, general business, office practice, shorthand, transcription, and typewriting.

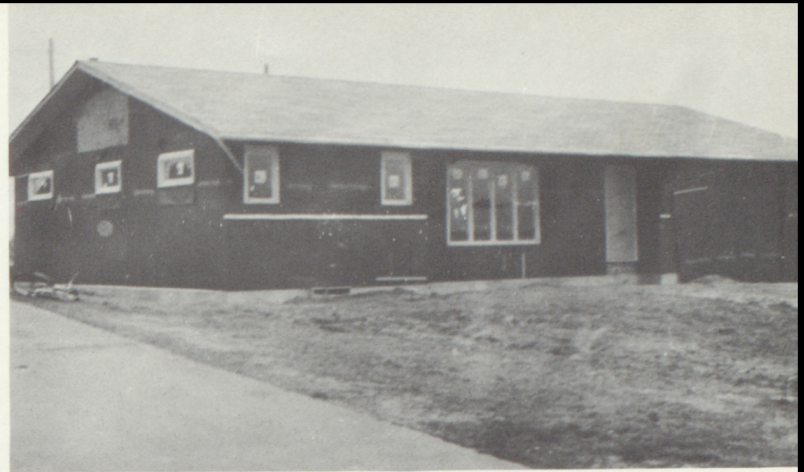
Besides being an exceptional performer, he's authored two popular percussion books summing up his 15 years of teaching.

Carpentry classes undertake big project

Diligent work proves rewarding for the Carpentry II class as they learn the building trade.



The purpose of the building trades project is brought about through the belief that a person best learns and understands a skill or concept by actually having some direct experience with it. This project not only teaches skills in house construction, but also in other related areas such as drawing, plumbing, landscaping, interior decorating. The advanced drawing students and the carpentry class, with the help of the home ec. classes planned, designed, and drew blueprints of the house. The house is being built with the twelve students of the advanced carpentry class, beginning with work from the basement on up through finish work and painting.

A unique feature of the project is that of using many vocational areas to assist in the completion of the house. The areas participating include the advanced carpentry class, responsible for the concrete work, rough framing, finish work, painting, brickwork, cabinet work, and laying the floor covering; the Carpentry I class which occasionally assists the advanced class; two of the home ec. classes, one working on kitchen planning and the other doing the interior decorating and construction of draperies, two vocational ag. classes, one doing the electrical wiring and the other doing the landscaping; the advanced drawing class does the blueprint work of the floor plan, elevations, and cabinets; the business classes who keep record of time cards, simulated payroll and pay checks and expense accounts; welding classes who assist with various jobs; sheetmetal classes who work on the heating ducts; and the printing classes who print the time cards, simulated payroll and pay checks and account sheets.

Not only does the building trade project teach concepts and some basic skills but also gives some of the students an added incentive in school and gives them a sense of accomplishments.

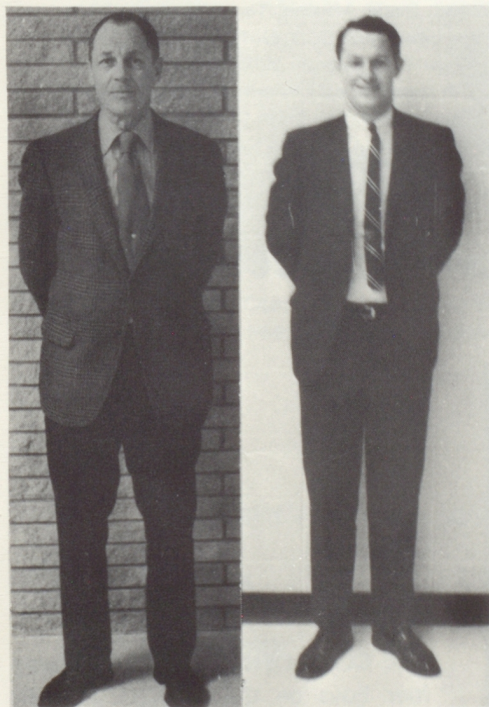

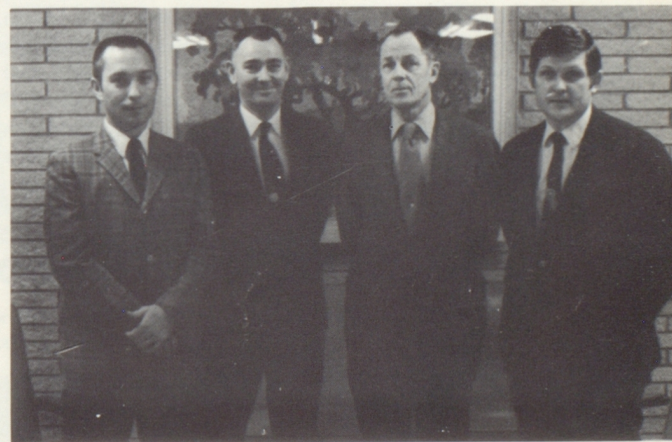

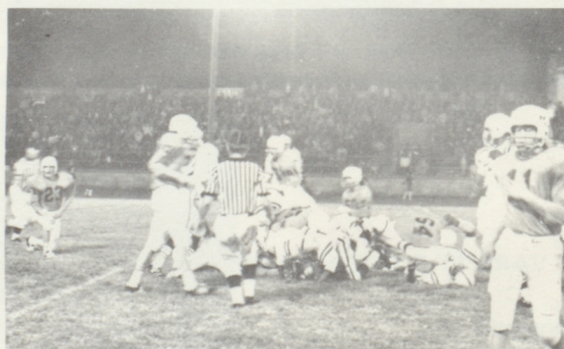

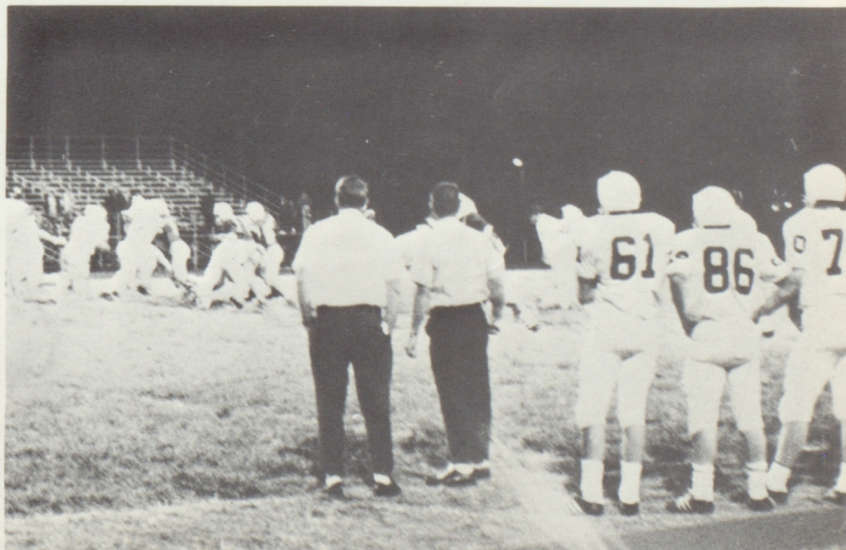

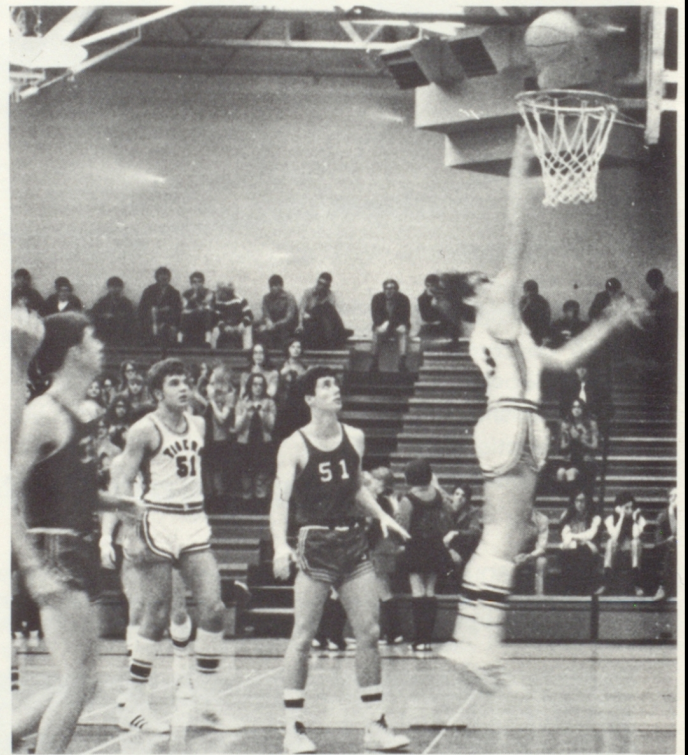

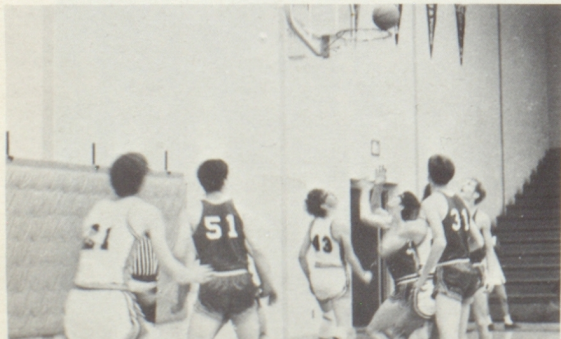

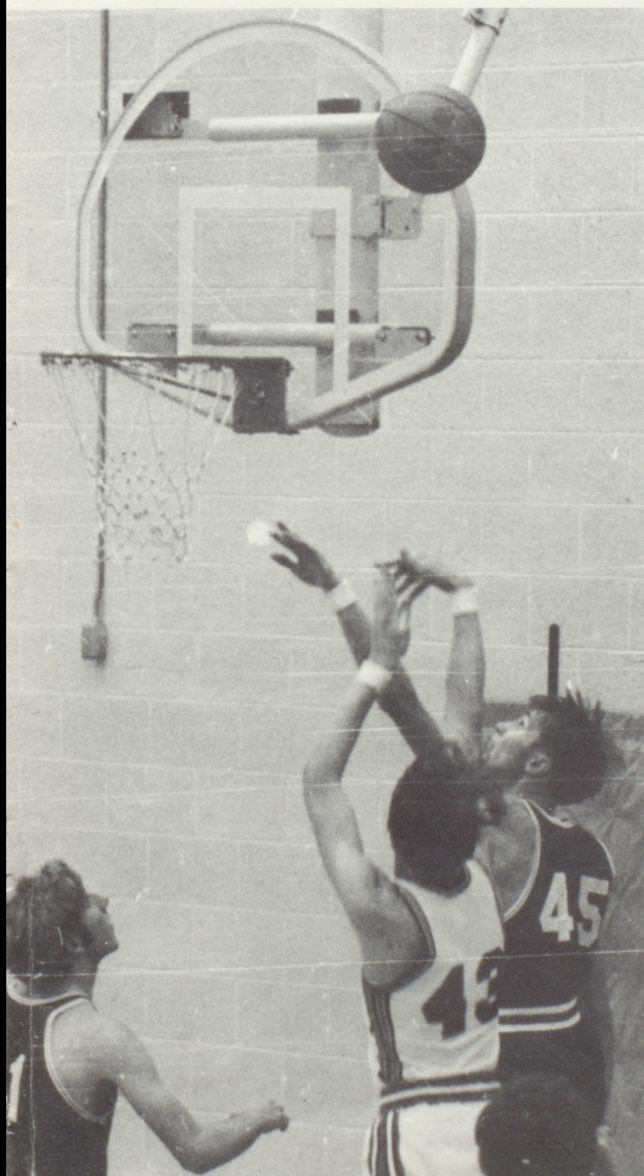

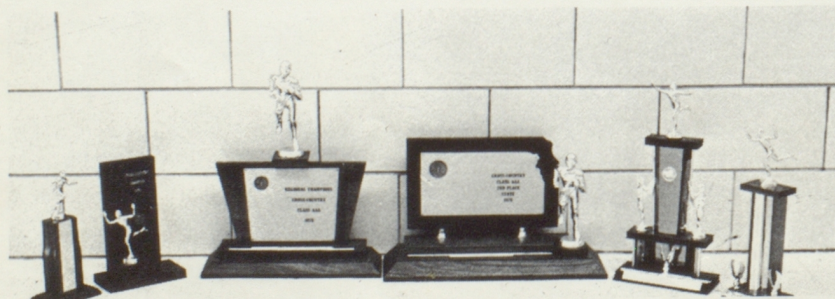

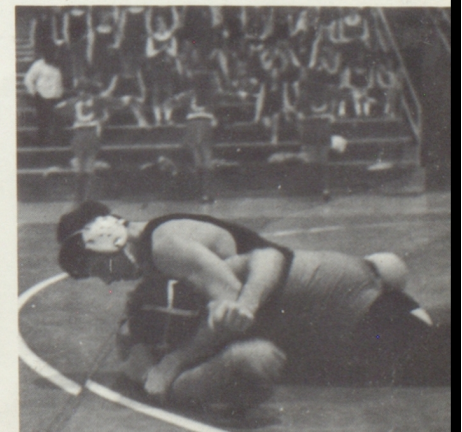

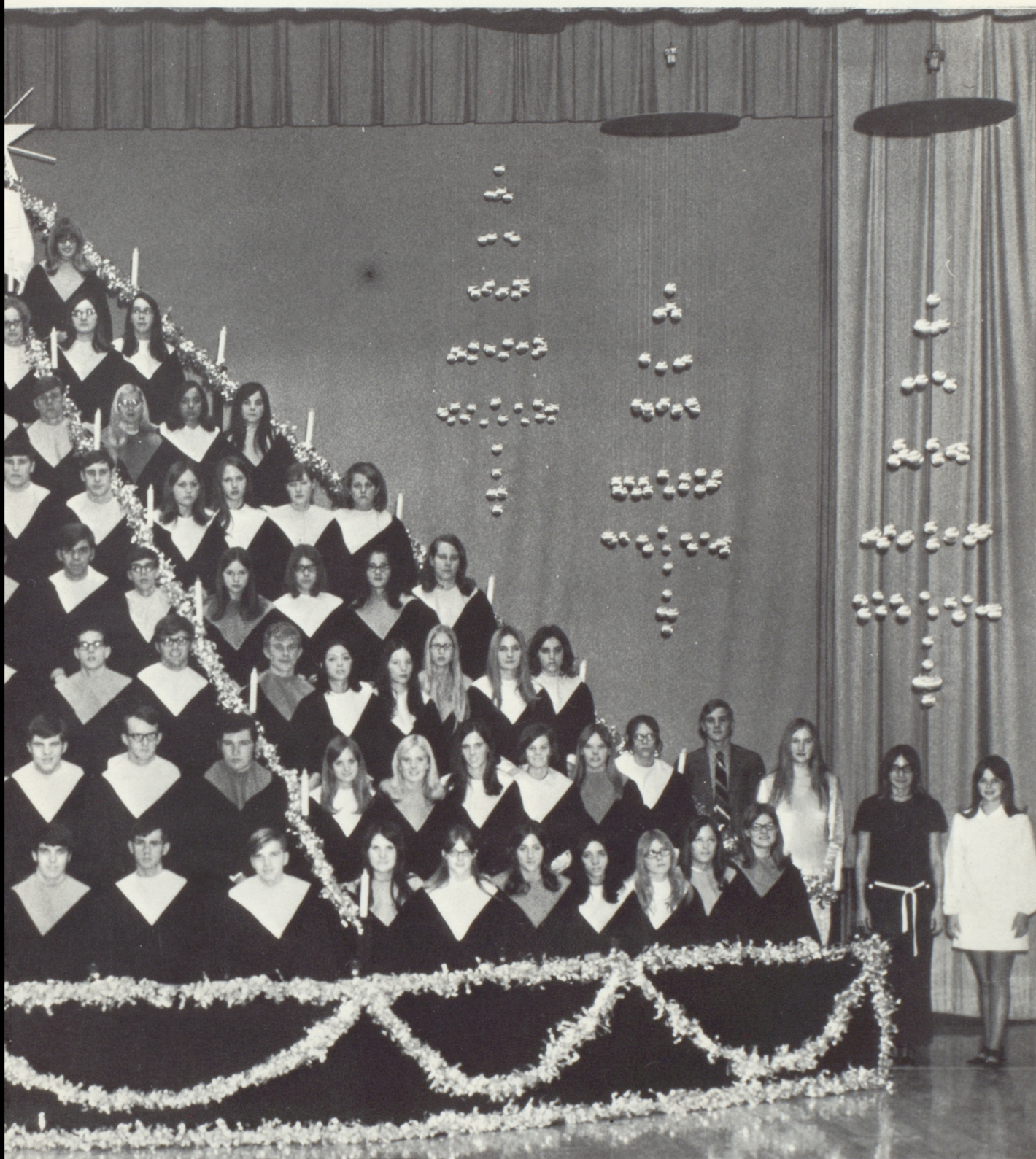

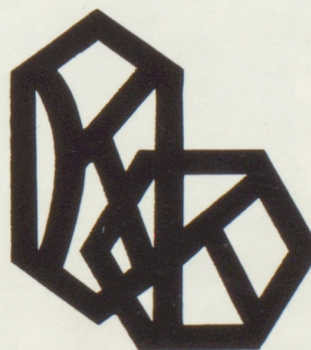

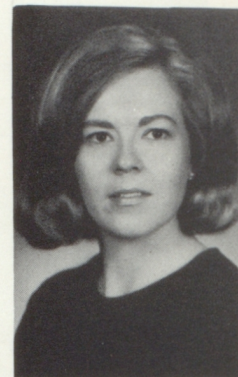

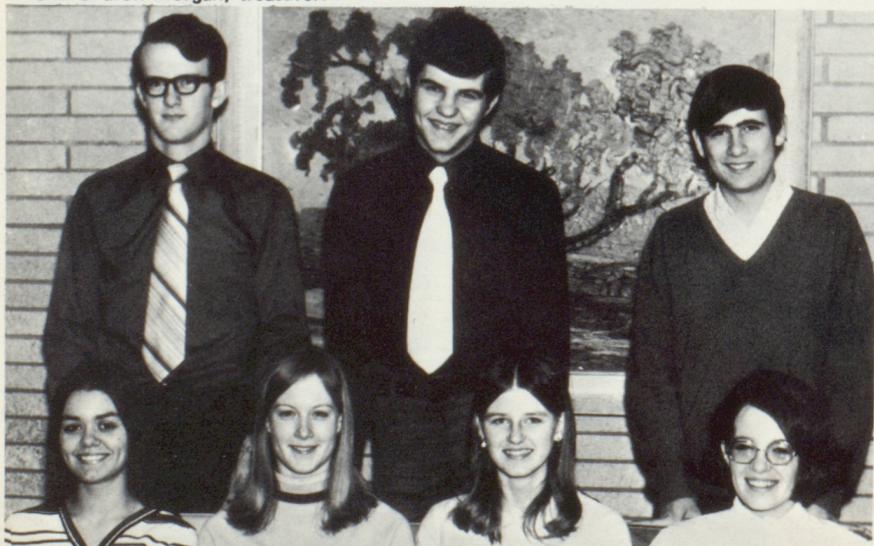

Youth Center holds fund drive

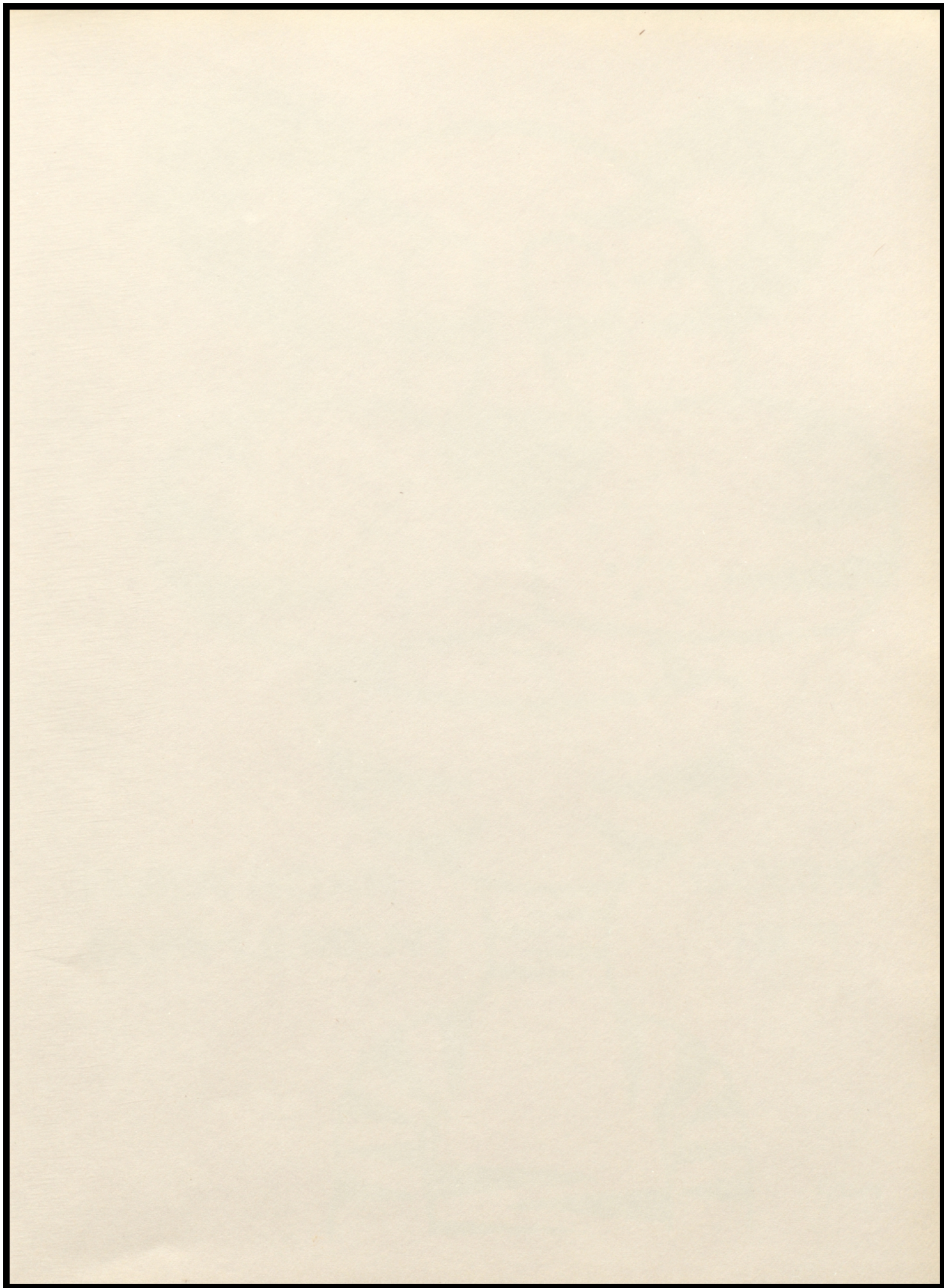

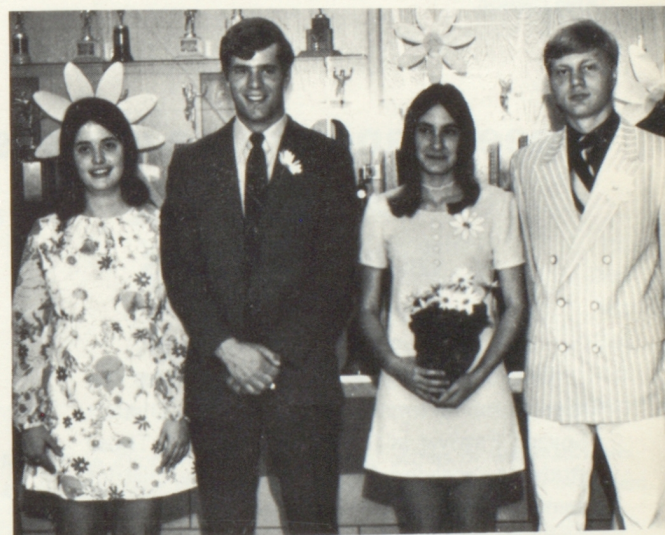

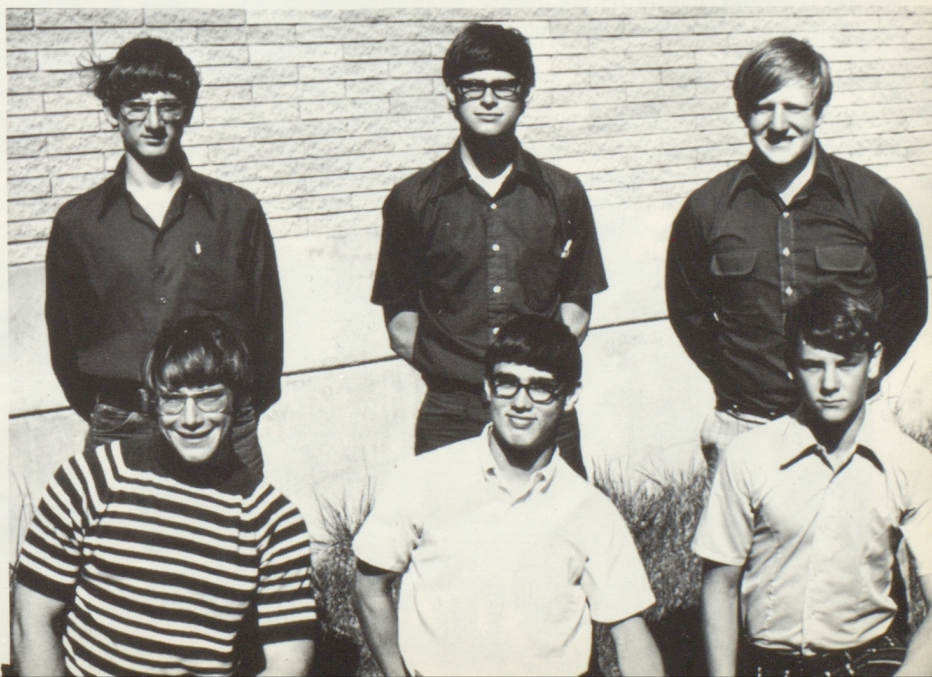
The Tiger golf squad under the coaching of Coach Dan Willey parred the year with a good record.

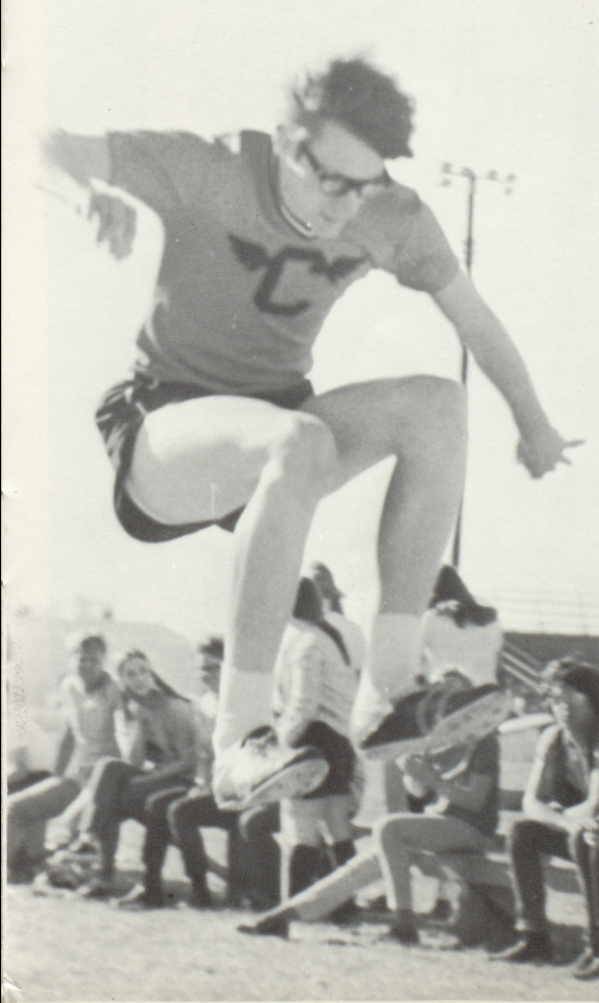

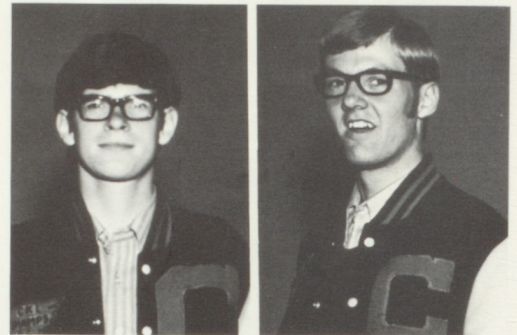


Boys receive letter

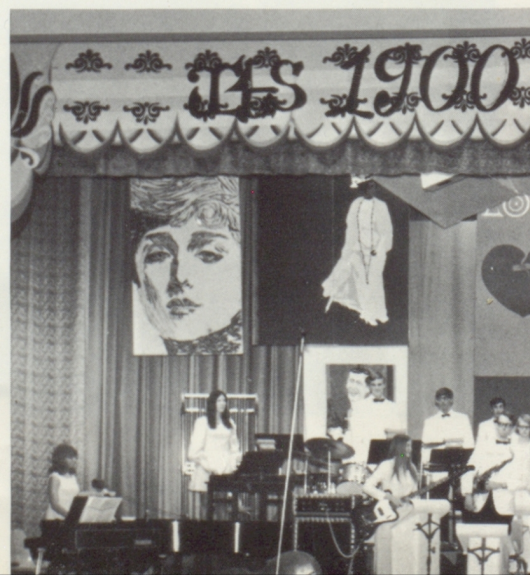

Norman buys Sophie expensive foods. He washes her floors, and in the process, Sophie's cat falls in the toilet.

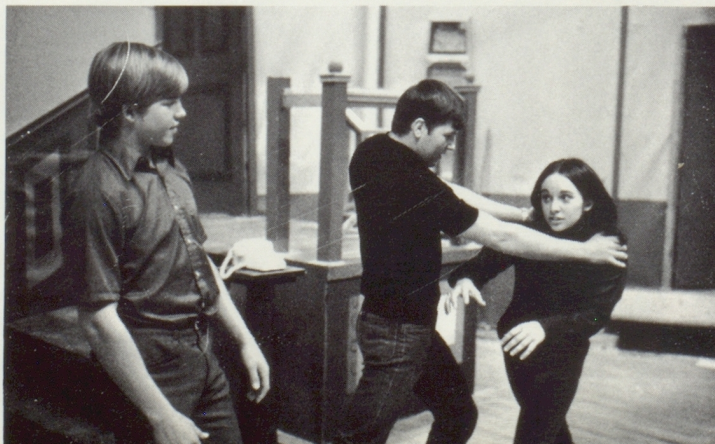
Meanwhile, Norman hasn't been working on the two boys' protest magazine, *Fallout*.
