
Miss Mildred Lemert




Math And Science Go Full Steam Ahead


Vocal Department Entertains









The carpentry house is a relatively new project in our school system. It comes from the belief that a person learns a skill better by actually having some direct experience with it. So with this idea in mind, the project is organized to teach skills, not only in carpentry, but also in other related areas such as drawing, plumbing, landscaping, and interior decorating. A full-size, three-bedroom house is constructed by twelve members of the advanced carpentry class which is taught by LaVon Ediger.

Various other classes connected in some way aid in the building. The areas participating are (1) The advanced carpentry class which is responsible for concrete work, rough framing, finish work, painting, brickwork, cabinet work, and laying floor covering. (2) The Carpentry I class which occasionally assists the advanced class. (3) A Home Ec. class which works on kitchen planning and another which does the interior decorating and drapery. Vocational Ag. classes which do the electrical wiring and the landscaping. (5) The Advanced drawing class which does the blueprint work of the floor plan, elevations, and cabinets. (6) The business classes keep the time cards, simulated payroll and paychecks, and account sheets. (7) Welding classes weld various jobs. (8) Sheetmetal classes work on the heating ducts. (9) The printing classes print the time cards, simulated payroll and paychecks, and account sheets (10) The Journalism class gives news coverage in the school paper. Altogether about 150 students are involved.

Upon completion of the house, it will be sold, and any profits will be re-invested in next year's project to help purchase additional equipment.

The school year of 1971-72 was a busy one, as usual, for the industrial art classes. In woodworking and mechanical drawing the students were acquainted with the tools, materials, and processes of the drafting and woodworking industry.

In printing the classes became familiar with the basic printing processes and developed consideration of vocational opportunities available in the printing field. The classes worked at constructing a lab assignment book in Printing I; designing and reproducing printing jobs the next year; and in the third year production jobs were included. This class printed The Promoter, programs, tickets, and many other useful items.

In Metalworking I, students completed exercises and small projects to help them become acquainted with some of the major areas. Second year students

concentrated more in these areas and finished the year by machining and fabricating a bench vise. Some of the students helped make the duct for the heating system in the carpentry house.

In Power Mechanics I, the students started the year by trouble-shooting and thoroughly overhauling a small four-cycle engine. Power Mechanics II classes concentrated mostly on trouble-shooting and the proper use of test equipment.

Many of the students discovered that they have the ability and interest to pursue a career in metals or mechanics.





"Curtain Going Up," a three-act play written by Gregory Johnston, was performed by seventeen members of the Senior Class on March 7, 1972, as this year's senior play.


The play was actually the story of a young new teacher directing her first high school production. Breta Bloomberg was cast in this role of Miss Irene Burgess.






Baccalaureate service was held May 21, 1972. The Pastor Joseph Bowman of the Evangelical Covenant Church was the speaker for the Sunday evening services.





Home Ec Helps Girls

To some girls, the Home Economics Department is one of the most important departments in our school. This department helps to prepare girls for later life when they finish high school and begin their life's career.

Home Ec. I, taught by Mrs. Corrine Olsen, involves the study and preparation of foods, such as soups, salads, quickbreads, and cakes; careers in Home Economics and related occupations; family relations; a study of clothing construction, buying and caring for clothes; and interior design and home management.

Home Ec. II, III, and Family Living are taught by Mrs. Glennis Couchman.

Home Ec. II goes into more extensive study of the courses of Home Ec. I.

Home Ec. III is mainly working with the Carpentry Department in planning and completing the house construction project. The class plans efficient storage and kitchen arrangements and the entire interior decoration of the house, which involves the selection of carpet, linoleum, paint colors, wallpaper, and lighting. The class also covered units on advanced textiles and clothing construction techniques, consumer buying, and increased skills in food preparation.

Family Living is a semester course for both boys and girls. Emphasis is placed on recognizing the responsibilities of adulthood, marriage, and parenthood.


FHA Elects King, Queen

After installation of officers was held, Lynne Walker, president, closed the activities.










