
Social Science covers topics about government, American history, world cultures, sociology, and psychology. A student needs four mini-courses of American history, three courses of government and any three other Social Science courses.








Chess Club Begins Their First Year




Pep Club Raising Spirit!





1978 Senior Awards



JOHN Lenk is the 1978 valedictorian.






Tigers Finish Season With A Bang


