








The days in kindergarten were filled with many learning experiences. Show and tell was the highlight of the school day.


Storyhour was another favorite "class".


Counselor Advises Students



The student librarians had a pizza party in December. They also have field trips to other libraries and exchange books among themselves.












The Cheerleaders



The young men worked as a unit and operated on the team concept throughout the season. This can be attributed to the leadership of the team and their concern for winning.







Wrestling has given me "The Want to Win." Like most people, I hate to lose, but I get myself mentally prepared to win. When you want to win, it's harder to lose.


This sport is very individualized. If you make a mistake, it could make the winning or losing of the match. This is why practice is so important. In practice you do one move over and over again until it comes natural.

I feel in the years to come that Clay Center Wrestling will be a power. The Coaches and the attitude of the team can achieve this if they only want it bad enough.










