Kid's Corner

One of my very favorite quotes about kids is from a psychologist, Ross Greene, who says, "Children do well if they can" (The Explosive Child, 2005, p.16). Using The Zones of Regulation curriculum, students learn that when they possess different 'energies' in their bodies, they are in different 'zones'. They learn that all feelings are connected to energy in their bodies; and that all of these energies/zones are okay. The different zones are represented by different colors and they learn tools to use to get back to their "just right" zone or color (Green Zone). The Zones have Four (4) colors: BLUE= LOW ENERGY and feelings like tired, sad; GREEN=JUST RIGHT ENERGY and feelings like calm, happy, good; YELLOW= A LITTLE TOO MUCH ENERGY= and feelings like frustrated, silly and RED=EXTRA ENERGY and feelings like angry and/or out of control.

You can work with your children on helping them to recognize what zone they are in by noticing their actions, words, facial expressions and tone of voice. Once they begin to understand and recognize their feeling and their zone, you can offer choices to assist in getting back to the Green Zone. Examples of tools or strategies to return to the Green Zone may be rest (if tired and in the blue zone), a quiet activity that is soothing like playing with sand (if they are escalated and in the yellow zone), or a take a break activity if they are angry (and in the red zone). We will be talking more about Zones of Regulation at our next ELC Cafe on March 6th. Hope you can make it! You will leave with your own Zones of Regulation chart along with some concrete tools and strategies!
