

FALL RIVER TRI-LAZY GOES ON WITH GREAT SUCCESS

On Saturday September 19th the Second Annual Tri-Lazy Triathlon Event was held. Overnight there were many storms and lots of rain which luckily held off for the next day's race. Once the weather cleared the race was on. The event started at 9:15 am at the Fall River Dam with two separate heats of bike racers. The first wave of racers were the Individual Racers which were given a 10 minute head start. The second wave consisted of the Team Racers. Off they went with a challenging 13+ mile bike ride to start things off for the day. The course went through the Village of Fall River and out through the countryside where there were many hills and the few valleys were hard to find. The bike portion of the race finished back at the dam where they transitioned to the waiting canoes, kayaks and even a paddle board for a quick 2 mile paddle. The wind and current were both factors in this leg of the Race where participants had to circle the course on Lazy Lake twice. All racers made it in good time and no one went swimming which was great. The next portion of the race was a 5k through the Village, back out to the countryside, and then returning to the Village to finish at the current athletic field. The finish line was under an inflatable arch and timers were ready to record everyone's final times. There were crowds of family and team members waiting until the very end to support each other in this race. Team members often ran in together spurring each other on to the finish. The times for the more than 30 racers to complete this Tri-Lazy Triathlon were between 1 hour 30 minutes and just over 2 hours. The racers were of all ages and abilities. Our teams consisted of friends and couples who were as committed to help raise funds for the Fall River Pirate Foundation as they were taking pride of enduring such a task. Where were the racers from? They were from our local area (some of whom you might know), some had traveled from as far as Milwaukee, Chicago and even Dickeyville. The after race party was held at Sorghum Fest at Savanna Oaks Community Center. Where the racers received some food and a cold beverage with their awards. Each racer received a laser cut medal (produced locally) with a t-shirt with the names of our Sponsors listed proudly on the back and other goodies too. Awards were given out for Individuals and Teams.

Dear Parents and Families,

On Wednesday, November 11th, as part of our Veteran's Day recognition, we will be honoring veterans who have served in one of our armed forces. **Our Elementary Assembly will be from 9:30 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and our Middle School/High School Assembly will be from 10:30 a.m. to 11:15 a.m.**, both in the MPR.

For those families with more than one student, it is only necessary to fill out one form. Veterans who plan on attending the Elementary Assembly should plan to meet in the Lower Office entrance at 9:15 a.m. on Wednesday, November 11th and those who plan on attending the Middle School/High School Assembly should meet in the Lower Office entrance at 10:15 a.m. on Wednesday, November 11th.

We would also like to honor those service members that are part of your families that may not be able to attend our assembly. We have created a "Wall of Honor" outside of the Multipurpose Room. If you have a family member (grandparents, uncles, cousins, aunts, etc. –living or deceased) that is currently serving our country or has served our county in one of our county's branches of the Military, please provide us with his or her name, rank, and branch of service, as well as your student or student's names and mark it "Wall of Honor". **IF YOU DID THIS LAST YEAR, YOU DO NOT NEED TO DO IT AGAIN. We need this Wall of Honor information to be returned to school no later than Monday, November 2nd.**

We are also requesting photos of your Veterans, preferably in uniform. You could also include a current photo of your student(s) with the Veteran. Again, if you submitted one last year, you do not need to submit a new one. The best method of delivery is to scan the photos and email them to Mrs. Jennifer Schroeder. Pirate Parent Organization

Thank you to everyone who attended our September 23rd meeting. We had our best turnout to date.

Schwan's- We discussed how our first campaign is going, and future advertising, including notes home and possible space in athletic programs.

Papa Murphy's - Pre-order forms went home with students and we discussed where to hang flyers around town. Ads were put in the Rio Shopper and Columbus Journal. Volunteers signed up for time slots to sell pizzas the evening of the sale. We also discussed the drop-in menu for the night.

World Map - Mrs. Esveld asked for funds to bring in another National Geographic continent floor map. Feedback last year was mostly positive. An idea was brought up, and accepted, that we would work together with Mrs. Esveld to do a stand-alone fundraiser for the sole purpose of raising money to go towards the cost of the map, so it's not all coming from the PPO account.

Book drive - It was decided last year that the annual book drive be changed to every other year, in hopes that this would help produce enough donated books so that none have to be purchased. The purpose of the drive is to give each student in 4K-5th grade a book that is new to them. Minion book bins will be placed in a couple places throughout the school and possibly one in the community. In the past, it was hardest to find books for the higher grades. It was agreed to reach out to more middle and high school students who may have some of these books to get rid of.

Playground equipment - We are looking to upgrade some of the older equipment on the playground, most likely the merry-go-round and tall climbing structure. Ideas as to pieces seen on other playgrounds to replace them are welcome. A suggestion was made to have someone come in to give us an estimate as to how much money we may get for these 2 objects if they were scrapped, to put towards the cost of new equipment. We are also planning to have free-throw lines, 4-square and hopscotch painted on the playground, as well as looking into other templates to purchase to give kids more things to do at a low-cost.






Fall River's PBIS

7th Grade Board Game Project





STAYING HEALTHY

- If your child has vomited/has diarrhea within the last 24 hours keep them home until they tolerate their regular diet for 24 hours. (no vomiting/diarrhea for 24 hours).
- If your child develops a rash or other symptoms of a communicable infection (such as pink eye) keep them home from school and call your health care provider for further medical evaluation.

We do have several immune-compromised students throughout the building, so it is important that we try to keep preventable diseases out of school. This will not only benefit those students with decreased ability to fight off diseases, it will also help all children have a healthier school environment.

In speaking with Paul Marks there have been issues with several different parts of the building. He has encountered issues with the exhaust chiller, plumbing and the air conditioner unit. The AC unit needed a Freon charge because it was leaking. The cost to do that was approximately \$2,000. The unit alone to replace is very expensive. It doesn't need to be replaced now however it is on the radar to watch closely over the next year or two.



- XI. Student Council Report** was given by Kelly Tramburg. The Student Council Advisors this year are Ms. Froehlich and Mrs. Ducat. They are still looking for their Student Council Constitution. The bylaws need to be updated shortly. Homecoming parade will be at 6p.m. on October 15, 2015. Following the parade will be the skits in the high school gym. Classes will be judged on the following things for homecoming week: T-Shirts, Poster, Hallway and Float. Guidelines will be given this year as to the size of the posters. Student Council is working with the Positive Behavior Intervention Support (PBIS) program this year doing different activities to support the program and provide positive support for the students.
- XII. Elementary Principal Report** was presented by Mr. Jim Docter. The Elementary PBIS program met on 9/15/15 to discuss where they want to focus their time and opportunities with the students on since the program is now being split between the Elementary and the Middle School and High School. Kelly Tramburg, Grace Van Gysel and Austin Weiner are working with group to put together a video with Mr. Maynard. They are going to be working on building school spirit, recognizing positive behavior and researching data on school discipline (what is happening, what is being done about it, where it is taking place). Elementary enrollment preliminary numbers are in. The Elementary is up from last year this time of year to 251 students (3 of them will start on 9/17/15). Class sizes are staying very consistent at 16-20 per classroom. This has been very successful and the smaller class room equal better student/teacher ratios and is a great selling feature for the school. Docter commended the board for their support with this. Elementary staff is all in place and off to a good start. There is a very great group of veteran teachers along with the wonderful additions are melding together very nicely.
- XIII. Middle School and High School Principal Report** was presented by Mr. Brian Zacho. The Middle School and High School PBIS group also met on 9/15/15. They are working with Student Council to find the best way to get the "Pirate Bucks" out to the student body and promote leadership within. Their next meeting is Oct. 20th. Middle School and High School Fall Athletics are off to a great start. Watch the school website calendar for upcoming games and times. The first couple weeks of school have been really good. It was suggested to go out and meet with each class and talk about expectations, what leadership means to them and what can I do to make Fall River School the best school for them. Mr. Zacho will be working on finding a program replacement for the Veterans Day program. EK Machine is partnering with DPI and DWD to kick off Manufacturing Month in Wisconsin on October 2nd from 12-3 p.m. working with them on sending some students to the event.
- XIV. Superintendent Report** was presented by Dr. Michael Garrow.
- a. Bus Purchase:** After reviewing several different bids for a new bus a purchase was made from Mid-State Truck Service Inc. for \$81,500 (\$3,500 below Board approval). Paul Marks and Brian Anderson went and checked out the bus. Brian Anderson drove the bus as well. All drivers were ok with air break endorsement and in favor of moving in the direction.
 - b. Budget Update:** The budget is a work in progress. He will be emailing out a copy to the Board his power point presentations that he is working on. The 14-15 year-end process is still being worked on so the numbers for 15-16 are projections only. The auditors have been and there are lists of items that are needed for them before they return. Fund 80 has always fallen in the red and will need some type of increase to place it in the black.
 - c. Food Service Zero Balance Policy:** The policy has been put into effect however we have encountered some difficulties. With some fine tuning of the policy and education of our staff and families we will put this fully into effect starting Oct. 1, 2015. Information about this will be sent out in our newsletter, on our website and emails sent out to families that are currently at the -\$01 balance.
 - d. Annual Meeting:** The meeting is currently set for Oct. 5, 2015. We still need to have the meeting however Dr. Garrow is suggesting an announcement be made to move the meeting to a later



date (October 26th) to allow for additional information from the state to be provided, allow the district office to be able to provide more accurate data and be able to work through the audit process as several areas are still in need of attention. Steve Rubert and Chief Van Gysel from the audience commented on the importance of having the most accurate numbers and information to share with the community and were in favor of this suggestion. Dr. Garrow stated that after October 15th all the information from the state is available so this would help with providing more accurate information.

- e. **Vision/Planning:** Currently working on cleaning up issues related to finance, staff professional development for the upcoming school year related to communication and grading/assessment as well as EE Support and STAR training, developing a working draft of the Employee Handbook, being visible at event and putting together different proposals to help support our staff in the library and translating services. Currently these areas are in need of attention.
