## March is Celebrate WHES Breakfast Month!

A study of more than 4.2 million students found that students with personalized goals set as part of a research-based reading practice program read $35 \%$ more minutes per day, read more difficult books, and had $4 \%$ higher literal comprehension scores than students who used the same program but without set goals.
