Professional Learning Day Highlights



Learning Day Brings Collaboration, Unity

Thomasville City Schools students enjoyed an extra-long Presidents Day weekend while administrators, faculty, and staff made use of their Professional Learning Day on February 14, 2020, to target a variety of educational topics. Employees from across the district exchanged ideas and interacted through an intricately planned day of learning.

Elementary school English/language arts teachers for grades K – 5 participated in a session with the Journeys Reading Program representative and school-level Instructional Coaches. Middle school English/language arts teachers for grades 6 - 8 participated in a session with Collections Reading Program representative and MPMS Instructional Coach Katie McCloud.

Math teachers for grades 3 – 5 met with District K-5 Curriculum Coordinator Brian Beaty and Early Intervention Program teacher Pam Gardner to examine pacing guides and benchmark assessment data.

Math teachers for grades 6-12 met with MPMS Instructional Coach Neal Ford and Scholars Academy Assistant Director Jennifer Jordan, science teachers for grades 6-12 met

with Instructional Coach Denise Heard, and social studies teachers for grades 6-12 met with Director of Teaching, Learning, and Assessment and 6-12 Curriculum Coordinator Dana Rollins to examine pacing guides and benchmark assessment data for edits. English teachers for grades 6-12 met with Heard and Rollins in a separate session to review and discuss pacing guides and benchmark data.

Approximately 50 teachers from all six of the district's campus sites gathered for MindSet instructor training. The purpose of this training program is to facilitate insight, raise awareness, enhance skills, and ultimately certify professionals in a system of preventing and managing aggressive behavior. The goal of the MindSet training curriculum is to set in motion a process of increased awareness, skill development, and appropriate parameters for individuals and organizations to eliminate the need for physical restraint or seclusion. All other staff members in the district have been previously trained in the MindSet program.

All other teachers, staff, and paraprofessionals engaged in a Google for Education course by Russell Paine from Southwest Georgia RESA.



THS is named AP Honor School



Robert Peterson's AP Environmental Science visited the local wastewater treatment facility and landfill. Students learned how water is cleaned, landfills are made, and the monitoring at both facilities. Environmental Science is an AP STEM course.

Thomasville High School was named a College Board Advanced Placement Honor School in the categories of AP Schools of Distinction, AP Challenge Schools, and AP STEM Schools by Georgia State School Superintendent Richard Woods on February 6, 2020.

AP Schools of Distinction went out to schools with at least 20% of the total student population taking AP exams and at least 50% of all AP exams earning scores of 3 or higher.

AP Challenge Schools went out to schools with enrollments of 900 or fewer students and students testing in English, math, science, and social studies.

AP STEM Schools went out to schools with a minimum of five students testing in at least four AP STEM courses.

Superintendent Woods named 255 Advanced Placement (AP) Honor Schools throughout the state for 2020.

"I commend the students, teachers, and staff of these 255 schools," Superintendent Woods said. "Behind this recognition is an enormous amount of hard work, and I congratulate all those who worked to expand

access, improve performance, and build strong Advanced Placement programs in each school recognized today."

Thomasville High School Advanced Placement Scholar awards, which are given to individual students based on their success on AP exams, reached its all-time record this past year with a total of 55 AP Scholars. Eight of those students are National AP Scholars which is granted to students in the United States who receive an average score of at least 4 or higher on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 4 or higher on 8 or more exams.

Scholars Academy Guidance Counselor Marcie West attributes the district's high rate of success to AP trained teachers that work diligently to build, monitor, and revise a rigorous curriculum in each subject area.

"Our teachers are well-versed in AP strategies and use the tools College Board offers to ensure our students are successful," said West.

Scholars Academy Director Jeanene Wallace finds that students come back from college and say that their former AP teachers provided high expectations and gave them

the tools and support to do well in their classes and on the exams.

"We have excellent teachers throughout the district who work long hours and want to provide a positive and challenging environment each day. I am especially proud of the work of our AP teachers, and I'm grateful to see their work throughout the year," said Wallace.

West also credits the students who are deeply invested in their AP courses.

"Our students are not only successful in high school and gain entry to their schools of choice, but they are also more than prepared for college level work," said West.

Wallace reports that students are better prepared to handle challenging coursework and have the work ethic and study habits to be successful beyond high school.

"I think developing these skills in high school gives students an advantage in balancing the academic, social, and personal aspects of college life," said Wallace.

Thomasville High Scholars Academy students are currently participating in 19 AP courses: Physics, Spanish, World History, U.S. History, Statistics, Language, Literature, Latin, Biology, Art & Design, Art History, Psychology, Human Geography, Calculus AB, Calculus BC, Environmental Science, Chemistry, American Government, and European History.

Wallace added that taking AP courses such as these help students to become better communicators, writers, problem solvers, and critical thinkers.

"Whether in a classroom or in a career, these are skills we want our students to master," said Wallace.

Be THE Voice Tours Albany Civil Right Museum

AP Biology Transformation Lab

Thomasville High Scholars Academy students Caliyah Sinkfield and Carly House insert a plasmid (piece of DNA) into bacteria in a pGLO Bacterial Transformation lab in Jamie Gammel's Advanced Placement Biology class. The plasmid has a gene that makes the bacteria resistant to an antibiotic and a gene that allows it to fluoresce in UV light. The bacteria, by the way, is genetically engineered so it is not pathogenic and cannot grow outside of a lab!



Meta Ughetto and Sara Strickland "streak" their bacteria cells, a technique used to isolate a pure strain from a single species of microorganism, often bacteria. Samples can then be taken from the resulting colonies and a microbiological culture can be grown on a new plate so that the organism can be identified, studied, or tested.

Jefferson Scholars Fellowship Finalist

Thomasville High School and Scholars Academy Class of 2020 senior Braxton Sizemore has been selected as a finalist for the University of Virginia Jefferson Scholars Foundation scholarship. Awarded solely on the basis of merit, Jefferson Scholarships are granted to candidates who have undergone a rigorous selection process. It is a distinct honor to be selected as a finalist for this prestigious scholarship. Each year the Foundation identifies finalists through 62 regional competitions around the country and 2 international competitions. Regional selection committees—comprised of alumni and friends of the University—review transcripts, extracurricular activities, essays, and teacher recommendations before conducting one or more rounds of interviews. Of these regional nominees, only 120 finalists are invited to Charlottesville to compete at the Jefferson Scholars Selection Weekend in March.

The undergraduate Jefferson Scholarship Program has been attracting and cultivating undergraduate leaders since 1980, providing them sufficient financial support so that they are free to develop their talents and to use them for the good of the University community. Class of 2020 STAR Student: Max White

Thomasville City Schools STAR Student for the Class of 2020 is Max White. Each high school STAR Student is asked to name his/her STAR Teacher. White selected Dawn Hunnewell who was his eighth grade English teacher.

To obtain the STAR nomination, high school seniors must have the highest score on any single test date of the SAT taken through the November test date of their senior year and be in the top 10 percent or top 10 students of their class based on grade point average. Nominees' SAT scores must be equal to or be higher than the concorded mean scores on the Evidence Based Reading and Writing and Math sections.



The Student Teacher Achievement Recognition (STAR) program honors Georgia's highest achieving high school seniors and the teachers who have been most instrumental in their academic development. Since its creation in 1958 by the Georgia Chamber of Commerce, the STAR (Student Teacher Achievement Recognition) Program has honored nearly 26,000 high school seniors who have in turn chosen their STAR Teachers to share in this recognition. Every accredited high school in Georgia is eligible to participate in this preeminent student/teacher academic recognition. In the mid-1990's the Professional Association of Georgia Educators (PAGE) Foundation was asked by the Georgia Chamber and the State Department of Education to assume responsibility for the oversight, administration and promotion of the statewide STAR program.

White is adding "STAR Student" to his growing list of academic achievements during his time at Thomasville High School and Scholars Academy. White earned a perfect score on the ACT during his junior year, was named an Advanced Placement Scholar with Distinction, is a winner of the prestigious University of Georgia Foundation Fellowship scholarship program, and was named as a "Commended Student" in the National Merit Scholarship Program.




