

Important Reminders

Please help keep our school a safe place for all by reviewing these important reminders.

- Students who are experiencing a fever should not be sent to school until they are fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medications. If your child is vomiting, they must be vomit-free for 24 hours before returning to school. This will assist us in preventing the spread of germs during the flu season. The Clinic will be rechecking students who have returned to school after an illness.
- When dropping your child off in the morning, please do not drop them off before 7 am (7:15 am is the preferred time). The staff does not arrive until that time, and those who are at school at that time are preparing for the day's lessons.
- If you choose to park and walk your child in to school, please park beside the building and avoid the front parking lot. The front lot is for staff and (staff is not permitted to park along the side of the

On Monday, March 2nd, we are beginning our OWL unit entitled "Shadows and Reflections". Children observe, experiment, and read books to learn what makes a shadow and a reflection. Children hear stories about a girl playing by a still pond, a puppy who thinks he's a kitten, a crocodile collecting reflections in a pail, a sleepy boy who sees a shadow save a cat, and a raccoon who has an adventure with only his reflection for company. The children make shadow puppets and put on an informal show using the lit-up screen. They continue to learn about letters and sounds, and counting concrete objects. They also participate in many other mathematics, science, music, poetry and art activities related to this theme. We are planning two field trips for late April and early May. We will visit greenhouses and the fish hatchery in Enfield, so if you would like to go, please make sure that your paperwork for volunteering is approved at the main office. Guidance - This week in guidance in some classes we spent a long time talking about safety and our responsibilities to ourselves and others. In other classes, we talked about accidents that happen at school and the importance of not assuming incidents are done on purpose. We also talked about our reactions when someone apologizes to us after an accident like a push for example. I talked to the students about not saying "It's okay." I want them to show more self-respect and say something like, "Thank you for letting me know it was an accident" or "I accept your apology" or "Accidents happen, I understand." This may sound petty, but I do feel it is important to learn to show self-respect even at a young age.

I also spoke about the importance of admitting when they have accidentally hurt someone and taking responsibility by saying what they did and not just "I'm sorry." We also talked about making amends and trying to help the person we hurt. Please feel free to call me at any time with any questions or concerns you may have.
