Peterson takes Spanish II through Northern State University's distance learning program, called DDN. Other students take classes like astronomy, AP history, AP calculus, senior math, Spanish I and Spanish III through DDN.
"I like (distance learning) because it offers classes that our school does not have," Peterson said.

Other students take classes
through other distance learning centers such as Apex Learning. These students take classes like AP chemistry and AP biology.
"(Distance learning) is involving more students, reaching more numbers and giving students the opportunity to take a larger range of classes that are not offered at Northwestern. Distance learning helps students satisfy the requirements of the South Dakota Opportunities Scholarship also," DDN supervisor at NW, Mrs. Jeannine Jilek said.

At 12:30 p.m. every afternoon, a bus holding about 11 students leaves Northwestern. The destination is Hub Area Technical School (HATS) in Aberdeen. HATS provides Northwestern students with additional classes to the curriculum provided by Northwestern. This year, four other schools sent students to HATS: Aberdeen Central, Roncalli, Warner and Frederick.
One student who particularly enjoyed HATS, sophomore Rachel Finley, took the radio and television production class from Mr. Wayne Hansen. For this class, Finley worked on television and radio commercials, talk shows and the production of basketball games. Finley was required to do ten hours of filming every quarter.
"This class gives students an idea of whether or not
this is a career they want to pursue," Hansen said.
Sophomore Michael Hinners took the building trades class at HATS. In this class, he learned about plumbing, electrical work, sheet rocking, building cabinets, installing windows and putting up siding and shingles. Students in junior high and high school have the opportunity to take classes that focus on building rather than books. Mr. Jerry Sauer teaches these classes that give students a more hands-on learning than the traditional classroom.
"The information and training students receive in these classes is training they can use the rest of their lives. I teach life skills that can be used for further training," Sauer said.

The English classes at Northwestern covered a wide range of materlal. Mrs. Christy Cardella's junior high English students covered everything from grammar to literature and writing to prepare them for Mrs. Nora Groft's high school classes and beyond.

Students in Mrs. Nora Groft's journalism class can expect to know a thing or two about journalistic skills by the end of the year. Journalism students spend their time writing stories, selling ads and taking quizzes over proper journalistic style.
"Journalism students learn to write, edit and produce on a deadline. They learn to work together, and they learn that when someone does not do his or her share of the work, someone else must do it. Journalism students learn that their mistakes are seen by the entire community and that they will be criticized publicly for making errors. These are life skills and lessons that will serve them well in the real world," Groft said.

The class puts out the school newspaper, The Scratchin' Post, at the beginning of every month. The sly students in journalism even put out a fake newspaper on April Fools' Day as a joke. The Litter Box pokes fun at different activities or occurrences around the school.
In addition to the newspaper, the journalism class creates the yearbook, but this endeavor is usually reserved for Journalism II and III students. As co-editors, seniors Maggie Clemensen and Shari Fischbach spent most of their time designing layouts, taking pictures and writing stories for the yearbook.
"I have really enjoyed working on the yearbook. With the implementation of color this year, we could do so much more with the layout of the book," Clemensen said.
