"I love just playing out in the open, getting muddy and slide-tackling the opponent. It is so much







Hippie Day was pretty fun," sophomore Hilary Frericks said.







"Our team really meshed


well. We got along and had a lot of fun. We had amazing players who all played their parts to accomplish our goals," junior Carly Peterson said.








"Experience was gained in the 2008 football season.

Although the football team's season did not turn out as well as had been hoped, the young team gained


experience and strength for next year. The football team will have 12 remaining starters for next season.




"My favorite part of wellness is going to the gym to play some kind of activity and to learn about health and fitness," Boekelheide said.





Other students had the opportunity to see their intended careers up close through job shadowing and internina.


"I am trying to teach them how to be productive, valuable members of the work force," Frericks said.










or undertakings it is going through.

"I decided to take senior math to better prepare myself for college. I don't like getting up early, but I like how it makes you think differently," junior Caroline Hansen said.











"The best part about prom was swimming at the Y. I liked setting up too; it was fun, and overall it turned out really nice," junior Lexi Horning said.












In addition to the newspaper, the journalism class creates the yearbook, but this endeavor is usually reserved for Journalism II and III students. 

The Lady and the Tiger de-






