


After a successful regular season, the Wildcats prepared for post season. The team battled through districts, regions and then ended the season as Class B State Champions.








Students learn of times past and Go Green by promoting good health.





"I'm sad to see my basketball career at Northwestern come to an end, but it was a great experience, and I'll miss my teammates and coaches," senior Shelby Peterson said.


Although the season ended with a district loss to Warner, the team was able to look back on the season with pride.









"Softball is fun because I get to play with my friends, and it keeps me busy," freshman Hannah Palmer said.
























"I enjoy throwing. It is a great time beating people from other schools," sophomore Nathan Palmer said, who qualified for state in discus and broke the school discus record.


