
"We had a good year. Half our team was freshmen, but they stepped it up and got it done. I'm excited for next year when we will be tumbling," junior Kristie Bade said.










How can distance learning be a benefactor for your future?


"Distance learning gives you a different aspect about learning. I like it because you can work at your own pace," senior Landon Fischbach said.






"Distance learning teaches responsibility and independence because you don't always have someone reminding you about assignments," senior Calli Peterson said.

In art class, students are able to display their artistic side by creating masterpieces and participating in mural projects. By having an art class, students can have a broader range of skills and abilities to achieve.






"I am in American history. Social studies is a very interesting subject. Also, it is cool and weird all at the same time because of Mr. Boone!" senior Courtlen Lechner said.








