Reporting Teen Dating Violence and Sexual Assault

A report of dating violence and/or sexual assault will be acted upon according to district policy (see <u>https://policies.smithfield-ps.org/home/jick-b</u>). The school staff shall report all aspects of teen dating violence and sexual assault that may come to their attention. The victim, anyone who witnesses an incidence, and anyone who has credible information that an act of dating violence or sexual assault has taken place may also file a report.

Students who observe any act covered by this policy or who have reasonable grounds to believe an act is taking or has taken place in violation of this policy are obligated to report the incident to school authorities. Failure to do so may result in disciplinary actions. The victim of the dating violence or sexual assault shall, however, not be subject to discipline for failure to report.

Reporting Bullying

A report of bullying may be filed by victims, parents,

or anyone who witnesses an incidence of bullying. The report form and the associated policy are available on the district online policy manual (see <u>https://policies.smithfield-</u> <u>ps.org/home/jick-c</u>.

Any student who believes he/she is being bullied should immediately report such circumstances to an appropriate staff member, teacher or administrator.

The Smithfield School Department takes all reports of bullying seriously and takes action to address the situation, regardless if or if not a determination of bullying is made.

Elementary Report Cards

Next year, the district is expanding its use of the Infinite Campus online gradebook to the elementary level so that families of students in grades K-12 will have real-time access to grades throughout the grading period. In preparation for this change, the elementary report cards have been revised to condense the number of graded standards.

<u>Math Update</u>

The elementary Math Selection Team has narrowed the list of RIDE's highquality elementary math programs to the two that best align with Smithfield's vision for mathematics: <u>Illustrative Mathematics</u> and <u>Eureka²</u>.

Over the course of the next several months, teachers from the team will be piloting units from each program to collect additional evidence of alignment to the district mission. A decision will be made in the spring of 2023 with implementation occurring in the fall.

Digital Citizenship Week

Smithfield Public Schools celebrated <u>Digital</u> <u>Citizenship Week</u> October 17th-21st. Students at the elementary level learned to "be internet awesome" by being kind online. As part of their library centers, they learned how to "share with care" by completing a

variety of online challenges and then used the new makerspace centers to design a message of kindness or create a kind scene.

During library class, students at Gallagher Middle School learned about digital media and the brain, dealing with digital drama, chatting safely online, and finding credible news. Students also signed a pledge to stay positive online.

Smithfield High School students participated in Digital Citizenship lessons and activities in advisory throughout the month of October. Students also learned what the school wide expectations (Positive, Respectful, Inclusive, Dedicated, Empowered) look like in the digital environment.

Walkthroughs

Classroom walkthroughs are utilized in Smithfield as an integral part of school improvement efforts. During these walkthroughs, administrators, consultants, and teachers spend time in classrooms to identify trends across grades and schools. While the purpose of some visits may be as simple as determining if learning objectives are posted, others focus on more complex practices such as the use of questioning in instruction. In all cases, walkthroughs are non-evaluative and are utilized to determine next steps in improvement efforts.

Walkthroughs are powerful in assisting with the implementation of new instructional programs. When Smithfield adopts a new program, formal walkthroughs are conducted at least three times per year using an



observation tool called the Instructional Practice Guide which is focused on three areas: rigorous content, effective instruction, and student engagement. The team of observers debriefs after the classroom visits to determine strengths and opportunities for



continued growth and professional learning in these three areas. Once the professional learning occurs, the team visits classrooms once again to determine if the change has taken hold.

This year, the focus continues to be on the implementation of the new English language arts programs. Since elementary teachers are in year 3 of implementation, they will be provided opportunities to share their expertise

in the use of questioning in their reading lessons by visiting each other's classrooms and

debriefing. Following walkthroughs this fall, secondary English teachers worked together to "unpack" their new units of study and plan lessons aligned with the focus standards.

According to educational expert Dr. Richard Elmore, "To improve student learning, you can raise the level of the content that students are taught. You can increase the skill and knowledge that teachers bring to the teaching of that content. And you can increase the level of students' active learning of the content. That's it." These are the three areas that Smithfield continues to focus on in order to improve student achievement. The district supports



rigorous content by purchasing high-quality instructional materials and then supports effective instruction by providing teachers and administrators professional learning opportunities focused on the use of the materials to engage students.

Information on the Charter School Application to the state and its impact on the Smithfield Public Schools

Recently an application was sent to the Rhode Island Department of Education(RIDE) for a charter school, the Be Well Leadership Academy, to open in Smithfield next year for students in grades 7-12. Below are some important differences between Public Schools and Charter Schools. Of importance, charter schools receive their funding directly from the school district, financially impacting our schools.

- Public School teachers and administrators must have state certification in their subjects and grade levels. This means that teachers must have expertise in their grade and subject matter. Charter school teachers and administrators do not need to have state certification.
- Public Schools must follow state guidelines specifying content knowledge and skills that students must gain in their content and grade levels; this includes the types of classes and graduation requirements. Charter school curricula are "flexible" and do not need to follow the same standards, according to RIDE.
- Public schools must follow state and local regulations, graduation requirements, and other rules to ensure students are receiving a comprehensive education. Charter Schools are authorized by the state to operate "independently from many state and local rules and regulations."
- Public schools are funded through a state aid formula in which funds are distributed once per year and through local funds. The cost per student that Smithfield receives for the 2022-23 year is \$17,308 per student. This funds our teachers, administrators and other personnel; curricula; materials and textbooks; transportation; maintenance; and more.
- Charter schools receive their funding from the public school system in which they are located. This means that a charter school in Smithfield would take funding directly from the Smithfield Public Schools and the Smithfield Public Schools would lose the enrolled cost per student based upon the charter's enrollment.
- The loss of funding would impact our district as a whole, and enrollment at our middle and high schools.
