A great way to start planning your future is to take an interest inventory. Inventories are found in your google classroom, on the counseling website or on the Illinois Career Search System.



## College Visits:

Getting on campus in person or virtually is important. You will be able to see if the school is a good fit for you- do you feel at home here? Is it too big? Too small? The best way to find out is to visit.

Students get 2 total College/Career visits they can use junior and senior year that work like field trips.

These must be approved **at least 1 week** before you go visit.

# Admission Requirements & Reps

The admission rep at any school you are considering needs to be your new best friend- they have insight on requirements, scholarship opportunities and deadlines.

Now is the time to be researching what colleges require for admittance so if you need to take a specific course your senior year you can.

Find out about courses, test scores, and how dual credit can transfer.

Most schools want 4 of each of the core classes- but some have unique requirements for specific majors- examples: engineering schools typically want you to complete Physics, southern schools want 4 years of history.

Check websites and visit for specific info.

# Resumes/ Portfolios

Start writing your resume or keeping track of volunteer work, job experience and leadership activities.

You may also want to list relevant elective classes that pertain to potential majors or jobs. Keep track of any awards/leadership positions held:

Academic

Athletic

Extra-curricular

A portfolio is a collection of your best work: It will show your progress and growth.

Start saving work now-paper, video, photographs, etc.

## Letters of Rec:

Some colleges and most scholarships want letters of recommendation. Having a resume ready to hand to whomever you are asking to write for you is helpful.

Give people at least 2 week notice before the deadline so they can write a nice, thoughtful letter.

# ACT vs. SAT

These exams are 1 of many items colleges/ scholarship committees and/ or employers may use when evaluating your application. Currently the SAT is given free at HHS in April. You may retake or take it along with the ACT during a National Test Date for a small fee. See your school counselor if you think you qualify for a fee waiver.

# Transcripts

Your transcript lists each of our semester classes and your SEMESTER grades.

Your attendance, GPA, Class rank, test scores and progress towards graduation are also listed.

You will request these using a free parchment account after you apply to a college or university.



# FAFSA

Free Application for Federal Student Aid.

You will complete this after October 1st your senior year.

You and your parents will each complete a part with the previous years' tax information.

You will list potential colleges and receive award letters to help you compare prices, loans and scholarships.

# NCAA

Students interested in playing D1 or D2 sport must be deemed eligible through the eligibility center.

Student athletes may complete a free profile to start the process- this can be transitioned into a certification page later.






