Spray plane crashes near Foster

According to a statement released by the Pierce County Sheriff's Office, at 12:30 p.m. on June 15, a small, single engine aircraft went down while spraying a field Northeast of Foster.

Piloting the aircraft was 27 year-old Brandon Rosberg of Bloomfield. During the flight, the plane lost power and attempted to land on the road but failed. The plane skidded into a hay meadow and landed on its top.

The Plane was owned by Bloomfield Ag & Aerial.

Rosberg was transported to Osmond General Hospital by Osmond Rescue with non-life threatening injuries.

The accident was investigated by the Pierce County Sheriff and has since been turned over to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA).

I've heard it said that to truly appreciate something you have to "walk a mile in one's shoes."

We live in an agricultural society - I also hear that a lot, usually when someone wants to open a feedlot or justify some trucks barreling down the county roads or something. I appreciate it, I truly do, we wouldn't have a town if it weren't for the agricultural community, the farmers, ranchers and even an occasional chicken farmer.

A few months ago we picked up 10 piglets, runts of course, to see if we could try our hand at the raising of some oinkers.

"What LB840 Can Do For You"

After seven years of seeing the need and countless efforts of surveys and studies, an economic arm under the city was formed.

It has been a blessing for the community and helps to stem off degradation and extinction. Those are pretty powerful words for what has been the norm for some communities that do not have an economic development plan or agency in place.

Many communities belong to some sort of district-wide economic development district and they are a wonderful resource but they are stretched to their capacity helping several counties let alone communities. The old adage is that if you want something done do it yourself fits very well here. Economic development directly has helped to bring in development on Highway #20 while indirectly lighting a fire to assist others to help themselves.

There is no doubt that we have lost business during the past decade and

some of them were mainstays of the community for several years. Part of that is nothing more than pure capitalism at its best or worst.

Watson Motors and the car dealership left purely because of the loss of the GM dealership that was decided at a much higher level.

SiDump'r also left the community for much of the same reasoning. Contrary to some popular rumors, the city could not have prevented them from leaving. We could not offer enough incentives to compete with Columbus and that was that.

Hartington is a good example of that. When Leprino Cheese left their factory, it wasn't because the city was weak nor was it because of things they had done wrong. It was purely business for the Leprino Company to liquidate and consolidate their operations elsewhere.

Ertl toy factory in Dyersville, Iowa was a cornerstone of the community but opted to send their operations to Mexico based upon labor and business decisions. It is what you do following the move that makes a community tick.

Plainview was a community long before many of the businesses that we had looked elsewhere. Our economic development arm is now reaching out to see what bushes they can shake and

one of the major tools that we have is LB840.

This is an economic development plan that allows a portion of our sales tax to be used to promote development and progress. The biggest priority for the LB840 committee and the Economic Development Director is to jump start housing on North 4th Street.

Using funds from the LB840 sales tax, the City of Plainview purchased 10 lots from Max and Laura Risinger to promote housing and to look at creative ways to assist home builders in this effort. Even before the ink has dried on the purchase agreements, inquiries are being made and that is good. The next development to use LB840 funds for is the newly created signage program.

In order to get the downtown and other areas to look a little better, LB840 funds will match up to \$1,000 for the first ten businesses that submit a plan to upgrade their signage or beautify their frontage. Each project will be on a case by case basis and if you wish to get this for your business, let me know at the city office or contact Roger Synovec at 402-841-2901.

This can be as creative as you want to allow your facility stand out. LB840 money is technically your money and if you have ideas on how

to make this money work for all businesses in the future talk to any one of the LB840 committee members or call down to the city offices for details.

Every six months, the LB840 committee will hold a public hearing to get input on the program and how the program is working.

Another way to keep Plainview the place we all want to call home is to clean up your own yards by keeping the grass mowed and getting rid of junk that doesn't belong.

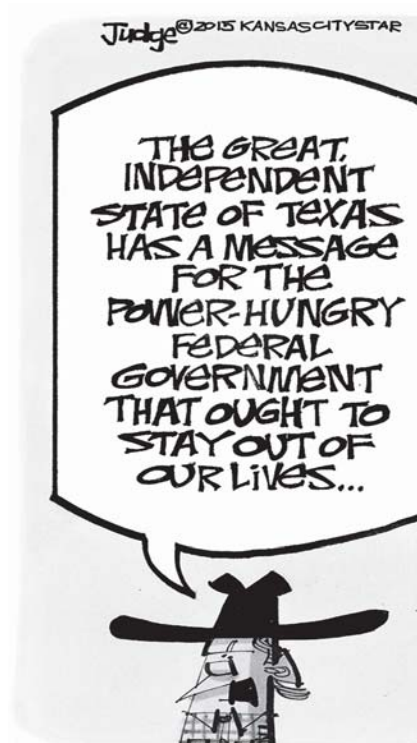

Death penalty petition circulates in Pierce County

The referendum petition filed by a committee called "Nebraskans for the Death Penalty" arrived in Pierce County this week, and was being circulated by a volunteer in Plainview on Tuesday afternoon.

Pierce County Sheriff Rick Eberhardt, serving in a volunteer capacity, was in Plainview on Tuesday with petition blanks for those interested in signing the petition that would "restore the death penalty by repealing all of LB 268 enacted by the Legislature" a month ago at the end of the

2015 session. The petition requires 10 percent of registered voters to add the question of the restoration of the death penalty in Nebraska, or 117,000 signatures by the August 27 deadline.

Eberhardt reported that he was hoping for 700 signatures from Pierce County, and that he had already received upwards of 600 before coming to Plainview.

Immunization Museum welcomes visitors

Plainview will hold the Plainview WIC and Immunization clinic on Wednesday, June 24th from 10:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Our Savior's Lutheran Church 1st & Pilcher St. Plainview.

NENCAP's WIC Program provides nutrition education and supplemental foods to income eligible pregnant, breast-feeding or postpartum women, infants, and children to age 5 years.
NENCAP's Immunization Program provides childhood immunizations to VFC eligible children. Immunizations are needed at ages 2 months, 4 months, 6 months, & 12-15 months. School required immunizations are needed prior to entry into kindergarten (ages 4-6) and seventh grade. Lead screening is also available by appointment only to children ages 12 months to 5 years of age.

Each child should be accompanied by the parent or guardian. Past immunization records are required. Proxy forms are needed when a parent or legal guardian is unable to accompany the child to clinic. Proxy forms may be obtained by contacting the Pender office at (402) 385-6300. No one will be denied immunizations for inability to make a donation. This project is supported in part by Federal Immunization Program Funds awarded to Northeast Nebraska Community Action Partnership by the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services.

Adult vaccine (MMR, Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, Tdap, Pneumovax, TB testing) is available to the public. We may be able to bill your insurance company. Call the Pender office at (402) 385-6300 for more information.

NENCAP's Healthy Families is a parent support program where parents can learn about positive discipline, social emotional development and benefits of good physical and emotional health. Parents may be eligible for the program prenatally or until the infant is 3 months of age and is offered at no cost to families. Parents are all offered information and connection to support services in the community.

Foy George Memorial Band Shell on Historic Register

Plainview's Band Shell Park has been the center of the town's annual Klown Days celebration several times. However, the park would not exist without the concrete monolith that gives the park its name.

In 1935 the Works Progress Administration (WPA), an organization setup by President Franklin D. Roosevelt during the Great Depression, was looking for a way to create jobs here in Northeast Nebraska. The WPA decided to construct a recreational facility designed for "community uses such as plays, concerts, and speeches," hiring more than 20 people to work on the park.

The actual construction of the Park would not begin for several years. WPA workers had leveled the ground in 1936, but no official design plans were ordered until 1938, when the WPA hired architect Elbert B. Watson to design the Band Shell. In 1939, actual construction began and lasted for three years, of-

ficially ending in July, 1942. No dedication ceremony was held since the Band Shell had already been used to host concerts by that time.

Since then, the Band Shell Park has become part of Plainview's culture. It has been host to a myriad of local events, including a post-Pearl Harbor "Victory Rally" designed to show the town's national pride, several concerts, and has been the site of Plainview's annual Klown Days festival. Four other, similar, band shells have been identified in Nebraska (one in Auburn, one in Grant, one in Lincoln and one in Basset), but none match the distinctive modern concrete style of Plainview's.

In July, 1992, Carol Ahlgren, an architectural historian, applied for the Band Shell Park to join the National Registry of Historic Places. Ahlgren stated that the Band Shell should qualify because of its "association with the Works Progress Administration" and is an "excellent example of cast concrete construction in the modern style."

The National Registry confirmed the Band Shell in November of 1992 because "it meets the National Register Criteria" and should be "considered significant statewide."

Trey Boyer-Official of the Year

Trey Boyer was honored at the Nebraska Scholastic Wrestling Coaches Association Banquet on Friday, June 12th held in Grand Island.

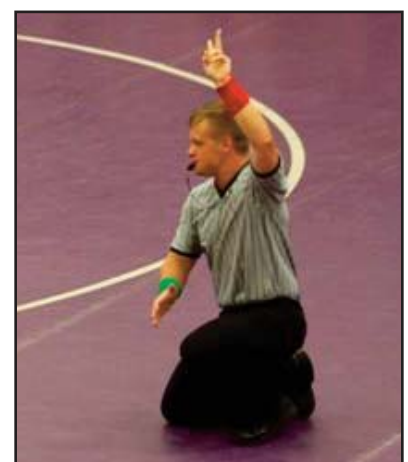
He was selected by the coaches association as the Official of the Year for Wrestling.

Cracker Jack Prizes

Q: When I was a kid in the 1950s, Cracker Jack was one of my favorite snacks. I loved the prizes inside each box and have a cigar box full of ones I managed to save. Since I have some duplicates, I would like to find others who collect so I can swap for ones I don't already have. — Paul, Mercer Island, Washington

A: F.W. Rueckenheim introduced his popcorn confection during the 1893 Chicago World's Fair. It was an immediate hit. In 1912, prizes were added to each box, and since then more than 18 billion have been distributed. Almost anything associated with this popcorn, molasses and peanut product is collectible.

Some of the prizes have become extremely valuable. For example, a horse-drawn wagon trinket from the 1930s, \$450; a nodding-head elephant, also from the same period, \$500; magic game book, circa 1940s, \$50; paper whistles, 1940s, \$40; and a miniature grandfather clock, 1947, \$100. Plastic toys from the 1950s generally sell in the \$3 to \$10 range.

I suggest you contact the Cracker Jack Collectors Association, a group formed in 1994. Dues are \$20, which includes a subscription to "Prize Insider," a quarterly publication packed with information. Contact is c/o Linda Farris, 4908 N. Holborn Drive, Muncy, IN 47300. ***

Q: I have an opportunity to buy a Wheaties cereal box from 1977 featuring Bruce Jenner. The asking price is \$300. Do you think this is a good deal? — Bob, Chesterfield, Missouri

A: Bruce Jenner became a major sports star after his decathlon triumph at the Montreal Olympics in 1977. He was featured on the Wheaties cereal box. Following his recent sexual reassignment surgery, interest in that cereal box has soared. The last time I checked eBay, it was selling in the \$150 to \$250 range. Is \$300 a good deal? Only time will tell. Trust your gut. Also be aware that knock-offs are beginning to surface, fakes from Asia. ***

Q: I have a copy of Look magazine from Aug. 29, 1950, with Hopalong Cassidy on its cover. Is it worth keeping? — Bill, Gaithersburg, Maryland

A: Your edition of Look magazine sells in the \$25 to \$35 range. As with most collectibles, condition is extremely important.

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* Save the peels from your oranges, and dry them at a low temperature in the oven. You can add them to a pot of coffee or tea for a flavor boost that is refreshing and delicious.

* "If your tomato garden is experiencing caterpillars, try planting dillweed close to your tomatoes. It can provide a diversion, allowing your tomatoes to grow pest-free!" — Y.F. in Florida

* "Cure your color in new garments (especially dark- or bright-colored) by soaking the item in cold, salty water before washing. Make sure that the fabric will allow this!

After the brush is washed, combine enough water to cover the bristles and add two tablespoons of fabric softener. * Baking soda can be used as a tooth scrub. It's particularly effective against stains, as it is a mild abrasive.

Close Up Washington DC, New York City Trip "One To Remember"

Plainview Public Schools took part in the Close Up Washington DC/NYC annual trip from May 24 – June 1.

The trip began early morning (6 a.m.) with the flight leaving at 10 a.m. The group traveled with other Nebraska students from Wayne High School, Columbus Scotus High School and East Butler High School.

In all there were 46 Nebraskans in the group. The group stayed at the Hyatt Regency in Crystal City, Arlington, Va.

"The location of the hotel is excellent as it is a short subway ride to all major attractions. The weather was much hotter as temperature reached 94 upon arrival. The humidity was about that high as well. The students did not complain at all and we kept moving," said advisor Patty Novicki.

Once the plane landed, the teachers set off to the orientation meeting as the group didn't arrive until around 4:30 p.m. The student dinner and orientation began at 6:00 p.m.

That evening the students listened to a debate between and conservative and liberal on major issues we are facing in this country-one of which is same sex marriage and the legal issues behind this topic. Students took an active part in this debate and Christian Zuhke and Carter Scott both assisted with the moderating of the debate.

Day two began early with breakfast at 7:30 a.m.

Students boarded the bus and headed to the Jefferson Memorial, Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial and the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial. After a bus transfer to lunch they had a study visit at the Smithsonian American History Museum.

The group traveled next to a local neighborhood to take in the culture of that neighborhood and were given time to explore the area. The students headed back to the hotel for Workshop time and dinner.

After dinner, the students attended

workshop on current issue topics, which included school bullying, mandating reciting of the Pledge of Allegiance, gun violence in schools, and youth obesity.

The day ended with the usual student lounge for a little free time from 10 -11 p.m. with bed check beginning at 11 p.m.

Tuesday began at 7:00 a.m. with the group heading to Capitol Hill for the morning workshop and to the Capitol Reflecting Pool for the whole group photo. The students learn to navigate the Hill to prepare for Wednesday, which was the Capitol Hill Day.

A bus transfer to the US Law Enforcement Memorial for a study visit and then to lunch at National Place was next on the agenda. The afternoon activities continued with a World War II Memorial study visit. The group traveled to Arlington National Cemetery for a study visit about the Women in Military Service Memorial Auditorium and an Armed Forces panel discussion.

The day was packed full of activities as a bus transfer to the Korean Memorial, Vietnam Memorial, and Lincoln Memorial for study visits. The group continued to the Pentagon City Mall for dinner with a bus transfer to the hotel for a domestic issues workshop. The evening concluded with a Capitol Hill Prep Workshop and a Congressional Simulation. Student lounge was open from 10-11 p.m. and bed check at 11 p.m.

Wednesday morning started with breakfast and the group's first attempt at maneuvering the subway system in Washington DC.

The group headed to the White House for a tour. The tour guidelines are very strict and do not allow any bags of any sort and since no one in the group was 18 years old (except Mrs. Novicki and she is barely over that age), they had to take turns holding bags needed for the day and went in shifts.

The girls went through while the boys held personal items and then Novicki returned to the start of security to take the boys through.

"We all made it through and made a stop at Lafayette Park to see the lady who has been protesting several issues since the 1980s. We then headed to Capitol Hill for lunch and a tour of the Capitol Building," said Novicki. "Along the way we made stops at Congressional offices, Thomas Jefferson Library of Congress, and the Supreme Court building. We met in Senator Deb Fischer's office for our tour."

The group also made a stop by the

National Archives to look at the Declaration of Independence, The U. S. Constitution, and the Bill of Rights.

"This is an amazing experience as these are the actual documents signed by the Founding Fathers of this great country," said Novicki.

After a full morning and afternoon of activities they headed to Union Station, the original train station of Washington D.C., for dinner and then to Georgetown for exploration. The exploration led the group to Georgetown Cupcakes for a little dessert.

They also went on a study visit to the Kennedy Center complete with a visit to the terrace for a fabulous view of the city.

Next on the agenda and final activity for the day was a study visit to the Air Force Memorial. The evening concluded with student lounge and bed check.

Thursday, the youth and advisors went off program to explore the city on their own, which means no rest for the wicked when we are in the city. The students need to see as much as possible so off we were early in the morning. Sights on Thursday included the Holocaust Memorial Museum and a trip to Arlington National Cemetery. While walking to the Changing of the Guard ceremony, we were fortunate to see a ceremony with veterans from the Battle of Salsburg, which was the 70th Anniversary.

Four veterans from this battle, which included the commander of the troops, laid a wreath on the memorial. The group served with Audie Murphy, who is the most decorated military man in history.

The group, led by the Ambassador to Austria, headed to the gravesite of Audie Murphy to lay a wreath there as well. The group also witnessed a military burial, complete with the horse drawn caisson draped with an American flag.

"We then headed to the middle of the historical sites of Washington D.C. to tour the Peterson House and Ford's Theater," said Novicki. The Peterson House is where President Lincoln was taken when he shot at Ford's Theater, which is directly across the street from the theater. The actual bed where Lincoln died is on display in the house.

Next to Peterson House a museum was created with the timeline of Lincoln's life and the death of this great man. This was time for some souvenir shopping and time for the students to see the sites that they wanted to see. Some students went back to the Smithsonian American History Museum or the Natural History Museum to see the Hope Diamond. The

day concluded with the Farewell Dinner and concluding activities, which includes a dance.

The morning routine began a little earlier on Friday as breakfast was at 6:00 a.m. so the group could load luggage and board the bus at 6:45 a.m. for the Big Apple.

The arrival in NYC was around lunchtime so we went to a local neighborhood to eat. The students and teachers were given an hour to eat and explore.

Most people ate the typical New York style pizza from a local parlor. Immediately following lunch the group had a scheduled tour of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. The next stop was at Central Park.

By the time they had so many activities completed, it was time for dinner. HB Burger was the restaurant of choice, which is near Broadway and not far from Times Square. This meant the group would walk through Times Square early evening. The day concluded with a Broadway play titled "Mamma Mia." The production is based on the songs of ABBA. "It was absolutely fantastic," said Novicki.

After an extremely busy day on Friday, Saturday was much the same.

They transferred to Battery Park at 7:30 a.m. The entire morning was spent at Liberty Island and Ellis Island. The students were led by the program instructors and were given the history behind the Statue of Liberty and the immigration movement to the United States through Ellis Island.

After completing the study visit, students walked through the financial district of NYC, better known as Wall Street. While in the area they were shown Ground Zero and the 911 Memorial as well. A bus transfer to the lower east side and Chinatown of Manhattan was our next stop. They toured Chinatown and Little Italy.

Dinner was eaten at an Italian restaurant named Puglia's - famous for a scene in the movie Big Daddy. "After a wonderful Italian dinner, we did some souvenir shopping in Little Italy and headed to the Brooklyn Bridge and then went to Rockefeller Plaza to see the city at time from the Top of the Rock. What an amazing view," said Novicki.

As the group took a late flight on Sunday, they took the opportunity to go back into Manhattan.

They began the day early as usual with a quick lesson on using the New York City Subway system. It was a short walk to Rockefeller Plaza to see the taping of the Today Show. The highlight of the day was getting our 15 seconds of fame as the group could

be seen on television.

The group had the rest of the morning and early afternoon to see sights and do some souvenir shopping - they toured the St. Peter's Cathedral on 5th Avenue and continued to walk around Manhattan. The girls of course, preferred to shop up and down 5th Avenue.

"We ate lunch at off the hot dog street vendor, a must when you visit New York City. We went back to the hotel to get our luggage in anticipation of our trip home. We arrived at the airport only to find that our flight had been canceled. We were told that we couldn't catch a flight until Monday. We found a hotel and stayed overnight. We arrived home safely at 3 a.m. on Tuesday morning," said Novicki.

The teachers did a few different things, as the program is separate from them.

On Monday, we took a day trip to the Naval Academy in Annapolis. Tuesday was spent in Old Towne Alexandria with dinner on the wharf. The Nebraska teachers decided to take the train to Baltimore to catch an Orioles game in the evening.

The logistics were a little difficult but we managed, up until the delayed train coming back to Washington DC, which meant they could not take the subway home since it stops running at midnight.

All in all it was reported as an interesting adventure and a great ballpark to visit. The rest of the trip was spent with the students and that program.

"The students had an exciting and educational experience," said Novicki.

The Memorial Day weekend was a great time to visit the city since Rolling Thunder, a group of motorcyclists that includes about 500,000 or more bikers embarking on the city.

"It is spectacular to see them in the parade and to visit with them as they stay in the hotels. Arlington National Cemetery is beautifully decorated and you can see the sadness in the eyes of the young people that visit the gravesites. It never ceases to amaze me, even after almost 20 years, how excited the students get when they see the sights and meet new friends," said Novicki. "These friendships will last a lifetime as well as the memories. Thanks to all of the community members that supported the fundraisers throughout the school year. Without your support the trip would be an impossible trip for some of the students."
