Write-in votes had 19, but no candidates were official.

#### **Countywide Results**

A 57 percent turnout was counted by the Pierce County Clerk of oters in the election.

Pierce County voters elected Deb Fischer for a second term at the U.S. Senate. Statewide results were the same, electing Fischer over Jane Raybould (D), and Jim Schultz (I).

Adrian Smith (R) won his seventh-term by a landslide vote in Pierce County. Smith outpaced Paul Theobald, 76 percent to 23 per-

Governor Pete Ricketts and Mike Foley won a second term at the State's highest position. Ricketts/Foley also won the state nod, by near 20 points.

Secretary of State Bob Evnen took Pierce County's vote. Evnen also took the state nod over Spencer Danner.

Charlie Janssen was re-elected to the State Auditor role for another term by Plerce County voters. Statewide Janssen won over Jane Skinner (D) 57 to 42 percent.

Pierce County Voters denied the Initative 427 Medicare Expansion vote by a tally of 1,684 against to 921 for. Statewide voters, in unofficial numbers, passed Initiative 427 for the expansion 53 percent to 46 percent.

#### **Local Elections**

The Nebraska Legislative Race between Tim Gragert and Keith Kube in District 40 to the north of Plainview was decided late Tuesday with Gragert ending up about 450 votes ahead of Kube for the \_egislative seat.

Tim Gragert posted 7,181, or 51.59 percent of the vote. Kube had 6,738 or 48.46 perent of the overall vote.

Those totals were with one precinct in Holt County yet to report. Antelope County Commissioner for District 1 was won by Dean Smith, ousting long-time incumbent Jerald Schwager by a 74 to 25 percent margin.

Smith had 349 votes and Schwager posted 121.

The Antelope County Ag Society vote went "For" with 1,199 votes n favor and 1,104 votes against.

Brunswick's Village Trustees were Craig A. Forbes with 45 votes, and Lynn Pellatz with 20, and a write-in candidate(s) receiving 28. The determination is unsure by the News at press time.

Antelope County Voters moved against Initiative 427 by a commanding 1,491 votes against and 867 for the Medicare expansion.

to their school, by participating in extracurricular activities, they perform better in the classroom.


It is more challenging in this day and age to get kids to sacrifice and to put down their e-devices and gaming systems for some exercise.
