The open house will be held at the Plainview Public Library from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m. on the 14th, with three options and playground maps available for viewing. All are invited to attend to help consider plans, layout and equip-

School renovation open house on Sept. 17


Plainview Public Schools will be hosting an open house for District patrons to visit the school and view the extensive restroom and other renovations that were completed this summer.

The open house will be held on Sunday, Sept. 17 from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m. at the Plainview Public High School.

"This is likely the only opportunity for folks to see the locker rooms which underwent the most extensive renovations," said Superintendent Dr. Darron Arlt. "The restrooms they will see if they come to school events, but if you don't have kids or grandkids in the system, stakeholders likely don't come to school."

"We want to show our stakeholders how we have invested their tax dollars. Board of Education members and community members will be on hand during the Open House to guide their tour and answer any questions they might have about the decision-making process to make this half million dollar investment in modernizing our facilities and what might be under consideration in the next year."

At the Board of Education meeting on Monday, Sept. 11, the board approved another \$500,000 in tax request for the special building fund for building restoration planned for the next year.

CHI Health Plainview takes lead in services

August 10-12 Catholic Health Initiatives, or CHI Health, parent company of the Plainview hospital, clinic, and home health systems, held a two-state-wide retreat at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln.

Attending from Plainview were administrator Greg Beckmann, nurse practitioner Lisa Montgomery, and community board member Dennis Vossberg.

Also attending were representatives from 11 other Nebraska hospitals and three from lowa, all of which are attached to CHI of Nebraska, headquartered in Omaha.

The purpose of the retreat was to inspire service and leadership, provide information about national healthcare issues and trends, promote healthcare provider engagement, and share hospital measures and accomplishments. There were also plenty of opportunities to give feedback, exchange ideas, and network with other participants.

In the course of reviewing the last fiscal year's accomplishments, the Plainview representatives were pleasantly surprised to find that the Plainview facility compared exceedingly well against its peer group.

In fact, Plainview was revealed to have led or shared the lead in several key measures. Measures in which Plainview shared the lead were in provider satisfaction, overall quality of service, and safety.

Plainview was the overall leader in the key rating of patient experience with a score in the 97th percentile of the national database.

Of course the larger facilities led in terms of overall revenue and profitability, mainly because of a larger patient base, but the Plainview board felt strongly that the local employees have done their best in what was within their control, and that they deserve high commendation and wished to recognize all employees for their dedication and focused work.

The hospital, clinic and home health employ 72 full and part-time workers, making it one of the Plainview community's largest employ-

CHI is the largest health care provider in Nebraska. The Plainview facility was purchased from the city by CHI (then known as Alegent Health) in January of 2012.

Boyer served as Ambassador in rural leadership program

Tyan Boyer, a junior at the University of Nebraska – Kearney was selected to serve as a Rural Futures Institute Ambassador over the summer, providing camps and training for students

in McCook. Boyer was a 2015 graduate Plainview High School, and is the son of Dean and Christi Boyer of Plainview.

The RFI program is provided by the University of Nebraska, and connects rural communities, the university faculty and students into a central "nexus" that allows for innovative

projects to better rural Nebraska.

Boyer was part of such innovation, hand-picked by his instructor, Nate Bickford, to carry out the plan of a grant award that Bickford had received to start health camps for middle school kids by incorporating various educational platforms by way of "camps" directly into communities, in this case, McCook.

In essence, Boyer, and his friend and classmate, Collin Fleecs, were placed into the community of McCook and spent June 5 to July 14 hosting camps for middle school youth covering topics from Aquaponics and Hydroponics to health and exercise, nutrition and technology.

The RFI typically serves communities through "serviceships," of a similar nature, but this one, because of its direct impact inside McCook specifically, and its length of time providing camps, was a new venture for the organization - since the staff, and students, at the University of Nebraska – Kearney, approached RFI about the project, and then pitched it to the community of McCook as well. Typically communities come to RFI and are matched with projects that are already on-going.

While hosting the camps in McCook, Boyer and Fleecs, also performed various projects for the Economic Development Director in McCook and the Mc-Cook Community Hospital. At the City, Boyer said he sat in on town meetings and helped design videos to highlight businesses in McCook, and for the hospital, the team presented information on exercise and nutrition to staff, and designed a weight-loss competition amongst businesses in town for bragging rights as the "healthiest business" in the com-

Along with all of that, Boyer said he also spent time shadowing physical therapists at the hospital, as his major in Exercise Science with a minor in Health Science has led him to want to attend Physical therapy school, and pursue a doctorate and practice in an outpatient clinic.

There are plans for Boyer and Fleecs to go back to McCook and provide the camps again, however the overall goal of the program has been to bring on other students to train them to take over the camps. Grants have been applied for, and received, to continue to grow these camps.

The camp started by Boyer and Fleecs will again be in Mc-Cook next summer, but will hopefully expand in the following years, perhaps up to five communities, with potential for

So far, the group has begun gaining some statewide attention with news coverage by local newspapers, as well as a special on Nebraska Television, highlighting the RFI program and the other communities that were impacted this past season by stu-

The RFI group, launched in 2013, serves to "provide an initiative to continue to help allow rural communities to thrive and prosper in the face of urbanization." From the group's Vision Story: "Rural America unleashes the full potential of its leadership economic capacity, cultural creativity and natural resources, creating explicit value for small and large communities within and beyond its geography. Rural places have become the legitimate best choice for leaders businesses, families, graduates and explorers. Rural people earn global respect for fueling the future of humankind." Board approves \$4.8 million request Plainview's Board of Education flect what the school actually pursuing it.

members held their regular meeting on Monday September 11th at 5:30 p.m. for two special hearings, review of policy, and regular reports from the administration.

The two special hearings were for the school district's budget and tax

Superintendent Dr. Darron Arlt began the first special hearing for the 2017-2018 school budget by giving a power point presentation to board members outlining the proposed budget. He reviewed the school's primary sources of revenue and expenditures and compared them against the district's financial numbers in past years.

Arlt reported that, overall, property valuations for the district, the largest source of revenue for the school, were down from last year. The budgeted tax request remained relatively the same, going down only slightly from \$4,826,283.79 last year to \$4,823,232.28 for the proposed budget.

These two factors will drive the tax rate up for land owners from approximately .645 to .660 for the 2017

Superintendent Arlt commented that budgeted amounts rarely re-

spends and told board members that the school district typically spends about 90 percent of what is budgeted.

Last year the reported school disbursements from the general fund was \$5,175,465.00 out of last year's budget of approximately \$6.1 million, which was about 83 percent. Despite the district spending below the typical 90 percent budgeted number, the new proposed budget for the general fund for the 2017-2018 school year remained relatively the same from last year at \$6,108,224.00.

The floor was then opened to board members and district patrons for questions about the proposed budget. One inquired about talk of using school funds to pave the gravel street near the football field, and if that cost was justified in helping educate students.

Board member Vicki Petersen responded by saying that she saw it as more of a safety issue concerning the rain, mud, and drainage problems for both vehicles and students. She also commented that they were only exploring their options for a potential project and its costs, and no decisions had been made about

Another comment from the public during the special School Budget Hearing was about the \$1,200,000 number for the building fund and what was planned. Superintendent Arlt responded

that the budget was only requesting \$505,000.00 for the new budget year which was similar to last year's request. A board member said that the money was planned to upgrade and replace systems in the high school and elementary in the coming years, much like the bathroom and locker room projects that were completed over the summer. Students and parents from the

public also commented how nice the project turned out and how it will look and function to the public, faculty, and students who will use it. During the regular meeting,

school board members ended up passing both the proposed budget and tax request for the 2017-2018 school year.



Three tons of waste collected at RC&D event

The Northeast Nebraska Resource Conservation & Development (RC&D) Council in partnership with four communities, Cedar County and the Ponca Tribe of Nebraska hosted Household Hazardous Waste and Electronic Waste recycling events last week which served 115 households.

These events were funded in part by a grant awarded to the RC&D from the Nebraska Environmental Trust. Since 1992 the Trust has provided over \$265 million in grants to more than 2,000 projects across the state.

Leftover household products that contain corrosive, toxic, ignitable, or reactive ingredients are considered to be household hazardous waste (HHW). Almost three ton of material was properly disposed of or recycled at these HHW events. This included 675# of pesticide, 5030# of paint, 46# of acids, 22 gallons of used oil, nine gallons of antifreeze, 13 gallons of 2-4D, two gallons of Roundup, 41 florescent light bulbs, and 180# of recyclables.

Red Willow County Household Hazardous Waste of McCook was the contractor.

Nebraska Electronics Recycling & Disposal of Norfolk was selected as the contractor for the electronic waste recycling. Households were able to properly dispose of 4.5 ton of electronic items including computers, TVs, printers, batteries, and more. TVs are very difficult to dispose of and people who brought the 79 that were collected during these events were happy to finally have a proper place to get rid of

These events are held annually if possible and the RC&D Council moves them around their sixcounty service area in an effort to reach out to all citizens. For more information on these or other RC&D projects, call the office at 402-582-4866 or via email at northeastrcd@plvwtelco.net.

West Nile Virus is contracted through mosquitoes that have bitten an infected bird. Generally birds cannot pass the virus to humans. West Nile Virus symptoms are flu-like and can include a slight fever or headache. Severe symptoms are not likely, but can lead to encephalitis, which can cause inflammation of the brain, disorientation, convulsions and paralysis. People over 50, infants, and pregceptible to this disease.

Mosquitos are trapped in several locations across the North Central District Health Department (NCDHD) nine-county region. NCDHD will continue to trap mosquitos and will take calls regarding sick or dead birds that have been found. If you would find a dead bird that may have died from West Nile Virus, report the bird to NCDHD at 1-877-336-

Overweight? All Is Not Lost!

Need to shed 15 or 25 pounds? Try this trick: Pick up a 15- or 25-pound turkey in the grocery store (or a bag of soil at the nursery). Then carry it around for a few minutes. Did you find it tough to do? Extra pounds take a toll, don't they? But weight gain is often such a gradual process that you might not even realize it's happening.1

Sadly, more and more people are dying from weight-related health problems. This includes high blood pressure, cardiovascular disease, cancer, and other conditions. In 2015, 40 percent of 4 million deaths linked to weight were in people who weren't even considered obese, just overweight.² And for those who gain more, the risks are even greater. For example, 44 extra pounds in midlife increases your risk of type 2 diabetes by 10 times. There's an emotional toll as well. A recent study found that heavy kids faced three times the risk of depression in adulthood.3

Okay, enough of the scary statistics. I'm here to also say that even small changes can make a big difference. For example, did you know that losing just 7 percent of your body weight can cut

your risk of diabetes by 60 percent?4 So what can you do? As I'm sure you're aware, there's no shortage of weight-loss tips out

there. Here are a few backed by recent research: • Weigh yourself regularly, especially during times of life transition, such as pregnancy or mar-

riage. See the number going up? Nip that trend in the bud before it gets even harder to do.1 · Down water instead of other drinks. Following 16,000 adults, researchers found that drink-

ing a glass of water instead of a beer every day reduced the risk of obesity by 20 percent. Substituting water for sugar-sweetened drinks lowered the risk by 15 percent.⁵ · Be wary of artificially sweetened drinks, though. Among 1,000 subjects in seven clinical tri-

als, aspartame, saccharin, and sucralose showed no major weight-loss benefits. In fact, data from 30 observational studies involving 400,000 people showed a link between artificial sweeteners and obesity. These kinds of studies, however, can't prove a cause-and-effect relationship. "Keep on walking, keep on walking," to paraphrase Dory from Finding Nemo. A global study looked at "activity gaps" and found that waistlines have widened in places where walking rates

have declined.⁷ The great thing about this activity is that nearly everyone can do it. And it doesn't cost much, just the price of a good pair of shoes. On your walks, you can also try a few quick bursts of fast walking or running to burn extra calories.⁸ · Get enough sleep. This link might be something you don't think much about. But studies have

shown a lack of sleep may contribute to obesity. Of course, it goes without saying that you need to focus on healthy food choices, too. Eat

more vegetables, fruits, lean meats, fish, and nonfat dairy products. And don't tempt fate. Keep sugary, starchy foods out of your house, if you can.8







Plainview Public Schools Board of **Education Meeting**

Monday, September 11, 2017

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education of District 5 of Plainview, NE, was preceded by the budget public hearing and tax request hearing, all in the secondary media center on Monday, September 11, 2017. The rules for open meetings were posted at the back of the room for both hearings and the regular

A public hearing to present the proposed 2017-2018 budget was called to order at 5:30 p.m. by Mike Sauser, president. Krause moved, Peterson seconded to declare an open meeting. Upon roll call vote, the ayes were unanimous. Motion carried. Roll call was answered by Sauser, Vicki Peterson, Jan Krause and Krista Hanks. Jason Ashburn and Mike Scott were absent and excused. Peterson moved, Krause seconded to approve the agenda. Upon roll call vote, the ayes were unanimous, with Ashburn and Scott absent. Motion carried

Superintendent Arlt reviewed details of the proposed budget. State aid increased by \$44,000 and the district property valuations decreased by \$17,675,678.00. The decrease in valuation is (2.36%). General Fund resources available for 2017-2018 are estimated at \$6,826,858.00, including \$5,438,224.00 budgeted for non-special education purposes, \$670,000.00 budgeted for special education and \$718,634.00 for cash reserves. Tax asking for 2017-2018 is \$4,823,232.00 down \$3051.00 from 2016-2017. Discussion followed. The hearing closed at 6:01 p.m.

A hearing for the purpose of considering the tax requests for the 2017-2018 budget was then opened by Sauser at 6:02 p.m. Peterson moved, Krause seconded, to declare an open meeting. Upon roll call vote, the ayes were unanimous, with Ashburn and Scott absent. Motion carried. Sauser, Peterson, Hanks, and Krause answered roll call. Jason Ashburn and Mike Scott were absent and excused.

It was indicated that the budget, discussed at the previous hearing, would require a 0.591332 tax levy for the General Fund and a 0.069162 levy for the Building Fund, for a total tax levy of 0.660494, compared to 0.645292 in 2016-2017. With the proposed budget, there will be a 1.3 cent increase to support the General Fund and a .0016 cent increase to support the Building Fund. Those levies will generate approximately \$3,051.00 less into the General Fund in 2017-2018 and no increase in real dollars into the Building Fund compared to last year's levy. The total tax asking will decrease by about \$3051.00. Discussion followed. The hearing closed at 6:10 p.m.

ONSENT ITEMS

Consent items included the minutes of the August 14, 2017 regular meeting, the financial reports, and the September claims. The financial report (with last month's figures in parentheses) showed a balance of \$284,478.19 (\$701,769.44) in the General Fund. 


